Member's Talk

from Francis Young on Updating Katikati History

Francis is working with a team, including our Sandra Haigh, at the Museum to write a new account of the history of our community from 1940 onward. He is researching in the Western Bay <u>Community Archive</u> for records of prominent people who contributed to the growth of our area.

Francis first talked about the 1960s <u>excavation of the Kauri Point swamp</u> adjacent to the site of the Owarau Pa. This produced the first known evidence of human occupation in the district, including wooden hair combs, the best of which were included in the famous international <u>Te Maori exhibition</u> (1984-86). Artifacts from the excavation have been dated back to around 1350, before the arrival of the better known migrating canoes from which current iwi are descended.

The team plan to produce a book of some 300 pages, small enough "to fit in a lady's handbag!" The prominent people who contributed to the growth of our area will include:

Morland Fox (County Clerk in 1948) who produced a report on the town of Katikati revealing a population of 450, 200 children at school, 6 businesses, no town water supply or reticulated sanitation and all roads unsealed.

David Hume, resident 1950-2003, who was a Town Councilor and chaired the later Town Board. The present swimming pool is named after him.

George Alley, resident 1923-40, a progressive farmer owning some 1,000 acres who gave land for town facilities and a was a prominent benefactor.

<u>Jim Jordan</u>, resident 1926-97, who arrived as a farm cadet, worked at Tanners Point, was influential in education, and also an amateur historian.

Arthur Honeyfield, resident 1948-96, who was an entrepreneur and business leader in the agricultural sector at a national level, leading in supplying our World War 2 Pacific forces with food. He was an early aviator and achieved degrees in law and accounting. He was also one of the men behind the development of the Port of Tauranga. He farmed at Kauri Point and became involved in the development of avocado growing and also got involved with the milling of plantations on Matakana Island.
