Speaker

Jean Bothwell, a retired professional nurse and nationally recognised urology specialist gave us a comprehensive overview of prostate health, including the diagnosis and treatment of [prostate cancer](#).

The basic information that everybody should be aware of:

- 1 in 8 men will get prostate cancer in their lifetime
- Early detection is critical to successful treatment
- In NZ some 10 diagnoses are made each day, 3,500 per year
- 650 die of prostate cancer per year
- From age 50-70 men should be tested annually, those with a family history earlier

Five Minute Talk from Bruce Calder

Bruce outlined his personal history including:

- Born and raised on the family farm in Central Hawkes Bay (Porangahau, Dannevirke High School)
- Studied farming at Massey University, Palmerston North
- Travelled overseas, worked as a shepherd and then farm manager, married with 2 children
- Drew a ballot farm at Matata in 1975
- Long involvement with showjumping and hunting
