It was fascinating to learn Graham's parents were part of the team at Bletchley and how they were sworn to secrecy. Who knows what the outcome of the war might have been had the Enigma Code not been broken.

As you know I have been banging on about the importance of succession, and I am very pleased to announce the Board has unanimously approved the nomination of Alan Nelson for the position of President-Elect, and who will lead the club in 2025/26. ## "The Object of Rotary"



#### **Presidents Opening Address**

President Peter welcomed everyone to the meeting and hoped they enjoyed would should be a good night, with an interesting guest speaker talking about some very important history.

Peter also advised that Alan Nelson had graciously accepted the role of President Elect for our club.

#### **Guest Speaker Introduction**

Our guest speaker this week was Graham Morgan, introduced by Shane Smith, who, in welcoming Graham, provided some history on his presentation that Shane gleaned from the Internet. Shane welcomed Graham to the floor to do his presentation.

#### **Guest Speaker - Graham Morgan**

Graham commenced his talk with a thank you for the offer to present to the club on a subject that has a personal touch for him.

Speaking to us about Bletchley Park & The Enigma Code. Bletchley Park is an English country house and estate in Bletchley, Milton Keynes (Buckinghamshire) that became the principal centre of Allied code-breaking during the Second World War.

During World War 11, the estate housed the Government Code and Cypher School (GC & CS) which regularly penetrated the secret communications of the Axis Powers and more importantly the German Enigma and Lorenz Ciphers.

Breaking these codes is reported to have saved
millions of lives and shortened the War by at least
2 years.

The code was broken in 1942, using the worlds first computer "BOMBE" and the Collssus Computer.

Admiral Hugh Sinclair was the founder and Head of GC&CS between 1919 and 1938 with Commander Alastair Denniston being operational head of the organization from 1919 to 1942, beginning with its formation from Admiralty's Room 40 and The war Office.

Key GC&CS cryptanalysts moved to Bletchley Park to continue their work. These people had a variety of backgrounds – linguists and chess champions were common.

To boost their numbers The British War Office recruited top solvers of cryptic crossword puzzles as these individuals had strong lateral thinking skills.

Commander Sinclair wrote to the Foreign Office at the declaration of war about recruiting professors from Cambridge and Oxford Universities.

Trustworthy women were similarly recruited for administrative and clerical jobs.

Dennison also recognized however that the enemy's use of electromechanical cipher machines meant that formally trained mathematicians would also be needed.

Although suspected due to the sudden decrease in shipping losses to the Allied forces from early 1942 The Axis Powers never accepted that The Enigma Code could be broken due to the fact that the code sequence changed at midnight every day.

Our guest speakers parents, Dorothy & Edward Morgan both worked at Bletchley Park. Graham never knew what his father did during the war and only by chance in the mid 1970's did he find out through a Mini Series – "The Secret War".

In mid 1970 the Official Secrets Act finally allowed those involved in what went on at Bletchley Park, being allowed to tell of their time at Bletchley park and be awarded for their service.

Bletchley Park continued operations under The Government Code & Cypher School until 1946 when all documentations and records were destroyed.

Those who worked at Bletchley Park were sworn to secrecy under The Official Secrets Act which prevented them from divulging what went on at or of their involvement during this time.

Due to speaker time restraints, we were all left wanting to hear more about this fascinating aspect of history.

#### **Guest Speaker Thanks**

David Nutt, who has a military background, thanked Graham for the presentation, and highlighted that all of us today have been impacted by the wonderful work this group did many years ago as life would have been much different had this team not been so successful at finding the right way to break the code.
