## DAWN OF THE LEGEND: THE ANZAC SPIRIT

The legend of ANZAC was born on 25 April 1915, and was re-affirmed in eight months' fighting on Gallipoli. Although there was no military victory, the Australian and New Zealand forces displayed great courage, endurance, initiative, discipline, and mateship. Such qualities came to be known as the ANZAC Spirit.

Many saw the ANZAC Spirit as having been born of egalitarianism, and mutual respect. According to the stereotype, the ANZAC rejected unnecessary restrictions, possessed a sardonic sense of humour, was contemptuous of danger, and proved himself the equal of anyone on the battlefield.

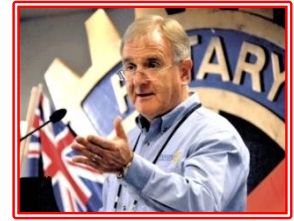
Australians still invoke the ANZAC Spirit in times of conflict, danger, and hardship.

# VALE, Rotarian, Bob Aitken



Rotary is a sadder place, having lost Rotarian Bob Aitken, AM JP on 21 April 2024.

Bob was a proud Rotarian who spent 27 of years “flying the flag” as Managing Editor of Rotary Down Under; this saw him well prepared to enjoy the role of Executive Director of Rotary Down Under Inc, specialising in public relations and corporate development in his final three years as leader of the Rotary region’s premier media organisation.

In addition to running Bob Aitken Media, his own media company, he had been Chairman of Rotary District 9685 Polio Committee, the Rotary International (RI) ‘End Polio Now’ Coordinator for Zone 8, and Chairman of the RI Zone 8 History and Archives Committee and, as such, he had charge of planning, researching and writing the ‘Centenary of Rotary in Australia: 1927-2021.

Among an extraordinarily long list of achievements and awards, Bob is a multiple Paul Harris Fellow, a recipient of RI’s ‘Service Above Self’ award, and the Australian Rotary Health Medal, a member of the Rotary Club of the Lower Blue Mountains, former District Governor (DG) District 9690 / 9685, Project Manager NSW Graffiti Removal Day, and Chairman of Graffiti Removal Australia. He was a Life Member of the NSW Parents and Teachers Association as a result of 10 years of leadership at Parkes and Blaxland High Schools.

Bob was a world traveller for Rotary and it was no surprise his love and passion for the organisation would ensure his ongoing involvement after retirement.

Born in Parkes in 1945, Bob lived with his family on a wheat and sheep farm 10 miles west of Parkes. His education commenced at a one-teacher school in the small village of Nelungaloo. Later the family moved into Parkes, and Bob continued his education at Parkes PS and Parkes HS, excelling in sport rather than academics and, in doing so, setting his life on its amazing journey through sports.

In 1963, Bob accepted a cadetship in journalism with the Parkes Champion Post. He became editor in 1969 and Managing Editor in 1972. In 1984, on accepting the role as Editor of Rotary Down Under (RDU) (*which included Australia, New Zealand and the surrounding Pacific Islands*), the Aitken family moved to Lapstone; with Bob being a member of the Rotary Club of the Lower Blue Mountains.

The RDU magazine flourished under Bob’s guidance, moving from B&W to a colour edition, then to an online digital production. Bob also organised a fund-raising appeal, which not only purchased Rotary Down Under House in Parramatta, but also secured the financial future of the magazine.

Bob completed two terms as Chairman of the Rotary World Magazine Press Advisory Group (31 magazines in 24 languages), was advisor to the RI Board of Directors in that time. He had also previously served as 2-terms as Chairman of the RI Communications Committee, and 4-terms as General Coordinator of the RI Public Image Resource Group, along with many other RI special committee groups. He was Vice-Chair of the Host Organisation Committee for the RI Convention in Sydney in 2014.

Bob was the Media Manager for Hockey at the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games and in 2007, was named a Member (AM) in the General Division of the Order of Australia Queen’s Birthday Honours List – for services to sport and the community through Rotary.

Sport was an essential component in Bob’s life, and he not only played many different sports, e.g. first-grade cricket, but also served on numerous committees and organisations. Bob was keen to advance both the respective sport, and the athletes who competed in them. Bob was a Life Member of the NSW Hockey Association.

Bob is survived by his wife, Ann. They were married in 1967 and have two children, David, and Corrina, and three grandchildren. Our sincere condolences to them on their loss. VALE, Bob Aitken – Rotary is grateful for your service.

Rotary's programs are developing the next generation of leaders, providing funding to make the world a better place, and making peace a priority.

New Generations is Rotary's 5th Avenue of Service and comes in a variety of forms throughout our District and the Rotary world - including: [Rotaract](#), [Interact](#), [Rotary](#)

[Youth Exchange](#) and [Rotary Youth Leadership Awards](#).

**INTERACT**

Interact is a Rotary-sponsored service club comprised of 14–18-year-olds. Interact gives young people the opportunity to take part in fun, meaningful service projects. Along the way, Interactors develop their leadership skills and initiative while meeting new friends. Members exchange ideas, opinions, and plan with other talented, energetic people, in an atmosphere free from negative pressures and distraction. Interact strives to promote student leadership, local volunteer service, and to make members aware of the many global and world issues that affect people every day.

Ultimately, students can:

- \* Become acquainted with a premiere service organisation (Rotary International), and proven leaders from communities throughout Rotary;
- \* Learn how to manage, and head community service projects;
- \* Learn about other Rotary club programs including Rotaract (service club for young adults), Earlyact (a service club for primary school students), youth exchange (a chance to live and study abroad), and RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards).

The word Interact stands for "international action" and, today, there are more than 10,700 clubs in 109 countries.

**ROTARACT**

Rotaract is a Rotary-sponsored service club for young people aged 18-30. Rotaract clubs are usually community, or university-based, and are sponsored by a local Rotary club; making them true "partners in service" and key members of the Rotary family.

Young adults augment their knowledge and skill, and also address the physical and social needs of their communities while promoting international understanding and peace through a framework of friendship and service. Rotaractors also often spearhead the formation of Interact clubs and participate in RYLA.

Rotaract is one of the fastest-growing programs of Rotary service with more than 9,500 Rotaract Clubs with 291,000 members in 177 countries.

Rotaractors follow the motto "fellowship through service".

## ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE

Rotary Youth Exchange is an excellent and inexpensive way for high school age students to travel and study in a foreign country.

Youth exchange gives the participant the opportunity to improve their language skills, and school and family experiences will teach them the culture of their host country. They also act as ambassadors for their home country.

Each year the Rotary Districts that are part of CSRYE send approximately 300 young people to other countries and accept 300 young people from other countries in return.

Accepting a youth exchange student into your club, community, and household can be a very rewarding experience. It's an opportunity for you, your family and your fellow Rotarians to learn about a different culture, and also help a young person understand your culture. The goal of Rotary Youth Exchange is to promote the advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace at the person-to-person level.

## ROTARY YOUTH LEADERSHIP AWARDS (RYLA)

Each year thousands of young people take part in the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) programs worldwide. Young people are chosen for their leadership potential to attend a seminar, camp, or workshop to discuss leadership skills, and to learn those skills through practice. RYLA aims to:

- \* Demonstrate Rotary's respect and concern for youth;
- \* Provide an effective training experience for selected youth and potential leaders;
- \* Encourage leadership of youth by youth; and
- \* Recognise publicly young people who are rendering service to their communities.

Started in Queensland in 1959, and officially adopted by Rotary International in 1971, the RYLA program enables young people to debate issues of professional responsibility and human relations, improve leadership and communication skills, learn about businesses or institutions, and meet Rotarians, while having fun and making friends.

For participants, RYLA provides the opportunity to refine skills, and explore pertinent topics with peers and elders; for Rotarians, RYLA offers the chance to help develop leaders, share valuable expertise and bridge the gap between generations.

RYLA can help lead to the strengthening and formation of Interact and Rotaract clubs and can be used as a recruiting tool for youth exchange.

# Rotary Foundation

A Rotary International Article I recently read:

## Polio Eradication – Where does the money go?

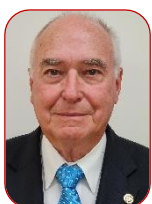
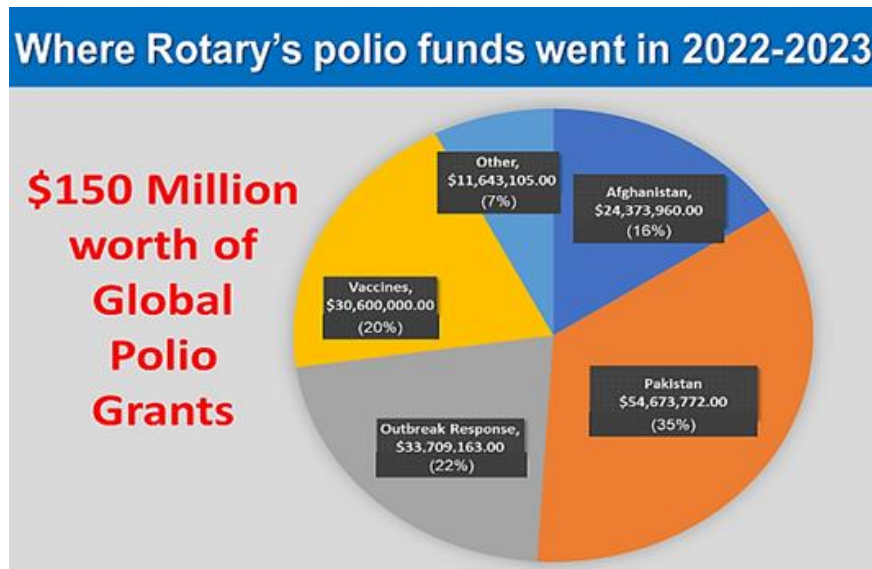
Each year, Rotary members organise events, hold special club meetings, seek media publicity, and encourage donations from Rotarians and non-Rotarians alike to reach our annual End Polio fundraising goal of US \$50 million per year. Raising \$50 million enables us to maximise the 2:1 match from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Is it worth our while going to all this trouble to raise \$150 million? How does Rotary spend this money?

The End Polio funds, raised by Rotarians, are used to support the activities of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) and are targeted at the geographical areas of greatest need. Expenditure is not only used to provide polio vaccines, but also to fund polio vaccinators and vital disease surveillance activities.

Each year, Rotary’s International Polio Committee determines how the \$150 million will be spent. Most of our funds are channelled through the World Health Organisation and UNICEF, the implementing partners of the GPEI.

As can be seen from the accompanying pie chart, in 2022-23, Rotary funds supported polio eradication efforts in the two endemic countries of Afghanistan and Pakistan. Funds also supported polio outbreak response activities and vaccines in many countries in Africa and the Eastern Mediterranean Region including Chad, Ethiopia, Zambia, and Somalia, to name a few.

The “other” category represents Rotary support for surveillance, research, and technical experts at the World Health Organisation.

An extract from an interesting and inspiring Rotary International article, we read:

### Using 'kit culture' to attract young volunteers

Many of us are familiar with new trends emerging in the volunteering landscape: trends such as the rise of cause-based and episodic volunteering, the push for greater flexibility, and more meaningful volunteering roles.

Another trend, starting to feature in the research, is the rise of 'kit culture' – for example, packing kits for the homeless, wrapping Christmas gifts, or writing advocacy letters to petition government.

'Kit culture' refers to the practice of providing quick and easy 'pre-packaged' volunteering solutions which enables, mainly younger, people express their social conscience in ways that are consistent with their 'right-now' lives. While the trend may be newly reported, 'kit culture' volunteering has been around for quite some time.

Packaging up some of our meaningful volunteering activities may be another way that Rotary clubs can regularly engage with younger volunteers, maybe not as members, but rather as a pathway to membership further down the track.

However, for 'kit culture' to be effective, clubs also need to have the right marketing, communication, registration, and supervision processes wrapped around these opportunities. Technology, social media, and a bit of youthful savvy will likely hold the key.

For Rotary to have a future in this area, we need to continue to adapt, and leverage these changing volunteer trends: capitalising on the rise of them may need to be part of the club's tool kit.

In our community there are many people who are homeless, and these include children. Homelessness can manifest itself in a number of ways including: staying with extended family, sleeping in cars, sleeping rough, and being placed in temporary accommodation.

Homelessness inflicts profound and lasting effects on children, often robbing them of stability and security during critical developmental years. It jeopardises physical, and mental well-being, with increased risks of trauma.

During the month of April The Rotary Club of Ingleburn was able to reach out to over 30 children who are without a home.



We delivered toys, sporting goods, and games so that during the school holidays the children were able to socialise and remain positively engaged.

The Rotary Easter Bunny delivered bags of eggs and replicas of themselves making a moment of unexpected joy and excitement for the children.



While not solving the world’s problems, we certainly made a small difference to local children who are without a home, letting them know that they are not forgotten, and that the community does care.
