If you don't know what the Rotary Foundation is about, the best explanation can be captured in this Paul Harris Statement, "When an individual, a sect, a clique or a nation hates and despises another individual sect, clique, or nation, he or they simply do not know the objects of their hatred. Ignorance is at the bottom of it."

All the programs associated with the Foundation such as Vocational Training Teams, Scholarships, global grants and district grants are directed at that ignorance. The Rotary Foundation was started "*to do good in the world*" and the result is to reduce the hatred that Paul Harris spoke about.

Peggy states that she loves Rotary. When asked to join she questioned why anyone would want to have lunch every week with the same people. She now understands and is excited to attend the meetings to hear what is happening in the community and play a bigger role.

(**Best Practice**) The Waseca and Janesville Rotary Clubs shared a fundraiser event by hosting the Harlem Ambassadors. This event brought the communities together to share in the profits of a very successful event. It was also a lot of fun since the Rotary team consisting of fellow Rotarians of both clubs participated.

Over the last fifty years, the Waseca Rotary club has been bringing together the community and the ideals of Rotary International. They have active members who not only contribute their dues to the Stoltenberg Scholarship (\$5000 Scholarship) and Rotary Foundation, but also volunteer as STRIVE advisors, Host Families for International Youth Exchange Students, and Organizers of Community Events such as Farm and City Luncheon, New Teach Luncheon, Business and Industry Luncheon, and the Waseca Rotary Golf Tournament.



The Waseca Rotary Club and Janesville Rotary club have partnered for a District Foundation grant to provide Junior Achievement to the schools. The Waseca Rotary Club will put in \$3,000 and the Janesville club will be a partner with \$1.000. The additional \$4,000 will be from the District Foundation Funds. This is another example of working together to gain bigger benefits for a project.



Is it Christmas Yet? The Waseca Rotary Club provides Hot Cocoa for the Canadian Pacific's Holiday train, which will go through Janesville this year. The plan is to be decked out in Rotary gear for the event with a large banner-promoting Rotary. The train collects food for the needy along the root and when the train is at the stop of the route there is usually lots of fun and activities including live entertainment. Thousands of lights deck the train as it passes through the many communities from Canada to the United States.

During my visit to this club, an interesting word was used. RHINO-when interpreted means "*No Rotarians*

in Name Only" The idea is to have every Rotarian engaged in some project and not a check writer. Great Idea

Foundation Opportunities to Collaborate and Connect

West St. Paul-Mendota Heights Rotary Club-Project: Heartline Maternity Center in Tabarre. Haiti

Haiti has the highest infant and maternal death rates in the Western Hemisphere. According to estimates by UNFPA and other UN agencies, a woman in Haiti has a one in 80 chance of dying due to pregnancy or childbirth. Heartline Ministries has been working in Haiti for over 20 years and operates a maternity center in Port-au-Prince. The project proposes to assist with renovations of the center to support the



expansion of the center and support the additional post-partum and delivery rooms. The current kitchen has been damaged by termites and needs to be renovated. Since power is so uncertain and disrupted at times, there is a need for a generator, invertor and batteries to keep electricity working. Upon completion of this project, Heartline will be able to offer additional maternity and delivery services.

Here is a re-cap of the fund pledged and amount needed:
