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President's Report

It was with immense pride that the Rotary Club of Ingleburn were selected as the '*Community Group Initiative of the Year*' at the Campbelltown City Council Australia Day Awards.

Below is the nomination that I submitted.

The Rotary Club of Ingleburn has served the local community since 1977. In 2024-2025 it received a Rotary Club Excellence Award for its ongoing commitment to improving lives locally, nationally, and internationally. The club recognises employees with Pride of Workmanship Awards, student Service and Leadership Awards and the youth who support our projects.

The club has a strong IngleMinds – Mental Health and Wellbeing -Committee with a focus on youth, the elderly, and the homeless. This year we ran an RU OK community event at two local shopping centres giving out two hundred information packs.

We work closely with Minto Gardens Retirement Village organising events such as craft and health workshops. The residents support our projects such as the Gifts of Hope and the hampers for local families.

We pride ourselves on being sponsors to fight cancer, recognise young artists and local youth, and join with other Macarthur Clubs to recognise First Responders, the Police, and Mental Health – Lift the Lid.

What is their greatest achievement?

A range of providers place homeless families into temporary accommodation. We have been supporting a local motel. As a club, we have taken on the role of providing cooked meals and breakfast packs, care and mess packs, clothing and shoes, and other necessities until permanent accommodation is provided.

We support children with a book and a toy on arrival, Easter eggs, sports and play equipment for the holidays, and they are included in our Gifts of Hope Program.

When they are offered permanent accommodation, we provide household items and furniture. To date seventeen families have been supported.

We have expanded our project to include two local refuges, and a women’s 55+ shelter in Glenfield.

We have strong community support which includes local clubs, retirement villages (4), Probus Clubs (4), schools, businesses, churches, medical centres, and other non-profit organisations.

This ongoing support has allowed us to do what Rotarians do, make a difference.

Thank you to Barry Woolfe for attending the ceremony and accepting the award on behalf of the Rotary Club of Ingleburn.

JANUARY: WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE MONTH



March is designated by Rotary International as Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) Month, focusing on improving global access to clean water, proper sanitation, and hygiene education to prevent disease. It highlights the need for sustainable water management and infrastructure, with Rotary investing over \$148 million in WASH projects.

Key aspects of this observance include:

- * **Purpose:** To address that one in three people worldwide lack access to clean water and to promote health, particularly in developing areas.
- * **Focus Areas:** Projects focus on providing sustainable, clean drinking water, building sanitation facilities, and improving hygiene practices.
- * **Impact:** Efforts during this month, and throughout the year, help reduce the spread of infectious diseases like polio and cholera.
- * **Rotary Initiatives:** Clubs worldwide engage in projects, such as those seen with the Rotary



Club of Geelong East, to provide, for instance, clean water access in rural Ghana, improving school attendance.

This month aligns with the broader goal of ensuring the availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all by 2030.

Clean water, sanitation, and hygiene education are basic necessities for a healthy environment and a productive life.

When people have access to clean water and sanitation, waterborne diseases decrease, children stay healthier and attend school more regularly, and mothers can spend less time carrying water and more time helping their families.

HOW ROTARY MAKES HELP HAPPEN

Through water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) programs, Rotary’s people of action mobilise resources, form partnerships, and invest in infrastructure and training that yield long-term change.

➤ *Making schools healthier*

All 24 of Lebanon’s Rotary clubs came together — overcoming religious, cultural, and political divisions — to form partnerships with the government, World Vision, UNICEF, and the Red Cross. Together the groups developed a program that delivers clean water to every public school in the country.



➤ *Water for a community*

Rotary clubs partnered with local organisations to install a rainwater harvesting and distribution centre for 4,000 people in Papua New Guinea. They also delivered training programs for women in the community and students in 35 schools.



WASH in Guatemala schools

Rotary clubs in Guatemala improved conditions for as many as 1,793 children in 10 schools in the town of Escuintla by providing toilets, washing stations, water tanks, and training.



Water supply in Tanzania

A dozen Rotary clubs collaborated with local partners to establish a water supply and delivery system for 1,500 people in the village of Kigogo, Tanzania. They also taught the community how to maintain the systems and provided hygiene education.



➤ *Access to toilets in the Philippines*

Rotary clubs and partners built 222 toilets, six rainwater collectors, seven communal handwashing stations, and 20 bio-sand filters. The project provided more than 1,000 people with access to proper toilet facilities and almost 600 people with a regular supply of clean water.



OUR IMPACT ON WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE

The Rotary Foundation is changing the world by providing grants for projects and activities around the globe and in your own backyard:

WASH Global Grant Projects

Since 2013, The Rotary Foundation has invested in more than \$130 million in over 2000 projects worldwide.

Through this investment, our volunteers of action have improved access to safely managed and basic WASH services to communities, schools and healthcare facilities, while protecting and conserving water resources.

Rotary-USAID WASH Partnership

Rotary, and the United States Agency for International Development (USAID), assist communities and governments to plan, finance, and deliver safe water, sanitation and hygiene services, while sustainably managing water resources.

- * **\$24** is all it takes to provide one person with safe water,
- * **123 schools in Ghana** have gained access to basic sanitation and hygiene services due to the Rotary-USAID partnership,
- * **\$148 million** is the amount The Rotary Foundation has invested in water, sanitation, hygiene and water resource management interventions globally.

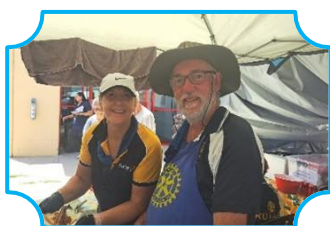

There is only one thing that I have possessed in any unusual degree and that has been an abiding faith and quite a considerable degree of determination.

IngleMinds changes lives

SUPPORTING HOMELESS PEOPLE

We have focussed on supporting homeless people who are in temporary accommodation through care packs, meals, mental health information, and children's welcome books and toys.

This has been through temporary motel type accommodation and refuges. We have been able to expand our reach to two refuges catering for women and children, and a women’s shelter for those over 55 years of age.

This has been made possible with the generous Club Funds from The Sherwood Macarthur and the Ingleburn RSL Club. The support and action from Rotary Club members with working bees, and cooking days, increasing volume of what we can achieve.



A huge thank you to Confident Care who recently donated 1,500 amenity packs containing personal care items. A convoy of vehicles collected and delivered these to storage. A mammoth task with thanks to Gail, Brian, Carolyn, Beth, Debbie, and Frank’s work van. We will ensure these packs go to those that need them.



Julie-Anne Carroll, and Jenny Woolfe, have now taken leadership of the breakfast program assembling, and delivering, 100 breakfast packs per month.



Our latest Friend of Rotary, Christina, has jumped straight in providing donations of pantry items to the residents of Glenfield House so that they can cook for themselves. The picture shows new case support worker, Kat, receiving much needed food for the residents.

The IngleMinds Team Members met with Uniting Doorways who provide support for Men with Families in Macarthur. They also provide case management for families who are homeless and help with them moving into permanent accommodation.

Through our furniture and household items program we have been able to help set up two homes with essential items. This takes our impact to 19 homes/ families in 18 months. The community donations and support of this program have been amazing.



Ken and Lynn Barnard have now taken leadership of this program using their experience in real estate and life to ensure we continue to provide this practical help to the community. Ken is in the process of building a volunteer list of people who can tow a trailer, and those who have muscle to help move the furniture.

MINTO GARDENS RETIREMENT VILLAGE

Our support of Minto Gardens Retirement Village wellbeing continues to thrive.



Craft workshops, and health talks, occur monthly. The benefits of connection, creativity, and expanding personal health knowledge, are noticeable. Rotarians and Friends of Rotary are a common feature of the village.



High Tea at Minto Gardens Retirement Village this year will be Easter themed on Thursday, 2 of April. Jenny, and JulieAnne, with Beth, are coordinating this event, and welcome volunteers to assist. Joining the volunteers this year is resident, and master scone maker, Sue, who is already practising her chef skills.

The residents and the IngleMinds Team use any profits made to support community and Rotary projects. Last year we were able to fund one year of the Dolly Parton Imagination Library. This year we hope to provide funds to Shelter Box so that the attendees see that making a difference on a global scale through Rotary is possible.
