The President's Message

January marks the midpoint of our Rotary club's executive term—a good time to review the past six months and outline plans for the remaining six months of my term. I will also restate my five goals for my July-to-July presidency.

1 To increase membership by three

With 53 active and seven honorary members, we are the largest club in District 4140 and are healthy and growing. We have recently welcomed 5 new members and three honorary members to our club.

2 Increase our presence in Chapala

We have initiated 3 new projects, including providing health education talks on nutrition, dental and heart health to local villages. We are working with the Blue School in Chapala to provide electrical and painting upkeep to classrooms in this Special Needs School and we are helping at the Tepehua Community Centre with a Children's lunch program and recently raised money for a special Christmas dinner for these children and their families.

3 Ribbon Cutting at the Sanitary Wastewater Treatment Facility

We completed our sanitary wastewater treatment facility at the village of Ojo de Agua using Global Grant funds. Raw sewage is now being treated in a municipal sewage system that incorporates a 3 chamber 180,000 litre septic tank, sewer pipe system and an engineered wetland. This project was completed and opened in July of 2025 with 60 people attending the ribbon cutting ceremony.

4 First Aid Station in Ojo de Agua

We are proceeding with planning and funding for a new Global Grant for the La Cuesta / Mezcala Medical Center with a First Aid Station in Ojo de Agua. This village First Aid Station was the third item noted in the medical needs assessment that was originally completed with their water and sanitary treatment grant. The need for a local village medical facility has grown and will become a satellite First Aid Station.

5 To further our relationships with other Rotary Clubs

We have furthered our relationships with other clubs with a joint wheelchair distribution project with our district governor. We have gained new friendships, support and donations with our Trip to Yuma, Arizona, our Heart-to-Heart club hosting with various clubs from the United States, and our Friendship Conference, hosting our western Canadian friends.

We are looking forward to our next 6 months. 🌟

DESCRIPTION OF RECENT ACTIVITIES:

Our Diabetes Education Program primarily serves the barrio of Tepehua, one of the poorest areas of Chapala. Our Past-President, Dr. Oscar Ibarra, Jr. leads this project and our President-Elect Erika Alamos, a nutritionist, volunteers her expertise as well. Other members help with the set up, registration, and taking vital signs and glucose measurements for the attendees. At this time we have about 45 regular attendees with seven Type 1 diabetes. Through the philanthropy of a community member and some donors, labs and in some cases insulin, are paid for. The Club is currently paying for sensors for the Type 1 diabetics to monitor their glucose levels, especially the 10 children. The sensors must be replaced every three weeks and are an expensive and unsustainable cost to the program. We are seeking sponsors for the children. We were dealt a major blow this year. We had a generous doctor who was paying for almost all of the costs of this program. However, he tragically passed away last year. For a while, his wife continued the support but she has moved on. We have scrambled to keep this valuable program operating. A private donor is helping with partial costs of running the program and recently, the government health service announced some help with donated medications. We hope to raise enough funds so that the children in the program with Diabetes Type I can be provided with sensors as they are being educated about how to manage exercise, nutrition and healthy habits. ☺



Past President Dr. Oscar Ibarra Jr. is passionate about the Diabetes Education Program and has been a key leader from the beginning. Rotary volunteers assist at the Monday Clinics in the Chapala Centro area.

DESCRIPTION OF RECENT ACTIVITIES:

The purpose of Global Grant 2862537 is to restore and equip a public healthcare clinic in La Cuesta.

La Cuesta is an indigenous village located between the towns of Mezcala and San Pedro Itzicán in the state of Jalisco, Mexico. The total population in the area surrounding La Cuesta is approximately 20,000 people. The native villages along the north shore of Lake Chapala are underserved. In addition to the routine illnesses; obesity, diabetes, heart disease and cancer, the area is known to be the epicenter for kidney disease - listed as the worst in the world for end stage renal failure, on a per capita basis.

The need for additional healthcare services has long been recognized and a clinic was built in La Cuesta about 8 years ago. This building was part of a private practice that subsequently closed. When the practice did not sell and the terms of the land use agreement were not being met; the land and structure on it returned to the original indigenous property holder. This occurred in the spring of 2025. In July 2025, the community approached The Chapala Sunrise Rotary Club and asked for help to re-open the health clinic in La Cuesta.

The Chapala Sunrise Rotary Club seized the opportunity because it fit well with the club's plans to replicate our existing healthcare projects in additional indigenous communities. The Club has ongoing projects in Diabetes awareness and prevention, Nutrition, Cardiology and

Dentistry. We have a Global Grant for Kidney Transplants that serves many patients in this area. The ability to follow up with recipients locally and to serve patients early in their diagnosis may prevent the need for dialysis or surgery.

The Chapala Sunrise Rotary Club has always worked closely with the local communities and enjoys a strong working relationship with the regional government in Poncitlán. In order to make this dream a reality, the Club reached out to the State of Jalisco Secretary of Health Director for Region IV and asked for assistance. The Director of Health immediately saw the potential and was fully aware of the need. An agreement was reached with the Health Department to fully staff the facility with doctors and support personnel. The staff will include: primary care doctors, nurses, a psychologist, a nutritionist and a fulltime dentist. They will provide medical support staff, equipment and building maintenance as well.

The local government and the Chapala Sunrise Rotary Club will restore the building to meet the State standards for a regional "Casa De Salud".

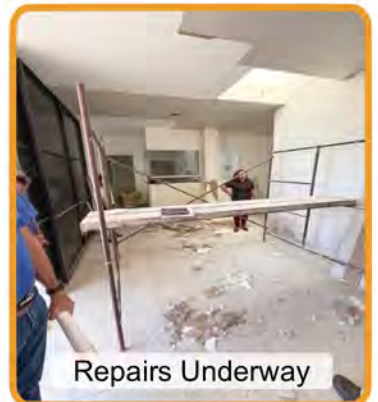

DESCRIPTION OF RECENT ACTIVITIES:

The Community Centre for San Pedro Itzicán provides meals to over 180 kids per day, holds English and Special Needs classes, teaches health and hygiene, distributes monthly food packages to needy families, runs a local bakery, and operates a small bazaar selling gently used clothing and other items.

With public safety being a priority, the purpose of this project is to maximize the useability of this ever-evolving Community Centre building. The Rotary Club of Chapala Sunrise is working with a local contractor to build upon previous Rotary projects to move this facility toward its ultimate completion.

Some previous Rotary projects include providing furnishings for the Kids Kitchen, assisting with the on-site bakery, building washrooms, constructing a ditch and culvert to safely direct the seasonal runoff to the lake, constructing a watermain along the public roadway, and providing health education to the community and English classes to the children.

New Rotary work under this project include:

- Connecting the on-site water system to the new street watermain.
- Conducting an electrical investigation and upgrading the breaker box to alleviate the power brownouts causing damage to expensive kitchen equipment.
- Converting an existing office space into a medical and a dental space, both with tiled floors, sealed walls, new sinks and better lighting/ventilation.

A typical day at the new Community Center

- Providing solar hot water to the Kids Kitchen and a solar electrical system to help reduce the electricity bills and provide hot water for dishes.
- Completing the construction of a brick surround wall for better security.
- Adding a concrete floor to the area behind the existing washrooms and the gravel area downstairs in the main classroom area to provide the center with more useable floorspace.
- Adding a safety railing to the ramp / walkway.
- Waterproofing walls and roof areas as required.

For this unique project, the Rotary Club of Chapala Sunrise is providing Project Management and Accounting services. ☺

DESCRIPTION OF RECENT ACTIVITIES:

Over the past two years, we have been in touch with a group of Rotarians, named Heart to Heart, from several states in the mid and south western states of the U.S. They are particularly interested in working with us on addressing the needs of people with renal failure in our area. The local area has the highest rate of End Stage Kidney disease in the world... caused by a number of factors. This group found the funding for approximately \$100,000 U.S. for us to set up a kidney transplant program. We are partnering with the Lila K Foundation. They have done this work for a number of years, but were unable to expand. We have now funded sixteen successful transplants! Additionally, we are partnering with a Rotary Club in Guadalajara that runs a recovery center near the hospital for cancer patients. They have agreed to accept our patients, post-surgery, so that they can recover in a sanitary place across from the hospital for post-surgery follow up.

We have learned some lessons. The Global Grant only funds the actual transplant, including the cost of surgery for the donor. However, there are upfront costs for labs, medication, dental work, psychological support, donor matching etc. Unfortunately, we have also had two donors rejected for health issues. Yet we still must pay for their pre-surgery expenses. Even more distressing is the impact on the potential recipients who now must wait for a match with a cadaver. That typically takes at least a year. Karl Dyer has been reaching out to private donors and other Clubs to help with these pre-surgery expenses, which, ironically cost more than the surgery itself. ☹️

Boots on the Ground

Our willingness to do work, in the field, supported by donors who want to see what ACTION looks like:



- Over three years, a team of Rotarians collaborated with local councils, officials, and partners to design and build a village-wide wetlands wastewater treatment system, and trained volunteers for two years to support long-term sustainability.



- Eleven members who volunteer on Friday mornings to set up, serve hot meals and play games with 45-65 children who don't have enough to eat.



- Eighteen members who volunteered to set up and take down tables, chairs and decorations and to house and transport master Mexican craftspeople at a 3-day Artisans Fair – one of the premier events of the year at Lake Chapala.



- A team of ten club members who identified and vetted house-bound and working people with no access to wheelchairs that could accommodate dirt roads and cobblestone streets. The members assembled wheelchairs and fitted the recipients with expert help from one of our members, a polio victim who rose to great challenges and became a Paralympian basketball player. He currently runs wheelchair tennis and pickleball events for communities around Mexico.



- A team of four members who are medical professionals, offering bi-monthly classes in isolated villages on heart healthy behaviors, nutrition and dental hygiene.



- Eleven members who educate, take vital signs and distribute medications to diabetes patients monthly.

By getting our hands dirty and working directly with the under-served and indigenous population in our area we gain new community partners who we meet in the field. We build trust with villagers and with our partners through our visibility, and our willingness to listen and work with them over extended periods of time.



Trust of outsiders is not easily given after years of promises, rip-offs, and abandonment. An outgrowth of our work in the field, is that partnerships are being built not only with like-minded and more fortunate people, but with the recipients themselves. The community gains trust and acquires new skills and confidence that empower them to help each other, to advocate for themselves and their community and to take action, too.



The Rotary Club of Chapala Sunrise prides itself in being your “Boots on the Ground” in Mexico. What does that look like? Wading through raw sewage to take measurements of contaminants in an indigenous village with no sanitation treatment system.



2) A young indigenous woman from the village of Ojo de Agua became a leader through her work on the village sanitation system project. When we asked villagers for a representative to speak at the inauguration of upwards of 125 people, this woman was chosen by her peers.

She spoke with passion and advocated that our Club continue our work with them to establish a first aid station and is working with the local Council to gain their permission.



3) Two women in our Diabetes Education program no longer need medications. They have learned to control their diabetes through the health and nutrition practices that we teach. They continue to attend the classes, as they choose to mentor, cheerlead others and be a model for success among the group. They developed their own raffle among their neighbors, to contribute to the cost of running the monthly program that distributes necessary medications.



Boots... (cont'd)

Examples include:

1) An isolated village, new to us, approached our leaders to help them renovate and equip a medical building that was returned to their indigenous council under the terms of a lease agreement. There is little access to medical care for the 14,000 people in the immediate area. The group included the mayor, the lead of the Council, a local nurse, and villagers. With few resources, but as a demonstration of their sincerity and willingness to pitch in, they organized a community raffle to raise funds to clean the building and to do some minor repairs. Their effort and commitment led us to embark on developing a Global Grant for the La Cuesta Community Medical Center.

Our Club is fortunate to have a bilingual emergency room doctor, engineers and team members who have reached agreement with the State Health authority to provide staffing, maintenance and expertise to ensure the sustainability of this project. The local Health Authority is providing architectural services for renovation to meet the standards of a public health facility and while the municipality is providing legal services for a thirty year agreement between the local Indigenous community and Health Region 4 which will ensure that the Center remains viable and sustainable. We are continuing to seek funding commitments for this impactful project.

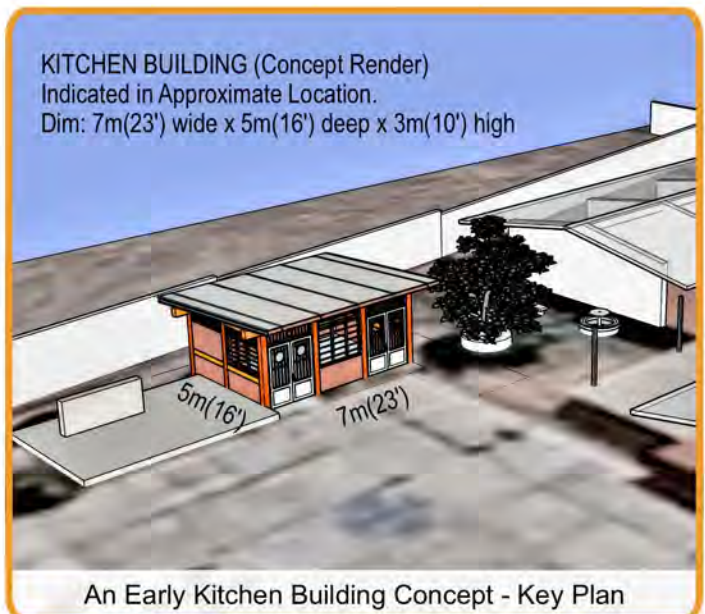

DESCRIPTION OF RECENT ACTIVITIES:

CAM No.29 Francisco Medina Ascencio, locally known as the "Blue School" is a special needs school that has been in operation for thirty years. The Blue School is centrally located in the Town of Chapala across the street from the local High School. This special education school currently runs multiple classrooms of children 5 days a week from 2pm to 6pm daily. This school currently has six groups: one preschool, three elementary, one secondary and one job-training for a total of 91 students.

The teachers are committed to not only educating these children but also to providing a loving and caring environment for them.



An Early Kitchen Building Concept - Key Plan

The Rotary Club of Chapala Sunrise has been involved with providing some cosmetic and minor electrical and plumbing works to the school, and recently we joined together with the Lincoln Rotary Club of Lincoln, California and the Richmond Sunrise Club of Vancouver, B.C. to provide both paint and labor to kick-start painting the entirety of the Blue School's multiple buildings.

Painting and minor repairs are only the first step to improving this facility and after discussions with Dr. Maria Guadalupe Delgado, the School Director, and in consultation with the staff, it was determined that a proper kitchen area was of the utmost importance.

Not only will the kitchen allow for feeding the children in two shifts daily, but it will also serve as a place to teach social skills around dining, nutrition, and early vocational skills such as kitchen safety, food prep, and sanitation.



Welcome to C.A.M. No. 29 "The Blue School"

**The Vision for the Proposed Kitchen Is:**

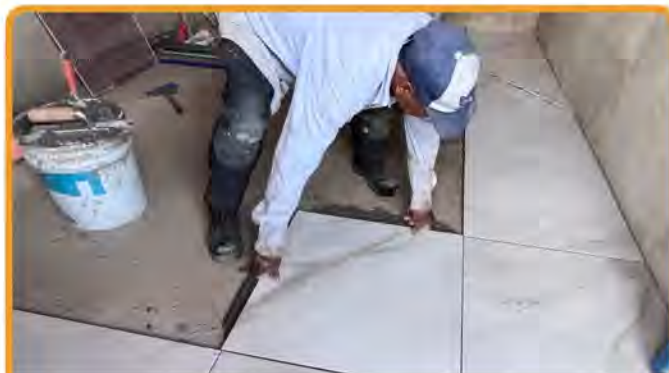
- Provide an area large enough to prepare a hot nutritious mid-day meal for the 90+ students,
- To have a functional kitchen design with proper workflow and distinct areas for receiving, storing, cooking and final preparation as required by the State of Jalisco,
- To be clean and inviting with a proper place for dishes, food items and appliances etc.
- To have a safe workspace with proper lighting and ventilation,
- To have the space large enough to provide life-lesson classes to older students.

The new kitchen location was decided upon. It is close to the covered play area and open grassed area where the children take their meals now. It will be centrally located for accessibility, and close to an entrance for deliveries. Services (electrical power, municipal water, sanitary sewer) are all accessible at this location.

The Blue School kitchen project can be broken down into three distinct phases for pricing, but also as an appropriate place to begin and end construction as funding permits:

**Phase 1 – The Building Shell**

This phase includes construction of the building foundation / footings, brick building walls complete with windows and doors, the roof structure and proposed services to the building (electrical, sanitary, water). The final product at this stage is an empty but lockable shell building.



Phase 2: Finishing (concept example)

Phase 2 - Finishing

This phase includes tiling the floor and partway up the walls, finalizing the electrical outlets, adding lights, fans, sinks, counters, and painting the ceiling and walls. The finished product is a move in ready kitchen.



Phase 3: Furnishing (concept sketch)

Phase 3 – Furnishing

This phase includes moving salvageable equipment from the existing kitchenette and providing new equipment as required. Most equipment and appliances are moveable for deep cleaning at the end of each school year, and for rearranging as the need arises. Phase 3 is a complete functional kitchen. ☺

DESCRIPTION OF RECENT ACTIVITIES:

There are many barriers for children with few resources to graduate from preparatoria (high school). There are not enough enrollment spaces for all students who wish to attend. Acceptance is based on grades and entrance exams. We strongly believe that students who have made it through all of the hurdles, should be given the chance to advance to the next level.

Two years ago, we began a scholarship program for students who have graduated and want to continue their studies. They live in one of the poorest barrios in the area. We provide scholarships to seven students who have been accepted into programs for technical degrees, licenses or university. They turn in their grades twice a year, with receipts, to demonstrate that the money has been spent on educational expenses and/or transportation to the school. This year's students include young adults who are studying industrial engineering, nursing, surgery, physiotherapy and teaching. All of our students currently have a "B" average or better. The students or family members are expected to give service to the Tepehua Community Center in return. 🌀

DESCRIPTION OF RECENT ACTIVITIES:

Dr. Carlos, along with a nutritionist and two cardiologists are providing preventive health education every two months to the village of Ojo de Agua. A member of our Club, Dr. Carlos Cerda, donates approximately a day a week to serve the dental needs of those who cannot afford it. He continues to work in the village of Ojo de Agua, along with his wife, who is pediatric dentist, to educate the families on dental hygiene, distribute toothbrushes and toothpaste, and to register patients. Last year, he and Club members went to the village twice for dental education. He plans to return monthly to address the needs of the villagers. In the last year, he has provided service to 84 patients. These patients are required to pay a small amount (such as 50 cents for a filling). Even though every peso counts in those families, he has found that patients value the service that was provided for them if they pay even a bit. Budgets need to pay for materials, labs and dental fixtures, such as, plates and bridges. This Program is currently in need of funding to continue. 🌀



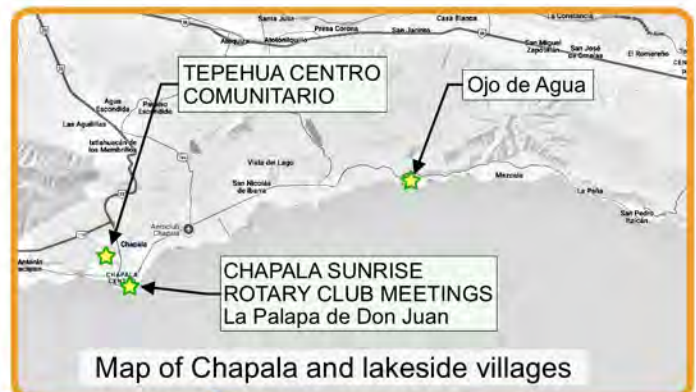

STATUS: Functional Design and Funding Stage

DESCRIPTION OF RECENT ACTIVITIES:

As part of the village assessment completed in 2018, the need for a first aid building was identified after the need for potable water / sanitary house connections and a sewage treatment system to clean up the water quality entering the lake.

The proposed first aid center will serve as a satellite to the planned La Cuesta / Mezcala Medical Centre, located 7km east. Due to the rough two-track road, travel takes about 20 minutes by car, and much longer on foot.

Currently in the design phase, this first aid centre will serve as an assessment unit for critical care patients and may also function as a medical or dental care facility. It will meet WHO standards for remote medical units and be spacious enough for necessary equipment and first responder work. The building will include:

- A patient examination area large enough to hold a medical couch with appropriate side clearance.
- A space for a sink with running water.
- Lockable first aid cabinets and basic supply storage.
- A separate area for waste containers including removeable clinical waste containers.
- A dedicated telephone to contact emergency services.
- Easy to clean surfaces, and adequate lighting.

The building will be serviced with municipal water supply, a septic system and will have adequate parking with a dedicated ambulance loading area.

STATUS: Completed and Fully Operational

DESCRIPTION OF RECENT ACTIVITIES:

There was much progress last spring! The 180,000L three chamber septic tank was commissioned and brought into service on April 9, 2025. This was accomplished two months earlier than expected by building a temporary piped bypass of the engineered wetland. The conveyance piped system was completed in April - including the bricked Registers or "manholes". The grading of the Humedal was "Liner Ready" in May and 9,000 sq feet of polyethylene liner was installed - all in one day. 550 cubic metres of red volcanic lava rock was installed in June and the Humedal was brought into operation with effluent filling the wetland. The village water committee has been trained on the maintenance of the system. The native grown flowers and plants, specific to the engineered wetland design, were planted to complete the build-out of the system. Of course no Rotary project is complete without the Project Signage. Our contractor fabricated and installed a beautiful steel sign and prepared the site for the July Ribbon Cutting Ceremony celebrating the completion of a large construction Rotary Global Grant. The Rotary Club of South San Francisco is our International Partner and we are proud to be the boots-on-the-ground club that represent the twenty one Rotary Clubs and Districts that have joined in the funding of this key Global Grant project. 🌱
