A little information about tonight's guest speaker

Past District Governor and current Chair of the Australian Rotary Health Board, Stephen Humphreys

We're fortunate that Stephen has kindly agreed to be our guest speaker this evening as he is currently the Chair and has been a Director of Australian Rotary Health since September 2018 ... This is relevant because ARH has a direct role in supporting mental health research... a focus of tonight's meeting.

Stephen joined the Rotary Club of Camden in 2002 he has served as Club President in 2008-2009; Chair of the Peace Studies Sub-Committee of the District 9750; Foundation Committee in 2009-10; and served as an Assistant Governor for three years from 2010 to 2012. He Chaired the District 9750 Conference Committee in 2012 and became District Governor (9675) 2016-17.

Last week's meeting minutes: Scribe – Kerrie Hayes-Williams

- **Sergeant Ken Potter** was in charge and started the meeting with precision!
- The reflection and international toast were given by **Kerrie Hayes-Williams**. A deliberation on the significant and urgent need to focus on *embracing diversity*, *empathy and understanding*, *fostering respect and valuing human dignity* given the escalating conflict and loss of human life, property and possessions in the Middle East was offered. The *international toast* was given to those **Rotary clubs in the Middle East** where war pervades and the energy to continue facing the challenge of building peaceful and sustaining relationships.
- ♣ President Rose Pope welcomed members and our past member and speaker Stephen Swan. Rose spoke to the following points:
 - The Train Ride for Polio is on 24 October. Anyone interested in joining the ride and would like to purchase a t-shirt, see Rose.
 - Rose and her daughter will be helping to plant trees (as part of the Adopt-A-Tree project) in Mittagong on 9 November and invited interested members and families to join her.
 - Green Connect is closing their Op Shop at the University of Wollongong on 21 October and the Unanderra store on 2 November and offering a 50% discount on all their goods. Ultimately, with the closing of these stores it could impact financially on monies available to support their farm.
 - There has been a request from the Homeless Hub for our support in gathering refundable bottles for recycling. There is a container to be filled, and Rose has the details. Monies raised will go towards buying Christmas presents for children.
 - At the last Board meeting, Dennis Simpson proposed that our Club donate to the Vocational Education and Training Awards. The Board agreed to support the event (2 x \$500 donations), which has elevated our Club to being a gold sponsor. This event will be held at Kembla Grange however, our Club needs to provide banner to be present at the Awards. Rose Pope asked members to consider being part of a group who could design a banner to reflect our Rotary Club. There is a short turn-around and the banner needs to be available by 14 November. Please consider helping with the discussion so that we can present the banner at the Awards.

- **↓** Welfare Report: Jim Christensen spoke on behalf of Anne who is unwell herself:

 - Marilyn Phillips is recovering from a knee replacement.
- **Treasurer Noel Watt** presented an account of funds raised through the Charles raffle, the last BBQ and the donation tin.
- ♣ Phil Peckman noted that SAHSSI (Supported Accommodation & Homelessness Services Shoalhaven Illawarra) is opening their new facility in Gwynneville. Over several years our Club has donated to this cause and as a result we have completed several rooms. A plaque noting our sponsorship will be placed outside a room to acknowledge our support.
- **★ Ken Potter** explained that *RYDA* (*Rotary Youth Driver Awareness*) in on <u>21 and 22 October</u> and <u>asked for help in setting up at 8.30 am and cleaning up at the completion of the event. <u>Please see Ken for details</u>.</u>
- ♣ Our guest speaker, Stephen Swan presented an interesting and engaging account of his caravan holiday of 10 months exploring 30,000kms of Australian land including Queensland, Western Australia, South Australia and Victoria. Special highlights included:
 - Seeing whales at the Head of Bight in South Australia where a 100 of whales are seen between May and October was worthwhile. 2% of these whales turn grey from white.



• *Ningaloo Reef in Western Australia* is world heritage listed and is 300 kms from Carnarvon. Stephen snorkelled spotted individually catalogued sharks, which was a great experience.





• Karijini National Park presented a breathtaking landscape with cavernous gorges like Dales Gorge, white-barked gumtrees, clear water pools, red wall cliffs and the Fortescue Waterfalls. The wildflowers are the largest collection on earth. Stephen also noted whilst travelling in this area the impressive road trains that were 50-60 meters in length.

Travelling to *Paronella Park (pictured below)* down from Innisfail in Queensland contrasted to other areas. A Spanish immigrant Paronella worked for 11 years creating his wealth by buying, improving and selling cane farms. He discovered a virgin forest alongside Mena Creek Falls and built his dream home in the 1930s. In its day it was a majestic home and castle with a 47-step staircase, tennis courts, and a movie theatre transformed into a ballroom on weekends with live bands who entertained while a massive mirror ball spun from the ceiling to reflect pink and blue lights. More than 7,000 trees were planted around the home and castle including an avenue of Kauris. In 1933 Paronella installed a hydro-electric plant, the first (privately owned) in Queensland, on the waterfall in the park. He also used it to supply power for the park's lighting, pumps, refrigeration and cinema. Paronella Park is eco-certified, and heritage listed. Interestingly, in 2009 the park completed a restoration of the plant and now runs entirely off hydro-electric power which some of the excess electricity is fed back into the local grid.





• Cobbold Gorge in QLD was inviting with a stunning forest and a glass bridge built across the Gorge.







• The spectacular *Undara Lava Tubes*, located in the grassland south-west of Cairns were a sight to see. They are the largest lava tubes in the world and only taken with organised tours.



Estimated to have formed approximately 190,000 years ago the lava flow covered 1550 square kilometres of north Queensland. The lava tubes were formed when the outer layer formed a crust which protected the still-molten lava which continued to flow as though it was in a tube Geologists believe that the length of 160 km is the longest lava flow from any single volcano on earth. It is estimated that the whole process took between 2-3 weeks with the lava flowing at a rate of around 500 metres per hour.

- A visit to the must-see Daintree Forest in Queensland
 which is the world's oldest tropical rainforest by 10
 million years. The cyclone last Christmas however has
 left a lot of damage.
- Cooktown presented beautiful heritage buildings and reflected the history of the 30,000 people attending the gold fields in 1973. Today the population is 2,600.
 - Both Rose Pope and Kerrie Hayes-Williams thanked Stephen for his presentation that reflected some of his memorable ventures and gave members an insight into parts of Australia many have not seen.



- ♣ Phil Peckman took members through a demonstration of ClubRunner, namely, how to log on, review our Club's calendar of events, access the Bulletin, Board meeting and Club Assembly minutes, speakers, and charities.
- The Raffle winners were Mal Bracken and Ken Potter.







- ♣ **Ken Potter, our poet orator**, gave us an entertaining rendition of a *Charlie Marshall poem, 'Pontiff's Eyes'* which he presented at the *Murrurundi King of the Ranges festival* recently. Ken is a great story teller and had members engaged in the yarn of a man, a barber and a trip to Rome. Well done Ken you are a <u>legend!!</u>
- ♣ In closing the meeting, Rose Pope reminded members that this week our Club meeting is focused on Australian Rotary Health – Hat Day with an open invitation for partners and friends to attend.


