23rd of September Hub Meeting Summary

Special General Meeting

President Ann went through a series of motions which were passed unanimously to rescind the old club constitution and voted in a new one plus gave the Secretary the powers to complete the process.

Greeters Talk entitled the Industrial Revolution-Chris Keightley

The Industrial Revolution meant different things to different people. For Chris' ancestors who were agricultural labourers in rural Lincolnshire, England it meant moving to New Zealand on the opposite side of the world

In June 1875 John Keightley & his wife Ellen & nine children departed their homeland on the three masted sailing ship *Chile*, knowing they would never see their homeland or their family again. The voyage took 111 days & was punctuated by one death (the cook who was by all accounts an alcoholic & on one occasion had to be fished from the sea) & there was one birth on board the ship. There were also the occasional meeting with ships going in the opposite direction & these encounters provided an opportunity to hurriedly write back home & mail would be swapped. The first sight of their new home came with the appearance of a snowclad Mt Egmont in the distance

John Keightley was the first European to establish a farm on Radnor Road at Midhirst, one of those radial roads in the Taranaki region which runs up the slopes of the mountain & with the help of neighbours would spend the next decade clearing his land whilst helping to build roads & railways during the day. Burn-offs usually took place in autumn so that seed could be planted prior to winter & in this way further land would be cleared in the following year. Hay was made in summer & cocksfoot seed gathered for the coming planting thus as at their previous home, larger families were a bonus when meeting the need for labour.

During the 1880s herd sizes grew & butter could be traded at stores for tea, flour & sugar, & cash rarely changed hands. Cooperatives between farmers later emerged, leading later to the establishment of larger premises & infrastructure such as a railway station, school, a hall, & were followed by small businesses

Average herd sizes had been around a dozen but by the 1920's were creeping up to 30 or 40. These were prosperous times for farmers & although hand milking continued to be the norm, milking machines soon began to appear

Like many, John lost family members during the first World War and at this time, his eldest son Francis moved his family & his cattle north to Matamata. One of Francis' sons was Chris' grandfather; he would have been aged 11 & the trek that would have taken them about a week

Francis' sons later took up farms between Matamata & Springdale which at that time was little more than reclaimed swamp & kauri stumps & other debris were numerous. A standing joke was that new landowners were often asked whether they had purchased their new land by the acre, or by the gallon & in fact before naming the area Sprindgdale, the name Springfield was considered but later discarded because there was already a place of that name. Another, due to the prevalence of frogs in the area was Frogmore, Springdale it became & although Chris grandfather farmed just out of Katikati here on the main road during the 2nd World War, he returned to Springdale & this is where Chris' father returned to & farmed after the war and raised a family

Community Corps

President Ann talked a little about the Rotary Clubs very on Community Corps groups. "The board are in principle okay with the concept if it is done correctly. John Dallimore spoke further on it and talked about a proposal being received rather than it being initiated by the club as a sponsoring club. If done well it has the potential to strengthen the club.

Response as follows

A **Rotary Community Corps (RCC)** is a community-based group of non-Rotarians who partner with Rotary clubs to improve their local community.

Here's how it works:

- **Membership**: Made up of local people (not necessarily Rotarians) who want to work together to solve problems and run projects in their area.
- Connection to Rotary: Each RCC is sponsored by a Rotary club, which provides guidance, support, and sometimes resources — but the RCC members plan and carry out the projects themselves.
- **Focus**: They typically work on grassroots initiatives such as literacy programs, clean water projects, health services, environmental work, or skills training.
- **Flexibility**: Unlike Rotary clubs, RCCs don't have strict meeting schedules or membership requirements; they are designed to be practical and action oriented.
- **Purpose**: To give local people ownership of development efforts, while benefiting from Rotary's wider network, expertise, and resources.

— Think of it as Rotary's way of empowering local communities to help themselves, with Rotary acting as a partner and mentor.


