The <u>Katikati Open-Air Art Inc.</u> is a community-based initiative designed to celebrate the unique identity and heritage of Katikati and the surrounding area through a mural project that would highlight specific historical, cultural and environmental influences. Since an economic downturn in the late 1990's a series of more than 100 murals and sculptures have been commissioned for display at suitable places around the town. Not all of these are on display. Having this quality art in public places materially contributes to community pride in the town and a sense of wellbeing.

#### 2. Roy Robinson

True to his fascination with things mechanical Roy spoke about the advanced electro mechanical clocks that preceded the computer age. These were powered by a electro-mechanical coil rather than a spring and could be connected by wire to any number of synchronized "slave" clocks around a business site and even control other devices such as heaters. He showed a **"Gents" master clock** representative of those used at many places such as factories, hospitals, and large railway stations.

#### Update from International Committee (Chair David Foris)

#### **Projects (in priority order)**

- 1. Complete the ongoing project (jointly with Californian clubs Mendocino and Fort Bragg) at the **Victory School of Hope** in Port Vila, Vanuatu. Proposed budget up to \$4,500.
- 2. **Give Every Child a Future**, a significant UNICEF vaccination program for children in the South Pacific Islands. Proposed budget \$700.
- 3. **Polio eradication**. Proposed budget \$700.
- 4. **Rotary NZ World Community Service** supporting partners in Fiji in their COVID crisis. Proposed budget \$600.
- 5. **International Days for Girls** sanitary kits (\$20 for a kit lasting 3 years) for schoolgirls in the South Pacific Islands. It has been clearly established that for every extra year of education there is a significant improvement in health and financial success of young women. Proposed budget \$600.
