

In addition to its hands-on-can-do approach Mundingburra Rotary Club has also been a driving force in the establishment of a number of other Rotary Clubs and a very strong supporter of youth through the Youth Exchange Program. Thus, from its humble beginnings 50 years ago on 29 March 1958 with 20 members under the stewardship of Charles Butler, through the years where membership peaked at over eighty to a present day membership of thirty six, one thing has certainly remained constant - the ideal of 'service above self'.

As the 50th President of Mundingburra Rotary Club I extend my sincere congratulations to the Club and members (past and present) on the Club's significant achievements and contribution over the past half century. 50 years of service above self is a magnificent milestone and a record everyone associated with the Club should and can be justifiably proud of.






"Club History"

40 YEARS OF MUNDINGBURRA ROTARY CLUB HISTORY THROUGH THE EYES OF CHARTER MEMBER HOLLIS PARKER



During the latter months of 1957 Townsville Rotary Club appointed Charles Butler to select 20 businessmen for the purpose of starting the 2nd Club in Townsville.

At that time the Townsville Club controlled all of Townsville and Thuringowa, so they seeded an area starting at Lowths Bridge through Railway Estate to Rooney's Bridge along the Ross River to Thompson Street in Mundingburra then north through Gulliver to Dalrymple Road to Hugh Street & Ingham Road junction from there to T & G Corner and to Lowths Bridge.

Our first official meeting was Thursday 31.1.58 at the Great Northern Hotel.

Charter members were Charles Butler, Charles Cook, Fred Arnott, Len Freer, Fred Greig, Bert Hanran, Sam Hall, Reg Hedge, Dick Keating, Reg king, Ron Kern, George Kuskie, Devin King, Bill Klump, Bill Miller, Gordon McHugh, Jack McLay, Hollis Parker, Allan Tripp, Alan Whitney.

Registration Fee, including meal was six shillings our Charter night was held in the Exhibition Hall on 29th March 1958. D.G. Doug Rattory from Maryborough Club was present.

Our District was 255 and extended from Atherton to Gympie to Murgon, Kingaroy and Charters Towers. The first Handover night was in June 1958. Though our number of members was only 20 we enjoyed a lot of humour at meetings and projects. We held a combined meeting with Townsville Club when R.I. President Clifford Randall paid us a visit in our early years. This was held in the Olympic Theatre. Norm Clibborn was the first member to be inducted into the club after Charter night.

We continued to meet at the Great Northern till Reg Hedge, Publican's Lease expired then moved to the Allen Hotel, not there very long when management told us we were "nuisance value". At this time the new brink R.S.L. Building on Charters Towers Road was completed. We moved to this location in early 1967. In 1986 we moved again to the Rugby Club. 1994 saw another move to the German-Australian.

Our first working project was to build the Girl Guides Hut in Gill Park.

The following is a list of some of our working projects, not necessarily in this order.

- 1st Guide Dog for Blind to Herbie Morris;
- Moved a house from West End to Leichhardt Creek for Sub-normal children Scouts Den at Bluewater;
- Scouts Den in Aitken Street;
- 1st section of show stall in 1962;
- 1st water lift at Oonoonba, followed by a number of others;
- Trickle water system for Sub-normal children Leichhardt Creek;
- Presented 2 electric wheel chairs;
- Rescue equipment "Jaws of Life" to ambulance;
- Audio-equipment to "Road Safety".

And the list goes on. More recently, built shelters in parks and half-size basketball courts.

Over the years our produce distribution has been a very big feature with Mundingburra.

- Charity collection days every year;
- Of course our heavy and ongoing involvement with overseas students in many forms;
- Our involvement with the Station or youth rehabilitation led by Dick Barratt is an outstanding project.

We were the driving force in the following clubs being chartered:

Mt Isa club 1958:

Port of Townsville 1966;

Ross River 1971;

Townsville South 1977;

Townsville Central 1984;

Townsville Sunrise 1990.

Our top membership numbered 85 (including a few drones). To the other end of the scale we have had quite a significant number of excellent workers. Unfortunately we have saddled a few keen new young members to the point where their business suffered and we lost them. Let us learn a lesson from this and spread the load around.

We have established a high level of assistance to the community and we must continue to work as a Club and strive to uphold and improve the standard set. As the years go by there will be greater demands for service Clubs to assist those in the community far less fortunate than ourselves.

The Club has served under some excellent District Governors who have given us good guidance credit for achievements and point out our shortcomings. Unfortunately one D.G. fell far short of the above – causing some members to consider walking out – one member did.

Looking back to late in 1957 when I was first asked to become a charter member, I hesitated before I made a decision. I'm very grateful that I made the right decision. We have been privileged to journey through life as Rotarians, and part of Mundingburra Rotary.

It's a small world – I met Fred Arnott playing bowls at a Club in the Newcastle District in February

I am proud of my 100% over 40 years and more importantly in doing so I have been privileged to visit Clubs who have a fine record of service and this includes 2 Clubs in Newcastle with about 15 members.

In New Zealand at Queenstown I missed the bus and walked to the Chair Lift only to find the Club had moved to the Motel I had left – such is life for a 100% Rotarian.


"The Object of Rotary"

Fourth: The advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace, through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.




"The Spinifex"





"Wee Care"



Wee Care commenced services in 1971. There were a lot of families in crisis, homeless and injured after the destruction left behind from cyclone Althea. Families looked after other people's children in their own homes until it was safe to return to their parental homes or alternative accommodation had been found.

This gave the Townsville people an insight into just how much an organisation such as this was needed.

There appeared to be an increasing need for 24-hour emergency accommodation for children. Whether it be through illness, accident or other crisis circumstances, the parent or guardian was unable to care for their children.

The Sisters of Mercy offered "Coolock Cottage" to the organisation and it was officially opened on June 23, 1974. Wee Care then moved to King's Road and then to our present site situated at Railway Estate. Through a lot of dedication/hard work and generosity from service Clubs such as your selves, other community organisations and our local everyday people, we have been able to continually grow into the professional organisation we are today.

Wee Care Family Inc. has been very fortunate in having a persistent and very determined Committee over the years.

They have continually fought for financial support to keep our doors open. We offer respite/emergency care for children ages from 0 to 12. We are now funded through the Department of Communities which allow us to employ qualified professional people to care for the children who require our services. Wee Care Family has grown considerably from the initial onset after cyclone Althea and will forever be indebted to the wonderful people in our local community who continually support us.

We hope to continue to be a vital non-government organisation, supporting families in need and aiming to maintain family stability for children for many more years to come.

Wee Care Family Inc extends its best wishes to Mundingburra Rotary Club on its 50th birthday and sincerely thanks the Club for choosing the organisation as a donation beneficiary.
