# Business meeting on 14th October

### **Results of Member Survey**

Ann raised the result of a recent Member Survey on Satisfaction & Engagement, part of which called for a review of our meeting structure. As a result and, in the interim, Ann proposed to drop the 3rd meeting of each month, meaning that the 2nd Tuesday of each month will remain <u>unchanged</u> at The Hub, BYO (or having eaten earlier) with a Greeter's talk (up to 10 mins) and Board Meetings.

The 3rd Tuesday of each month will also remain <u>unchanged</u> at Fairview, a dinner meeting with Partners, friends and a guest speaker (but no Greeter's talk). And in order to secure a meal, we will still be required to opt-in by 3pm on the previous Friday.

A concern was that by dropping a meeting, there is too long a duration following the last meeting of the month and the next meeting. As a result, I will make enquiries with both Fairview and with the Lions Club in order to ascertain whether there is a viable option to move the Fairview meeting to the 2<sup>nd</sup> or the 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday of the month. The cost of using the Hub (\$80 per night) came up too, while some supported moving from The Hub to Growhub at the Katikati College. These matters will be reinvestigated and a

finer breakdown in costs will be obtained in order for everyone to fully understand what it costs to run our Club, and these questions will be able to be addressed at our next meeting at The Hub on 11 November.

#### Establishment of a Rotary Community Corp (RCC)

Paul then spoke in support of a proposal to establish a RCC and although it was moved for the Club to sponsor a Community Corp and the motion was seconded, there was sufficient concern that perhaps the Club were moving too quickly and that more information was needed. As a consequence it was decided to lay the motion on the table and for further information to be sourced and distributed amongst our members

Their Kiwi accents were a big hit. Other trips were spent exploring the national Parks of America: Yellowstone, Yosemite, Bryce Canyon, Zion, Grand Canyon, Mount Rushmore; covered bridges; the Rust Belt (and the decay as American jobs were exported overseas). The last visit, that was mentioned at the beginning started in San Francisco and the long drive up to Seattle (on country roads) ending with a cruise up to Alaska. # Computers to the Pacific Islands

John Buchanan continues to be busy upgrading computers for use in the Pacific Islands. Here are his latest achievements.

#### Fiji



Thank you for the kind donation of laptops for the communities of Fiji and the Solomon Islands. Six of the laptops went to Nasinu secondary school in Suva. The picture with me has the Deputy Principal receiving them. They were all in a box. They would be going to the senior students where they could book them in school time. Pleased would be an understatement. Nasinu Secondary school is a government school. We spent the day with this school and visited classrooms and taught lessons. The average class size was 40. The students are well cared for and they have a good plan to keep them in school – it's all about rugby:)

#### Solomon Islands

The rest of the laptops went to a small village community and to the Red Cross administrators. They are all nurses(male) and the purpose of this trip was a medical one. We as a team completed two first aid courses under the guidance of the nurses and then put some of the skills to practice. Renovating the children's ward and the female ward was a wonderful opportunity to work together with the locals. 130 kg of medical supplies were delivered to the clinic. The nurses response was overwhelming. A sustaining programme for supplies was also organised.
