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President's Report

YEAR 2023-2024 REPORT

This year has been different from a President perspective where President Vanessa Olsen resigned as President through ill health, and I was appointed from 1 February 2024 to complete the year. On taking over, I went overseas for a month, so my main objective was to ensure the governance issues were covered, support the existing Project Plan, and support the President-Elect, Gail Taylor, in her quest to set up for her year so as to affect a smooth transition.

This newsletter predominantly reflecting on the past year, however, before I do that, I will comment on the highlights of June.

A few of our commitments in June:

An enjoyable part of any Rotary year is the annual changeover; we celebrate the past year, and welcome in the new President and their team. This year Tuesday, 9 July is set for our club's celebration.

The year in review......

It has been an exciting year but a unique experience to my previous times as President, due to the fill-in nature.

I will not make specific comments on projects as they are covered in each of the Director reports included later in the newsletter.

For me, one of the goals was to promote Rotary, which appears to have been achieved by newspaper stories, Facebook which has seen increased activity, and an ever-growing number of followers, as well as the Ingle Angle, our newsletter, increasing in circulation.

Another goal was to form community partnerships; while not a complete success, we have a number of organisations where we have a two-way flow of support.

We continued with existing projects as well as adding new innovative projects to the mix in this Rotary year:

• Last year, the first Combined Macarthur Rotary Clubs to run the inaugural 'First Responders Awards' evening; the success then supported its continuation as an annual project.

• The annual 'Police Officer of the Year' project by the Combined Macarthur Rotary Clubs continues and is closely linked to the First Responders Awards. Its success continues to be a highlight for both Police Officers and Rotary.

- The breakfast bacon and egg burgers at the monthly Campbelltown 'Vintage Car Show'.
- Again, we ran a *Mental Health First Aid* Course.
- Supporting the eight Macarthur Rotary Clubs in chartering a new Rotaract Club; it is on track to get chartered early in the new Rotary year.
- Were successful with a Community Grant to fund equipment for tutoring socially disadvantaged children. The Silver Coin Project was the beneficiary of these funds.
- Last year a relationship was established with a Retirement Living and Residential Aged Care facility, this relationship has grown; one of the projects which I believe is most beneficial, is the monthly *Health Talks* presented by a Doctor and two Nurses, all Rotary members.
- The purchase of the *ClubRunner* platform for our website, which is currently being built. The advantage being it contains our member database and updates, which in turn flow up to the District and Rotary International member databases. It also has the ability to support club activities. Additionally, in the 'Member Section', folders can be setup for Board Minutes, financial documents, and year-end financial reports etc. We now have a central repository for whatever we want to retain.
- The on-going major projects like our involvement in Ingleburn Alive Festival, 24-Hour Fight Against Cancer Macarthur, Fisher's Ghost Art Awards, Gifts of Hope Project at Christmas; all major club events.



Special mention to the Mental Health Committee that continue to expand their reach in bringing on new projects.

Also, a thank you to the Social Committee who have developed a forward calendar with monthly social events circulated early; so everyone can now forward plan.

I thank the Board members for their support and dedication over the last 12-month; they are integral in making our club vibrant with their sage advice.

In respect of our club's membership, you have each inspired me in some way and I thank you, as you have, each in your own way, been a substantial part of a successful year.

Finally, to the non-Rotarian partners who have been an important part in our success. Christine, our Ingle Angle Editor, has compiled a newsy and informative newsletter where it not only informs members, but promotes Rotary and what it is doing in the community; and also Jenny, on the Social Committee, she has greatly contributed to this Committee with ideas for many of our activities, as well as being the Minutes Secretary for their many meetings. Excellent jobs, well done. There are many other partners who have contributed in several ways, and I extend our sincere thanks to them.

Lastly, I wish President-Elect Gail Taylor every success as she takes over the presidency; she will be an innovative and progressive President. As I congratulate her, I volunteer my support and know all members

are looking forward to the coming year.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT 2024-25

STEHANIE A URCHICK

Stephanie A Urchick, of the Rotary Club of McMurray, Pennsylvania, USA, is the President of Rotary International for 2024-25, a decision that makes her only the second woman to hold that position.

Announcing that the 2024-25 presidential theme is *The Magic of Rotary*, she called on members to recognise and amplify the organisation's power to save lives. "Don't misunderstand me – we are not going to end polio or bring peace to the world by waving a wand and saying some funny words," Urchick told incoming District Governors at the Rotary International Assembly in January. "It's up to you. You create the magic with



International Assembly in January. "It's up to you. You create the magic with every project completed, every dollar donated, and every new member."

Urchick has served Rotary in many roles; including as a Director, Foundation Trustee, and Chair of the RI Strategic Planning Committee and the Foundation's Centennial Celebration Committee. She currently serves on the Election Review Committee and the Operations Review Committee.

A Rotary member since 1991, Urchick has travelled to Vietnam to help build a primary school. She said she saw the *magic of Rotary* on display whilst helping install water filters in the Dominican Republic. Two boys were watching as dirty water entered the filter, then ran out clean at the other end". One of the boys grabbed my sleeve and said, 'Show me the magic again,'" Urchick said. "Obviously, the water filter wasn't magic. We worked hard to transport those filters, install them, and work with community leaders in the area to maintain them. But those boys knew that easy access to clean water would change their lives. Knowing that I played a small part in that certainly changed my life."

Additionally, Urchick studies several Slavic languages, has mentored new Rotarians in Ukraine, and coordinated a Rotary Foundation grant project in Poland.

She plans to host a Presidential Peace Conference in 2025 with the theme 'Healing in a Divided World' which will focus on Rotary's peace efforts and provide opportunities to learn together. "The Rotary Peace Fellowship began more than 20 years ago to equip peace and development professionals from communities around the world to become effective catalysts for ending and preventing conflict," Urchick said. "With a long history of promoting peace through its network of peace centres; the newest centre, located at Bahçeşehir University in Istanbul, Turkey, will welcome its first class of fellows in early 2025. Centres are located at top universities worldwide and have trained nearly 1,800 Peace Fellows who now work in over 140 countries.

Urchick reiterated Rotary's commitment to eradicating polio, and urged the incoming governors to join or initiate PolioPlus Societies in their districts and do all they can to help end the disease. Urging Rotarians to contact elected officials and other government leaders and remind them that polio is still a threat. She said, "Push them to support polio eradication as Polio remains our top priority and requires our fullest commitment, but there is so much important work to do."

With the world facing incredible challenges, including disasters driven by climate change, and conflict in many regions, Urchick says Rotary's leaders can offer a vision and a plan for overcoming these challenges. "Measures taken by Rotary leadership to survive and end critical challenges often make our organisation

stronger, and more resilient, for future events. This kind of essential leadership also creates new levels of cooperation, even among rivals, when Rotarians pull together as people of action to serve and solve a crisis." Urchick says "Making regionalisation a priority is crucial. As Rotary operates in more than 200 countries and regions, it is vital to recognise that the organisation has the potential to become more efficient and effective by understanding, and reacting to, how regional differences affect the way Rotarians work together to address providing service, promoting integrity, and advancing world understanding, goodwill, and peace,".

She urges members to champion Rotary's Action Plan, to find a balance between continuity and change, and work for peace "The plan is all about building on our best ideas, not abandoning them," she said. "We face a tough balancing act. We must change ourselves and stay true to who we are." One way to make positive change, is to embrace the principles of diversity, equity, and inclusion within clubs.

Urchick is Partner and Chief Operating Officer of Doctors at Work LLC, a consulting and training company; and holds a doctorate in leadership studies from Indiana University of Pennsylvania. She is active on numerous community boards and committees and has been honoured by organisations including Zonta International and the Sons of the American Revolution.

Rotary Foundation

YEAR 2023-2024 REPORT

The mission of the Rotary Foundation is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

The Foundation is a not-for-profit corporation supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and friends of the Foundation who share its vision for a better world.

Through Foundation grants and programs, Rotarians and other contributors can help change the world. They can finance a well for a village that lacks clean water, improve the environment, or provide scholarships to educate the next generation.

The Foundation also leads the charge on worldwide Rotary campaigns. The top priority for the Rotary Foundation is the eradication of Polio. Rotarians are making the end of Polio more than just a dream... they are ensuring that over two billion children have been immunised, and over five million have been spared death or disability.

Rotary Club of Ingleburn's Support: END POLIO NOW

World Polio Day was 24 October 2023. On that day, the 'End Polio Now' Train Ride took place where Rotarian Mark Anderson, and his son, took an epic train journey across the Sydney CityRail network to raise funds for the 'End Polio Now' campaign. This involved stopping at all 187 stations in a journey that started around 4:00 am and ended just before midnight.

Throughout the journey, Mark and his son were joined by over 400 Rotarians. Unfortunately, this year the timetable for the Rotary *'End Polio Now'* train was around 6:30 pm, coinciding with our club meeting which was an official visit by our District Governor. Therefore, the Ingleburn Rotarians who normally join the train for the Macarthur legs could not participate. Nevertheless, our donation was remitted by EFT.

As Rotarians, we should make the Rotary Foundation our 'Charity of Choice' as there are benefits due to minimal administration costs, an ability to gain funding for local and global projects and, after three years, 50% of donations in the previous three years, come back to the Rotary District to distribute to club projects. Where else can you get 50% of your donations back to utilise on projects?

Each year we donate to the Annual Fund, and the End Polio Now Fund, to support the good work being done by Foundation grants.

Our Club was able to get a District Grant - The Silver Coin project to fund equipment for after school tutoring for socio-economic disadvantaged children; the program is of value and growing.

It was not a big year for Foundation activity.




Change Lives (resourcing a library in rural Nepal).


During the morning, Santa arrived in a double decker bus with a Police escort;, the sun came out, and more people came to the park. Everyone was happy and having a good time.

We have commenced raising funds and will be applying for a District Grant in 2024-2025, to help establish a Science Lab at the secondary school.


Fundraising is done through:

YEAR 2023-2024 REPORT

The year in review.....

This year has seen a membership decrease due to changed commitments to work and family; some of those members have not been able to attend club meetings, or projects, which makes their loss to Rotary inevitable. Our loss could be as high as 20% of the 1 July 2023 number.

The Membership Committee has reviewed policies and believes the club will be in a better position to hold an *Information Evening* to attract socially and community-minded people who would enjoy being part of a global volunteer service organisation; this has been set for Tuesday, 3 September 2024.

The Membership Committee works on the premise that meeting attendance, project participation in Club approved projects, and social function attendance, are an essential part of the fabric of the club and member

satisfaction.

Member satisfaction is an important part in the retention of members; to this end each member is encouraged to join a committee of their passion. New members are asked about their passions and directed to that committee. attending these camps have increased over the previous few years. Further RYPEN camps will be held in 2024–2025 at the same locations.


The students subsequently attended a Rotary meeting and gave presentations about their experiences and the leadership activities.

It is worth noting that following this experience, Joyce became one of the leaders at the May RYPEN camp. This is an example of the confidence and leadership outcomes that can result from RYLA.

We look forward to sponsoring candidates again in January 2025.

Both HAHS and SRHS INTERACT Clubs have been active throughout the past year, and it is pleasing to see that SRHS Interact has increased its membership. Each school has its own range of programs that they support, many on an annual basis.

Mental Health Committee

PROVIDING WARMTH IN WINTER

As winter is proving a challenge for many, for the homeless it is more than a challenge. Without shelter, winter clothing, blankets, and food, life on the streets, and in temporary accommodation, can be unbearable. Our club

and community has stepped up to provide practical help by undertaking a winter drive, and distributing directly to the women, men, children, and families in temporary accommodation.



Assisting the Rotary Club of Ingleburn in this endeavour has been Kenneally's Funeral Home, Kathie from Kaisercraft, and other members of the community who generously contributed a large amount of winter



woollies. Beth, Gail, Brenda, Jan and Kaylene Domanski, Julie-Ann Carroll, Carolyn Flint, and Jenny Woolfe spent a day sorting and preparing the items for distribution. Preserving dignity and ensuring choice, people in the temporary accommodation were invited to view, and take, what they needed to keep warm throughout the colder months.

Scarves, beanies, and sleeping bags were given to Shining Stars who provide food to homeless people living on the streets. These will be distributed directly to people who need them most.

A sincere thank you to everyone who donated and helped make this significant project possible. You have changed lives and ensured that people living in tough times are not alone.

A SURPRISE DONATION

Gail and I were invited to the AGM for The Chattogram Club of Australia. They asked us to speak about *the Hidden Homeless Project* that the Rotary Club of Ingleburn undertakes. We described our activities: providing

care packages, children's games and toys, and winter items to homeless people in temporary accommodation.

The Chattogram Club of Australia kindly donated \$1,000 to support the *Hidden Homeless* program. This will go a long way to making a difference in the lives of those experiencing hard times.

MINTO GARDENS RETIREMENT VILLAGE

The monthly *Health Talk* for June opened a dialogue about mental health with the residents. Tania, Stef, Carolyn, and Gail provided an avenue to explore anxiety, depression, and stress, bringing these issues into the open and normalising mental health concerns as you would physical health issues.

YEAR 2023-2024 REPORT

The year in review.....

IngleMinds meets monthly to build knowledge of what is happening at local, and national, levels in the area of mental health. We plan activities for our Team and others to enrich the lives of others, and to connect groups together to build positive mental health.

MINTO GARDENS RETIREMENT VILLAGE has seen significant engagement projects: monthly Women's Health Talks; Clothing donations; RUOK Day activities, Health support for April Falls Day, Providing BBQs for significant days throughout the year, and supporting activities during the festive season of Christmas.

RUOK DAY, in September, involved a Youth Tik Tok competition, a Rotary meeting involving positive wellbeing activities, and a discussion panel at Minto Gardens followed by rock painting to build positive wellbeing.

The introduction of **Campbellfield Public School** and **Minto Gardens Retirement Village** continued to grow and involved intergenerational activities as well as a very competitive combined Bingo night.

Another intergenerational program with Minto Gardens Retirement Village residents has been with Passfield Park School supporting the children in their swimming program.

CONNECTING THROUGH CARDS is a project whereby Rotarians, Friends of Rotary, and community members come together to make greeting cards for those at Minto Gardens, aging community members, and those who are socially isolated. In the past 12-months, over 1,000 cards have been made and distributed for birthdays, Easter, and Christmas. Each card is hand-made and







contains a personalised hand-written message. The impact has been significant and appreciated by recipients.

HIDDEN HOMELESS

When men, women, and children are homeless they can be placed in temporary accommodation such as motels. The reasons for homelessness are varied; from job loss, domestic violence, and changing life circumstances. We have connected with one such motel and have been able to provide 90 care packs containing toiletries and essential items.



In addition, we have supplied Christmas presents for the children, Easter eggs and bunnies, games and books, as well as clothing and winter woollies.

The Ingleburn Rotary club also donated sandwich toasters, together with bread and cheese, so that the families can provide simple meals for themselves.

MENTAL HEALTH TRAINING

With our Team members and community groups we have provided a *Mental Health First Aide* course, and another course on building resilience. These were well attended by members of our club and others in the community.

MEALS ON WHEELS

In the past 12-months we have connected with *Meals on Wheels* to run monthly card-making workshops. These cards have been given directly for Christmas and birthdays to clients.

We have donated winter woollies for clients in need and know that they have helped people who have not been able to afford conventional methods of keeping warm due to the increased cost of living.

ESCABAGS

We have continued to support Stacy Jane, and Escabags through making tote bags, and supplying essential toiletry items so that those experiencing domestic violence may find a way to escape their situation.

The past 12-months have seen our community connections grow. We have been able to build knowledge, and share information, so that we can be better informed on what is needed, and how we can have a positive impact.

We have a passion for empowering others to grow positive mental health, and to seek help when needed. We also respectfully reach out so that individuals know that they are important, and that we care about them.


