Guest Speaker Segment

Our guest speaker, Cathy Booth from Bundaberg Sunrise Rotary, whose club is a major sponsor of this project, was welcomed to the meeting electronically via Zoom by Jan Johnson.





Cathy gave a very detailed pictorial presentation on the Umoja Orphanage Project of which she started in 2012.

The need for this facility was highlighted by the excellent slides highlighting the need for this project and the impact it was having on the community.







It is impossible to really convey what we saw in this newsletter, however, it was very emotional and showed the fantastic and extensive work that Cathy, and the teams she had persuaded to come from Australia to do various roles, had achieved.

We all love our children so it was sad to see that for various reasons, including HIV, had created massive issues for these very young children. And it was touching see what Cathy and her teams had achieved. Unfortunately, the project also suffered some major issues from local flooding events, and in some cases, locals gaining access to building materials that had been installed for fence and gardening needs.

A little bit of the history is listed below from the Internet for your interest. Plus as rerun of part of last week's Newsletter on this project from Jan Johnson

Umoja Orphanage Kenya is the Australian **fundraising arm** of the charity that raises money for the facility that is being built on the 17 acres of land in Ukunda, Kenya. Umoja is supported by Bundaberg East Rotary Club and is a project or Rotary Australia World Community Services (RAWCS).

And below is part of the report from last week from Jan Johnson, which I have retained as it gives a much better outline of Cathy and what she is doing with this project.

Cathy's passion for helping to give vulnerable children a second chance at life is inspirational. As a school teacher, mother of four, and grandmother of four, Cathy has always been an advocate for helping children to reach their full potential.

After a short visit to Kenya in 2010, Cathy returned to Australia determined to start her own charity to combat child abandonment and orphaned children. In 2016, after five long years of fundraising in Australia and creating the required infrastructure in Kenya, her dream of opening a self-sustainable children's village in Ukunda, Kenya was finally a reality.

Hear the difficulties of running the Umoja Project in a poverty stricken area of Kenya.

Cathy will be joining us via zoom and will speak about how Umoja is so much more than just a children's home. Umoja is a project which also helps the community, and how the support of Rotary and Rotarian Volunteers, has helped her team truly achieve the extraordinary while Cathy has continued to work full time up until the end of June this year in her profession, whilst overseeing the project from Australia.

Cathy returns to Kenya twice a year to take Rotary Volunteers and other volunteers to the project.

President Peter commented that the Board will be looking at how our club might be able to assist Cathy's project.

Bill Barber commented to members that our ability to assist the community and these type of projects only comes about from our Markets, Bunnings BBQ's and Toy Stall days, so we need members to assist us to raise the funds needed.
