Jacqui Knight on Katch Katikati activities update

Member's Talk

from Barry Denton

Barry continued the saga of his working life in the electricity generation industry. His last talk ended when he was working with Italian tunellers on the Tongariro power scheme.

Around 1973 he moved to a new position building a new power station at New Plymouth to supply increasing demand in the Wanganui region. This was originally designed to be a coal-fired plant with coal shipped from the West Coast. Around the time he took up this position oil and gas had been discovered offshore at *Maui*. It was decided to change the design and use oil from this huge new resource, which would come on-stream before gas. Barry was the engineer in charge of the construction of this steel-framed (steel imported from India) powerhouse building. The local winds were so strong one of the construction cranes blew over, damaging another building. One of Barry's challenges was managing the friction between staff of his Electricity Department and the Ministry of Works staff also on the site. Barry also had to learn new skills in public relations.

Barry's next career jump was to Huntly where he was the second person appointed to a senior on site position as construction started. His job included welcoming visits from Prime Minister Bill Rowling and opposition leader Rob Muldoon, just before an election. Other challenges included industrial relations and contract disputes.
