## Telling YOUR Rotary Story:

#### Chisago Lakes Rotary Club

Featured in the *Chisago County Press* is this story about the global grant that will happen in January, thanks to participation of 21 Rotary clubs in our District. Craig Leiser, DRFCC and Margie Horning (Rotary District 5960 Grants Sub-Committee Chair) presented a check from the Rotary Foundation to support the matching contributions for the project benefiting Jamaica. Diagnostic equipment including

ultrasound machines, transducers, and an EKG machine will be sent. The second part of this project includes sending a medical training team who will lecture and instruct Jamaica technicians on proper usage of the equipment. Joanne Sackreiter and Kristine Nelson Fuge, Chisago Lakes Rotarians spearheaded this project. Delivery of the equipment and on-site training are scheduled for the second week in January 2016. The total project cost is estimated at \$55,000.

Margie Horning stated in the article to the Chisago County Press: "*The work that went into putting this* 

grant together by local Rotarians should be applauded."

#### Reading and Rotary: the two "R's" for one local teacher

"Special Ed teacher Jean Wespetal loves to read. But even more so, she loves to teach reading to

struggling young readers because she knows how important it is to their success. "Although literacy does not automatically guarantee a high quality of life, we know low levels of literacy can seriously undermine it," Wespetal explained. "We also know 90-95% of children with reading problems can overcome their difficulties if they receive appropriate treatment at an early age."

About 13 years ago, two things came into serendipitous convergence to help address reading problems. Jean Wespetal, who teaches at Westside Elementary School, knew that teachers needed help from volunteers for young readers just not keeping up with their peers. And a Rotary Club member asked her if there was anything the Rotary could do to help at the school. That led to the Rotary Readers program.

Members of the River Falls Tuesday morning Rotary club volunteer for about half an hour each week to listen to a small group of grade school'ers read aloud.

This mentoring provides a valuable service to teachers who don't always have the time to listen to every student. It's also important for

struggling reading students. "It's a gift to the school." Wespetal said. "Learning to read can be hard

work for some students. And there's just not enough time to listen to them read -- to have them practice reading." Wespetal said that practice of reading is crucial. Rotarians can give that to her students.

"All kinds of reading research says you really need to have the words in front of the child a lot," Wespetal said. "They need to actually see the written words repeatedly so they can absorb the phonetic code and sight words." That's why her classroom is lined with bookshelves filled with books. That's also why she makes sure kids get books in their hands. Wespetal tapped the local Rotary to pay for a pizza party at the end of the school year with Rotary volunteers and the students in their reading groups. At the pizza party every volunteer gave their student a book based on that student's interest.

"It's like an award ceremony. The student is called up, shakes the hand of the Rotary volunteer and is awarded a book," Wespetal said. "It's so good for the child."

Every year, the school hosts the Scholastic Book Fair -- and often, some students don't get money or forget to bring money to buy a book. Westepal, with money from the Rotary, makes sure every child gets a book. Wespetal took it upon herself to organize the reading program with the volunteers from Rotary and the teachers who use them.

Year after year she speaks at the Rotary breakfasts to recruit members to her cause. Year after year, she helps teachers at Westside use these volunteers. That's why Wespetal was awarded a Wildcat Pride award. It was presented to her at the school board's Nov. 17 meeting. "It was a real honor,"

Wespetal said. "It was also humbling because it's not just me. *It's a team* of Rotary members and teachers."


