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Thousands tackle the Eureka Climb, raising almost \$220,000 for Interplast and Whitelion




The annual Eureka Climb on Sunday, November 13, was a great success, raising almost \$220,000 for the life-changing work of Interplast and Whitelion.

Our team recommended that she be brought to Australia for more complex surgery, and we referred her to our friends at Children First Foundation .

Thanks to surgery she received in Australia, Angel is now happy and home with her family.

What we've been up to during November



During November we delivered 10 program activities across the Asia Pacific and in Australia. In PNG, a small team travelled throughout the Freida River region in partnership with PanAust to assess patients in remote communities who require plastic and reconstructive surgery. Patients will be supported to travel to one of the hospitals on the north coast of PNG in 2017 to be treated by a visiting Interplast surgical team. Pictured here is Interplast surgeon Russell, assessing a local community member in the village of Ok Isai.

In Bhutan, a plastic and reconstructive and hand surgery and training visit ran alongside a hand therapy mentoring program in Thimphu. In Kiribati, a general plastic and reconstructive surgical team delivered a two-week surgical program, complemented by a nurse education visit. In Fiji, a small surgical mentoring team spent one week in Suva, delivering training to the local surgeons, anaesthetists and nurses, including specific burns nurse education. Finally, we supported two surgeons, one from Nepal and one from Bangladesh, to undertake a professional development and training visit to Australia.
