
THIRD: The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

The RI Board encourages fellowships groups to highlight activities through projects, activities, and events in celebration of "Rotary Fellowships Month" in

June. What Is our Rotary Club doing to focus on Rotary Fellowships in the month of June 2024 or anytime of the year for that matter?

Rotary Fellowships are groups of Rotary members, spouses, Friends of Rotary, and Rotaractors who i) share a common interest in recreational activities, sports, hobbies, or professions, ii) further their vocational development with others in the same profession or field, and iii) enhance their Rotary experience by exploring new opportunities and making connections around the world.

Rotary Fellowships provide a chance to make lasting friendships with people outside your club. Fellowships must have active members in at least five countries and may include Rotarians, Rotarians' family members, Friends of Rotary, Rotaractors, Alumni, and program participants.

Rotary Foundation

Reviewing some of the Foundation Moments that can be shared by Rotarians through newsletters:

Foundation Moment 1:

The Rotary Foundation plans for the future, not just for today, and helps put ideas into action. In the words of Arch Klump, RI President 1916-17:

'Rotary has assumed a great obligation to the world – its opportunities are limitless, but its income today, and of tomorrow, will never permit it to do the many things which it could, and should do. We are reminded of these three facts:

- 1. Money alone does little good
- 2. Individual service is helpless without money
- 3. The two together can be a godsend to civilisation'.

Foundation Moment 2:

What are District Designated Funds (DDF)?

DDF allows Rotary Districts to set their own funding priorities.

After deducting 5% for administration costs, contributions that donors in a District make to the Annual Fund SHARE and the Endowment Fund SHARE are shared equally between the District as DDF, and the Foundation's World Fund.

After being invested for three years, the District can use DDF in many ways, such as funding for District Grants and Global Grants, as well as support for PolioPlus and Disaster Response.

This formula makes The Rotary Foundation an integral part of Rotary in our communities.

Following are recent actions the IngleMinds Team have been involved with:

APRIL FALLS DAY

IngleMinds Team members attended the Minto Gardens '*April Falls Day*' helping residents understand the impact of their physical health preventing falls.

Stef, using her extensive knowledge, was a keynote speaker. Stef, Devendra, and Carolyn offered blood pressure readings for residents and staff.

Feedbacks from the event indicated that the 50 attendees took away practical information and are committed to taking care of their health to prevent falls and injury.

HIDDEN HOMELESS CARE PACKS

When people arrive to temporary accommodation while awaiting housing, they do so with limited resources. On what can be a very difficult day for men, women, and children we reach out to show care and understanding through providing bags of essential items including toiletries and some clothing.

To date, we have provided 90 care packs: 40 female, 40 male, and 10 children. We aim to continue this project and increase the number of children packs.

Feedback from the Manager of the accommodation indicated that the packs help lift spirits, and lets people know they are not forgotten.

We are currently collecting quality winter clothes and accessories to donate. It is proposed that these are delivered and displayed on 1 June; the first day of winter. Residents in the temporary accommodation will be able to select what they need to keep themselves, and their children, warm during the cold months.

A **local walk** with a stop at a good coffee shop is planned for **November**. This will be held on a weekend so most can join in the fun.




