Speaker Carole Parker Katikati Abbeyfield House

Carole gave us an update on the project to build a new "house" on Wills Rd to provide for 14 residents. It is very suitable for older single people, particularly those who are on limited incomes and may be lonely, and need access to affordable, safe, purpose-built accommodation.



Each suite will have a self-furnished

private studio room with ensuite bathroom. Residents have access to communal areas such as the lounge, dining room, laundry, storage and garden. A housekeeper/cook will provide self-service breakfast and two main meals a day, does the household shopping and keeps the communal living areas clean and tidy.

The \$3 million project is about two thirds of the way through the fundraising stage and there are many ways to support this worthwhile initiative, including making a donation and volunteering to assist.

Five Minute Talk from John Buchanan

John was born and educated in Palmerston North. At high school he excelled in technical rather than academic subjects, leaving aged 15 to join the local branch of <u>NCR</u> as a technician. While working there the technology progressed from mechanical adding/accounting machines to vacuum tube valves, to transistors and mainframe computers.

In the 1980's he moved to the Wang computer company, including technical management roles at their offices in Papua New Guinea and Hamilton. From there he became the first computing studies tutor at the Bay of Plenty Polytechnic before setting up his own computing store in Mount Maunganui. Before moving to Ongare Point John took on building development with an apartment block in the Mount.
