Guest Speaker – Tania Anger

We had a short but very interesting presentation by Tania Anger on the topic of Home Caring.



Tania spoke on Home Care services and Home Care Packages available for people over the age of 65 years

The sobering fact of course is that our demographic is such that many of us would be eligible for these Home Care Packages.

The three key areas are:

- Domestic Assistance Services
- Personal Care Services
- Aged, Health and Disability Services



For many elderly Australians, a Home Care Package is the key to being able to age at home, in the comfort of a familiar environment.

Home Care Package subsidies support you to continue living at home and staying connected to your community, often avoiding, or delaying, moving into a nursing home.

Age eligibility includes people aged 65 years or older, or 50 years or older for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

People younger than this will need to test their eligibility with the National Disability Insurances Scheme (NDIS) first.

To test for HCP eligibility, people register with My Aged Care answering questions to help with assessing need.

They then undertake an assessment with a registered agency. If a person is determined eligible for a Home Care Package, they will be approved for a package and registered in the Australian Government's national priority system.

Tania advised it was prudent to register even if you had no immediate need for assistance and the importance of being in the system

Would you give up a Saturday night for Rotary? – a comment from Brydget on the Blah Competition.

The 'Blah! High School speaking competition' was held last Saturday (5-9pm) at James Cook University. The two major sponsors are the University and Rotary and a number of minor sponsors. The theatre was easily accessible to all being close to the main ring road with lots of well-lit parking.

The event has been running in Townsville for many years.

Having seen the event advertised in the Mundingburra Rotary newsletter *Spinifex,* I went along. I had also invited a friend who had said she would like to join Rotary and I hoping to display an example of the kind of things Rotary does.

At the last moment she was not able to attend, but I went along anyway and was pleased to meet another member of the Club who was a competition as an invigilator.

I expected to see a smattering of Rotary members perhaps 10ish at the competition -2/3 for each of the Townsville Clubs. This expectation was based on the Club I belonged to in NSW, with about the same number of members as Mundingburra, where at least half of the members had attended a similar event in their local village hall.

The Blah! Competition was divided in 3 units; 7-8 students; 9-10 and 11-12 students with differing topics for each level. There were about 8 competitors for each section, and they chose between the topics given. We heard about 'Friends', 'If I was Principal', 'Al' and variously about 'Changing the world for the better'.

All of the students, from the rich mix of young people in Townsville, gave good presentations and were rewarded with bags and prizes, a significant sponsor seeming to be Officeworks. The event was brought together by their competition coach and the logistics were all done by older students who also introduced all of the items – they did an excellent job if they are indeed products of this experience in previous years, that speaks well of this opportunity for our high school students.

Rotary supporting this competition is to be applauded, BUT why was I the only Rotary member in the audience? The President of Townsville Rotary Club said a few words at the opening of proceedings but did not take this opportunity to tell the students, and their parents what Rotary does, why we support such events and the bigger picture of our activities.

Maybe I am a bit crazy, and some might say "Well she does not have anything else to do on a Saturday night", but if we as Rotarians are going to give money to local events such as Blah! should we not go and support the students – go and talk with them and their parents and teachers. During the night I spoke with several students and a Mother and a Teacher – Yes, I did ask them if they had ever thought of joining Rotary!

If we Rotary members do not attend such events, do we not miss out on supporting good community activities, the opportunity to promote Rotary, tell others about who we are and what we do. When the students are asked if they want to join Rotaract or in 10-15 years' time, their local Rotary Club, would they be able to remember "Oh, I remember Rotarians being at the speaking competition, they were good, motivated, community-minded people – maybe I should go along and see if I might like to join them".
