Our club is part of a move to <u>renew the **relevance**</u> of Rotary in our rapidly changing world. Two regions, the <u>U.K.</u> and the <u>Pacific</u> regions, were selected to develop their own new structures in <u>Regionalisation</u> pilot projects. This is a 2 year trial which will <u>influence the future</u> of Rotary worldwide.


We need to be <u>proud</u> and <u>enthusiastic</u> to be included this exciting project! It opens up <u>new opportunities</u> which we have not previously considered.

We are Pioneers!

We remain in <u>District 9930</u>, one of the <u>five districts</u> covering New Zealand and 10 Pacific Island nations. As a participant in the new regionalization structure under development **we** are also now grouped into a <u>new</u>, coastal Bay of Plenty, <u>Community Group</u> of clubs designated as "<u>Area</u> 3" (there are 4 in total) within a <u>region</u> to be known as **Rotary Pacific**.

The <u>9 clubs</u> participating in our Group (it will get a <u>name</u>) are: **Katikati**, **Omokoroa**, Otumoetai, Tauranga, Tauranga Sunrise, Tauranga Te Papa, Papamoa, Kawerau and Whakatane.

It is to be hoped that increasing communication, fellowship, cooperation, and possible <u>joint larger-scale projects</u> within our new Group will increase our **enjoyment** and **participation** in the Rotary mission. (More information will follow)



## **Speakers** - Peter Mackay &

Bronwyn Carter on Building a New Club

Peter started by saying that after his year as Club President at Katikati (during the Covid pandemic) he committed to starting a new club at **Omokoroa**. His initiative was greatly supported and assisted by Assistant District

Governor Pat Taylor and a number of informal coffee shop informal meetings were held to gauge local interest.

The results were disappointing until Peter realised that some of the members of his *Zumba* exercise group were exactly the type of people who would make excellent members of Rotary. A few taps on the shoulder and he was "in business"!

Bronwyn then gave her perspective on how the embryonic club then developed. From July 2022 further informal meetings were held with Peter and Pat Taylor closely involved before a formal meeting to establish the club in March 2023.

Three prospective members attended and a President (Bronwyn) and Secretary (Meredith) elected. Various meeting venues were tested before settling on the Omokoroa Boat Club and regular meetings on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday mornings at 8 a.m. were scheduled. With a small membership meeting agendas were necessarily flexible (no set speakers) and costs kept down by not including a meal.

The club was formally established as a "satellite club" of Katikati in November 2023 and has concentrated on establishing a presence in the local community. To this end projects have included:

- Beach "clean-ups"
- Plantings at the primary school (with the Lions Club)
- Cooking "bacon butties" at the monthly market at the Community Hall
- A publicity tent at the summer night markets at the Domain
- Donated computers sent to Gisborne and Hawkes Bay to provide extreme weather event resilience
- Refurbished computers sent to the Solomon Islands (transported by Behlehem College)

#### Fundraising events have included:

- \$600 from a tea party at Websters Tea for Polio Plus
- Participating in the Katikati Club garden ramble fundraiser and put their \$500 share towards the trailer for Matahui School
- \$1,200 from a brunch for the *Pink Ribbon* breast cancer campaign
- \$8,500 from a Mid-winter Christmas Dinner for a training mannequin for the local first-responders based at the Fire Station ——>

**Membership** has reached 9, so the target of 20 required for the club to "charter" remains a challenge. Bronwyn acknowledged the ongoing support received from the Katikati club and planned to focus on social media, club apparel, and a branded gazebo' to promote the club.



## Member's Talk

lan Stevens on An Adventure in the U.K.

lan gave us a fascinating insight into his recent epic ebiking adventure in the U.K. With 8 in his team (the oldest 79) they cycled from **Lands End** (south-west tip of Cornwall to **John O Groats** (north-east tip of Scotland) in just 35 days! It is a well-documented route known as "<u>LEJOG</u>", although he used his own knowledge and experience to vary the route occasionally.

The long-planned trip had been delayed by the Covid-19 pandemic but was meticulously planned by Ian using the latest mapping and navigation technology installed on the hired ebike. Using secondary and minor roads where necessary and canal-side and walking paths where possible the aim was to use all the senses to slowly roll through and enjoy the fascinating scenery along the way. The team displayed Kiwi silver fern flags on their bikes and this worked a treat to engage with passers-by.

Accommodation along the way had mostly been pre-booked well ahead and although variable was generally good. Inevitably, there were some memorable challenges encountered, including:

- A few mechanical issues (the experience and tools on hand were invaluable)
- 4 punctures and one blowout
- Few public toilets (especially for the females, pubs and cafes helped)
- Hosts not used to providing facilities for charging batteries
- Navigating through larger towns and cities
- One team member ever keen to explore off-route and engage locals in conversation.

#### Where is Rotary

still growing ..... Fast?

On the **Indian sub-continent** there are approximately 180,000 Rotarians spread across 4,500 clubs, a formidable force for positive change.

How are they able to do it, when we are struggling to maintain membership?

#### **ROTARY AT A GLANCE**

**Rotarians:** 1,184,368 in 36,983 clubs in 528 Districts in 221 countries/geographic areas.

**Rotaractors:** 175,505 in 10,634 clubs in 504 districts in 181 countries/geographic areas.

**Interactors:** 326,830 in 14,210 clubs in 486 districts in 144 countries/geographic areas.

**Rotary Community Corps members:** 200,615 in 13,432 clubs in 267 districts in 101 countries/ geographic areas.

As at May 12, 2024, there are 22,475 Rotary members in 975 clubs in 15 districts in Australia, and 6,286 Rotary members in 250 clubs in five districts in New Zealand and the Pacific. In addition, there are 571 Rotaract members in 47 clubs in Australia and 347 Rotaract members in 19 clubs in New Zealand and the Pacific. Australian and New Zealand districts include Nauru, Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands, Timor Leste, American Samoa, Cook Islands, Fiji, French Polynesia, Kiribati, New Caledonia, Norfolk Island, Samoa, Tonga and Vanuatu, where there are 591 Rotarians in 36 clubs and 276 Rotaractors in 13 clubs.
