

The Pride of Workmanship is one of the greatest intangible assets in our society. This Program encourages favourable employer/employee relationships and a sense of community spirit as well as a sense of pride in individual achievements.

Most of the Club's community service work is channelled through the "Centro Comunitario Rotary International de Cancun", which is a community centre established by the Club in a working class neighbourhood to provide medical and dental consultations, vocational education, literacy education, aerobics classes and an area for university students to assist local residents with legal advice and information relating to home design and construction techniques.

As mentioned last Wednesday evening, Maddy Lawson (Australian Rotary Health's [ARH] Indigenous Scholar whom our Club sponsored over 2023 – 2024), has successfully completed her Master of Public Health with academic results in the Distinction/High Distinction range. A copy of her final report to ARH & our Club is appended below for the information of members & friends.

Semester 2 Reflection - Madeleine Lawson

Reflecting on my second semester of the second year of my master's degree, I continue to feel grateful for the support provided by the Rotary Club scholarship. This semester has been and rewarding, and I have had the opportunity to explore a wide range of topics within public health that have expanded my knowledge and skills.

One of the key highlights of this semester was my coursework in Public Health Methods, which provided an overview of a range of methods commonly used in public health practice. This included qualitative inquiry, evaluation, survey methods, and risk assessment. The diversity of these approaches broadened my understanding of how public health research and practice are carried out in different settings. Learning how to assess risks, evaluate interventions, and interpret qualitative data has strengthened my research skills and will help in my future work, especially in my role as a policy officer. This subject has also highlighted the importance of applying the right methods to specific public health challenges and the role of evidence-based practices in policy-making.

In addition, I found Health Economics, Policy and Promotion to be the most engaging subject this semester. The course focused on the complex interplays of social, economic, environmental, and institutional factors and their influence on health outcomes. I was particularly interested in examining how an accessible, well-managed health care system can play a critical role in the prevention and management of sickness and also protecting and promoting population health. A key area of focus was comparing the health and health system effects of various strategies, evaluating how the best alternatives are chosen and financed given the constraints on resources. This subject was particularly relevant to my career, as it helped me better understand the broader context of health policy and the importance of making cost-effective, equitable decisions that enhance system performance.

Another important component of my semester was the MPH Capstone subject, where we explored a range of public health issues from interdisciplinary perspectives. This subject was largely student-led and focused on independent and collaborative study. Although challenging at times, I thoroughly enjoyed the group work. It gave me an opportunity to engage with peers from different disciplines and backgrounds, allowing for discussions and diverse viewpoints on the issues we were studying.

Outside of my studies, I also had the opportunity to again attend another Rotary dinner in Wollongong. It was wonderful to reconnect with other scholarship recipients and share my academic journey with the Rotary Club members. I enjoyed hearing about the current research that is happening at UOW.

Thank you once again for your ongoing support. I am excited to finish my master's degree and take the next steps in my career, equipped with a wealth of knowledge and the skills to make a meaningful impact in the field of public health.
