9th of September Hub Meeting Summary

President Ann gave a brief account of the Charitable Trust directors meeting prior to the main meeting. The editor gave a greeters talk, the members broke into committee meetings, brief reports followed. Bronwyn told tall tales and truths about the members. Secretary Chris updated members on coming events. This included the Uretara planting project which was carried out today which also involved some pampas grass stump removal, grovelling in mud with a few going for a paddle in the mighty Uretara river.

Project Parore

You may have heard of *Project Parore*. The formal name is Uretara Estuary Managers, and our very own Lawrie Donald was one of the driving forces behind it.

Their vision is simple: restore native vegetation along the streams that flow into Tauranga Harbour, so water quality improves by reducing sediment getting into the harbour which then means marine grass thrive and fish thrive.

The team prepares sites, plants natives, weeds, monitors waterways, and tackles pest plants and animals. They work with councils, the Ministry for the Environment, TECT, BayTrust. As well as paid employers there is a significant group of volunteers coordinated by a full-time manager.

The big challenge? In about 12 months, major government funding ends. While some groups might fold, Project Parore is planning to adapt by raising their own plants, building new income streams, and even taking on commercial contracts.

To support this, they needed a bigger base. After some discussions, our family trust agreed to lease them 7,000 square metres of land—a former railway embankment and kiwifruit block.

Over the last couple of months, we've been busy: putting in roads, power, water, offices, a shade house, nursery racks, irrigation, even a mural wall. The work is still underway, but meanwhile the team is also trying to get 50,000 plants in the ground by the end of this month.

It's an inspiring group, and if anyone here wants to get involved, discuss with me, Lawrie Donald or John Strongman and we will put you in touch with Sharon Strong the volunteer coordinator.

Track Building

On the local trails front I have been held up due to intense involvement with the Parore project, hopefully my focus will switch back to Tracks the following is a brief update.

- Henry Road to Rawaka Drive: Basically done. Just waiting on signage and a tidy-up of cow ruts.
- Wharawhara to Rawaka: Fencing, a small bridge, and some digger work still to go, plus planting and weeding with Regional Council and Project Parore support.
- Elmwood Road Paper Road link: Brien James and I have cleared a section between two streams. Next up, bridges and fencing. This could one day be part of a route to connect Katikati through to Pahoia.

Holiday & Riding Plans

I also spoke about trying to schedule some CT110 Postie bike rides with family and friends in New Zealand.

We are also planning routes, accommodation etc. for cycling trips next year in Tasmania and Germany.

A tractor trek is also getting closer.

I can learn a lot of good lessons from my computer teacher too. I feel so happy that I can learn computer. It will help me a lot in my study and finding a good job in my future too.
