Sand Filters Make a Difference

Clean, fresh running water. One of the many things that we take for granted in our daily lives. Unfortunately, not every one in the world is as lucky as we are to have such a luxury, which presents us as Rotarians an amazing opportunity to make a difference. George and Colleen Wood paid a visit to the McMurray Rotary Club to talk about sand filters and how they can bring clean water to areas that have access to none. Colleen is the District 7330 Chair of the Sand Filter Project. Since 2005 they have been working with a Rotary District in Michigan to raise money to buy and distribute sand filters in some of the neediest areas of the world. In February 2010 they made a journey with 14 people to the Dominican Republic where more than 18,000 sand filters have been installed. They visited the slum of Aquas Negras to see first hand how these sand filters make a difference in communities that do not have access to clean water. According to Colleen, "These people live in a sort of 'no man' land there. The children do not have birth certificates or legal docs of any kind, so they cannot go to school and the adults work for pennies a day." There is no running water available. While they were there they toured the area, spent time with the local residents, and bought some much appreciated toys for the children because as Colleen said, "There is so much need for just basics in both the Dominican and Haiti that it breaks your heart when you see these kids. While we all know these children must be fed, clothed, and given clean water, we sometimes forget they are still children and need to play too." Colleen and George shared some of the pictures that they took on their trip, and it was heartbreaking to see the deplorable conditions in which these people live, but it was amazing to see the smiles on the faces of the children who had been given a toy and know that such a simple gesture made a world of difference in that child's life. They are planning a return trip in Febru-

In 2010 RI began work on the International H2O Collaboration with USAID and chose the Dominican Republic as one of three countries to make efforts to provide millions of people long term access to clean water and sanitation. The improvements will cost \$2 million per country which is funded by a \$500,000 grant from Rotary, \$500,000 raised by participating clubs and districts, and \$1 million in matching funds from USAID. 1

How do we fit in? Annually, the McMurray Rotary Club matches our individual member's \$75 donation to the Sand Filter project to create a \$150 donation which fulfills the Every Rotarian Every Year requirement. Over last 3 years, our club has donated \$11,000, along with RI matching grants to make \$22,000 which equals 400 sand filters to help benefit those in need.


