Nigel described a recent "overseas" trip to the Republic of Whangamomona, involving a slow (max 20 km/hr) 120km railcart journey commencing at Stratford, overnight at the Whangamomona Hotel and ending at Taumaranui (once a major refreshment stop for passengers on the main trunk line). The Taranaki line was built 1900-1930 and closed in 2009, included 20 tunnels and a similar number of bridges. It was the most expensive railway per kilometre in the country.
