Retaining approximately \$4,754.60 in the Community Account to assist in our community and transferring approximately \$1,584.86 to the Club Account to assist with the financial cost of running the Rotary Club of Mundingburra. As you are all aware the rising cost of everything has required us to dedicate some of our Bunnings

days to raise money to assist with the cost of running of the club, during the 2022 FY \$1,562.82 was raised.

As at 30.06.2022 we have received \$11,648 for our participation in the Townsville Rotary Markets and a further \$4,725 for our participation in the North QLD Field Days. These funds have enabled us to help both our local community and overseas community.

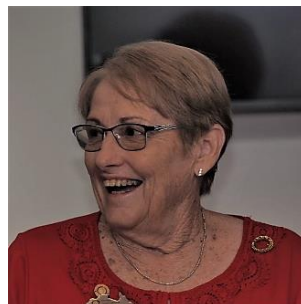

2021-2022 focussed on information and education relating to the function of TRF.

Presentations were made by Lynette Svanosio who spoke on the various ways contributions can be made, and Peter Kaye gave an overview of the Foundation's history and current structure.



Mundingburra club hosted the District Foundation Roadshow at the RSL attended by many other Townsville clubs. The Roadshow was presented by District Foundation Chair Larry Slattery, PDG Terry Daley, and PDG Alan Church.

Although not specific to Mundingburra, the Timor-Leste Vocational Training (TVLT) project has been championed by our club since its inception in 2017. Mundingburra secured three District Grants to fund the original Program which brought Doctors, Nurses, and Tradies to Australia to enhance their vocations. The club will remember hosting Dr Illa and Dr Johnnie who undertook training at Bamford Medical Centre and Townsville Day Surgery.

Following the interruption due to Covid, the Program has recommenced under the Foundation's VTT guidelines, and a new Committee has been formed under the chairmanship of PDG Peter Kaye. The plan is to bring 14 Nurses and Midwives to study at CQU, and four tradies to be hosted in Darwin. This ambitious plan will be funded through a Foundation Global Grant of \$125,000. Participants will depart Dili in January 2023.

The club held a Trivia & Treasure fund raiser at Holy Spirit School Hall, Cranbrook 22 April

in support of the Foundation's End Polio campaign which raised \$3,445.

A similar event is planned for next year.

For many years our club has relied upon its fundraising from Bunnings sausage sizzles and Townsville markets. Whilst these sources of revenue have been constant, our income is well down.



We continue to look for new fundraising initiatives however more needs to be done to secure additional funding.

Once again, a huge thanks to Kat, Bill Barber, David Nutt, and our regulars who volunteer their time to keep these projects operating.

Family Fishing Classic

Planning for this initiative as a signature club event has been postponed until next year due to the inability to secure a major prize. The pandemic has created a worldwide stock shortage in all commodities including motor vehicles, boats, outboard motors, etc with no supplier able to support our request for a prize. The FFC committee will continue to look for alternatives.

Bluewater Australia Day event

In conjunction with the Bluewater Community Association, the club participated in the Australia Day commemoration at Bluewater Park with their annual Family Day.

Thanks to Neil Andrews for his coordination of the Australia Day funding for this event.

Trivia & Treasure

The club conducted another successful Trivia & Treasure event at Holy Spirit School Hall Cranbrook in April. The format is a trivia comp, with a silent auction of wood turning pieces, wooden home wares and art works. Regrettably Covid knocked out four teams, 24 participants, with about 50 people attending. Although hoping for 80 attendees, the night generated \$3,000 for End Polio campaign.

This event has the potential to grow, and the club will continue to develop improvements for next year's event.

Willows Markets Christmas Project

This project is a new initiative to raise funds, and an opportunity to engage club members to assist in making items and selling them at the Willows market stall

Planning has begun to have a stall stocked October, November, December, to sell wooden childrens toys and homewares for Christmas.

The sale items are being created by Ian Corney, Grant Harper, Peter Kaye, and club volunteers.

The toys include, wooden puzzles,stackers, blocks, mallet & peg, black boards, trains, cars, planes, helicopters etc.

Homewares include Lazy Susan, bowls, cheese boards, salt/pepper mills, trivets, etc

Assistance will be required on Market days to set up display, promote and sell at the stand, and pack up at lunch time Sundays.

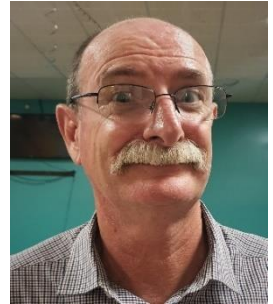
Services Director

Vocational Services

Once again Covid 19 restrictions have inhibited opportunities to visit work places to some extent during the past year.

One of the highlights of the meeting calendar was a visit to the Green Street Bunker in West End. While the Green Street site currently plays a vital role as the Townsville State Emergency Service (SES) Complex, the site contains infrastructure that played a vital role in the security of our country during World War 2.



The former RAAF Operations Building was constructed in 1942 as an operation and signals building for the Royal Australian Airforce. The building was operated in association with the Royal Australian Airforce Base and the United States Army Air Force Base established at Garbutt.

During the visit SES Local Controller Bob Griffiths provided us with a great insight into the significance of the location and the wonderful work done by the SES volunteers in our community. The visit reinforced the decision to award Bob a Paul Harris Fellow earlier in the year.

The significance of the location was formally recognised with its inclusion on the Queensland Heritage Register on 7 February 2005.

President Ryan organised a “vocational visit” to one of his favourite hang outs – the “*Empire Alternacade*” in the basement at 409 Flinders Street. It was a trip down memory lane for a number of members who have fond memories of spending many hours playing on classic arcade and pinball machines, pool tables, retro consoles and board games.

We will not dwell on that old saying “Proficiency on pinball machines and pool tables is the sign of a misspent youth.”

A big thank you to President Ryan for organising the visit and President-Elect Claudia for organising the meal.

During February members and guests toured the Townsville base of the Royal Flying Doctor Service of Australia (RFDS) facilities at the Townsville Airport.

The service was established in 1928 by Rev. John Flynn. The service provides emergency and primary health care services for those living in rural, remote and regional areas of Australia who cannot access a hospital or general practice due to the vast distances of the outback.

Our 2022 Anzac Day meeting was held at the 2nd Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (2RAR) Museum located at Lavarack Barracks.

Museum Curator Jason Harrison spoke about the key roles that the battalion has played in active service and peace keeping following its formation in 1945. The battalion has seen active service during the Korean War, Malayan Emergency and Vietnam War. The battalion has also participated in peacekeeping operations in Japan, Rwanda, East Timor and the Solomon Islands and the security of the Australian Embassy in Baghdad following the 2003 invasion of Iraq.

Brigadier (Ret.) Bruce Scott spoke about the significant number of the Townsville community who had volunteered and made the ultimate sacrifice on the battle fields during World War 1.

Thank you to Jason Harrison and Bruce Scott for their contributions to a memorable Anzac Day meeting and thank you to Peter Kaye for organising this vocational visit in our garrison city.

Vocational service means appreciating the various trades and professions, and how each can contribute to making our communities stronger and safer and support Rotary's areas of focus.

- Guest speakers Kieran Willey and Matthew Hamdorf from the Clontarf Foundation told us about the work that the organisation is doing to improve the education, discipline, life skills, self-esteem and employment prospects of young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men and equipping them to participate more meaningfully in society.

In 2020, Rotary International announced that it would be adding a seventh area of focus: supporting the environment. The meeting program for 2021/22 included a number of guest speakers who are working to address the cause of climate change

by reducing the emission of greenhouse gases, strengthening ecosystems and communities affected by climate change or supporting education initiatives that promote behaviour that protects the environment.

- Dr Tom Bridge and Dr Peter Cowman from the Museum of Tropical Queensland spoke about an exciting project they are leading to break coral codes to help save the Great Barrier Reef.
- Sandra Richards spoke about the important work being done by QPlas that combines waste agricultural plastics with hardwood residue waste to produce wood/plastic composite products that are water resistant, fire resistant, a durable long-life product, pest and rot resistant, cost-effective and environmentally sustainable. The company is based in Townsville and is working with other groups to encourage other likeminded groups to assist with making our planet a better place.

I hope that the vocational visits and range of guest speakers that were part of the meeting program for 2021-22 has provided members with the opportunity to learn more about the great work that has been done and is currently being done to make our community stronger, more inclusive and safer as well as supporting Rotary's areas of focus. Importantly events such as vocational visits provide opportunities for fellowship, to raise the profile of the club and potentially attract new members.

Thank you to Vocational Service Committee Members - Neil Andrews and Scott Hunter, President Ryan, President-Elect Claudia, Secretary Jim, the Board and club members for their support during the past year.

The following projects were carried out by the Youth Services Committee.

Townsville Grammar School INTERACT CLUB & EARLYACT CLUB 2021-22

Coordinator Robert Tardiani has spent numerous hours attending Interact and Earlyact meetings at the Senior and Junior Grammar school providing guidance and assistance. Jan Johnson acted on Robert's when he was unable to attend. Robert's report follows.



There has been a long association by TGS Interact, having been chartered by Townsville West which subsequently merged with Mundingburra club.

The TGS Interact continues to be a vibrant Club under the guidance of PHF Kristell Scott and the enthusiastic Presidents and Board Members.

The Clubs fundraising activities are conducted on the school Campus with lunch time sausage sizzles, selling snow cones, various activities at the school open nights and the colour run. The community activities including, collecting of non-perishable items for the annual food appeal, and assembling birthing kits in association with Soroptimist International.

The Board were guests of Rotary Sunrise at the chartering of the Cowboys House Interact Club.

The students are a credit to their school, their parents and themselves.



The TGS Earlyact Club was established on 14 October 2021. Earlyact, sometimes referred to as Rotakids, is not recognized by Rotary International as an official Rotary Program however with the support of Districts it will eventually be recognised.

The Board members are all year six students who have guidance by teacher Louise Symonds and deputy principal Chris Gray. The club has had a slow start due to Covid.

Despite the interruption the Club ran a successful lunch time sausage sizzle, raised \$837 for the Red Cross Food Appeal, raised \$214 with the Positive T-shirt Day in aid of epilepsy and collection of non-perishable food items for the food appeal.

It is amazing the maturity of the year six students.

We wish both Clubs all the best in continuing their good work in future years.

Book packs

In January we donated book packs to 3 students that had been identified as coming from a family that was unable to financially provide book packs for the new school year.

Australia Anti Ice Campaign - AAIC

We started the year providing advice and support to AAIC and attended several online meetings. We were in talks with several schools to hold student sessions including Heatley Secondary College and Kirwan State High School. AAIC held student educational sessions at Northern Beachers High School in September which was funded by another Rotary club. Our club tacked on to this session up with a community meeting and information night. Esther from AAIC was the speaker. This was advertised widely on social media and radio. The event was held 15th September 2021 at the Ryan Community Hall. Unfortunately, the event was not well supported by the community, however it did result in publicity for Rotary and AAIC.

In 2022 the schools changed vaccination rules for who was able to present on school sites and unfortunately AAIC did not have a presenter. Also, at this time AAIC was dealing with internal issues which prompted us to put the school project on hold from a club perspective. AAIC has moved more towards educating sporting officials in sporting clubs.
