Speaker —

Chris Morley, a leading authority on veterinary epidemiology addressed our online meeting. He is a resident of Waihi Beach.

Chris first qualified in **veterinary science** at Bristol in the U.K. His work experience covers a wide variety of work in combatting (farm) animal disease outbreaks around the world. His speciality **epidemiology** is the branch of medicine which deals with the incidence, distribution, and possible control of diseases and other factors relating to the health of animals (and plants).

It can involve: designing studies to understand a disease, testing hypotheses, disease modelling, cause & effect (e.g. of vaccination), outbreak investigation (providing intelligence to help decision makers), & managing disease control operations.

His experience includes:

- 5 years as a **practising vetinarian** in the U.K.
- The 2001-2 U.K. foot & mouth outbreak
- 2003: meat vet with NZ Food Safety Authority
- 5 years at Wallaceville investigating new disease incursions (including postgraduate qualification as an epidemiologist)
- 2008-9 in Vietnam with the FAO on bird flu
- Designing a training curriculum for Interpol on biological terrorism
- 2010-14 in Canada working on mad cow disease and other diseases, becoming Director of Animal Health for Alberta
- Fonterra/Dairy NZ as Biosecurity Manager
- 2017 became a biosecurity consultant to government & industry
- Recent work for MPI on the *Mycoplasma bovis* crisis (infographic on next page)

M. bovis is an animal welfare issue <u>not a food safety threat</u>. It doesn't affect milk or meat for human consumption and is found in the herds of New Zealand's trading partners, with **Norway now the only dairy farming country free of the organism**.



Report from Community Committee

Food Delivery Programme

The team of drivers we had assembled for collecting surplus food to be delivered to the **Katikati Food Bank** has been redeployed to effect deliveries to principally the elderly in our community who have been unable to go shopping during our Covid Level 4 lockdown.

Tessa Calder has been doing the shopping and our drivers doing the deliveries over the last couple of weeks with enquiries being channeled through the **Community Centre** team.





The Katikati COVID Community Response Group

This Ad Hoc body that was initially set up by the *Katikati Community Centre* during the COVID Level 4 lockdown last year. When the recent lockdown occurred, the group was re-activated, this time under the auspices of *Katikati Taiao*.

The group has one purpose: **to minimise suffering within the Katikati area**. During lockdown the group has been holding a daily *Zoom* meeting where community needs are addressed. Group members represent local support agencies, schools, service clubs (President Peter is a member), Katikati Advertiser, Katikati Medical Centre and the District Council.

Put simply, **problems are identified and solutions are found**. The main concerns that have been addressed during both lockdowns include **food, financial and psychosocial support** to needy families and individuals.

When comparisons are made between last year and this year's lockdowns there is good news.

This time, rapid financial support from MSD to the needy has been apparent, using trusted agencies such as Churches, Schools, Maori Wardens, Community Centre and Food Bank. Also, senior residents have been able to visit supermarkets and pharmacies. Thankfully, these two factors have meant that pressure on the response group has been much reduced during the current lockdown.
