Parting Thought from Jerry Payne

Nothing in life is so exhilarating as to be shot at without result.

Member's Talk from Jerry Payne

Jerry completed the talk he started in October 2023 about his experiences in the Royal New Zealand Navy. He joined up as a 17-year-old junior seaman radio operator, served on **HMNZS Royalist**, for a year, eventually rising in 1985 to the position of **Boats Officer** at the Tamaki Boatyard at Devonport, responsible for all navy vessels less than 120 feet in length. His total "fleet" was some 60 boats and a staff of 20 at Torpedo Bay in Devonport.

Of most interest were the **four 72-foot motor launches** (a type known as "**Harbour Defence Motor Launch** [**HDML**]", also used for submarine detection. These had a beam of 16 foot and a draught of 5 foot and a top speed of 10 knots powered by twin Foden diesel engines. There was a crew of 10 and cooking was carried out on a very hot oil-fired stove. Of the 486 HDMLs that were built, 332 were built in the UK, 73 in USA and the remainder were built elsewhere in the Commonwealth. **16 were allocated to NZ, all built in the USA** and shipped as deck cargo. Jerry underwent early seamanship training, longer periods on Fishery Protection duties, and many later annual exercises in the Marlborough Sounds with the Naval Reserve force on these vessels. Of the original 16 HDMLs there are 8 remaining, 2 in "original" condition.



Jerry spent a lot of time on the HDML **HMNZS Paea** and became so attached to it that he decided to build a model. Good things take time. the build started in early 1978 and was eventually finished about 1996, and it has survived two marriages! It is fully radio controlled, and all the lights work. Jerry was then asked to make another HDML model and it is a "work in progress".
