INVESTMENT STRATEGY

The Foundation needs a more predictable level of financial support for revenue to pay its annual operating expenses and provide an operating reserve; therefore, to ensure the Foundation's long-term financial sustainability, the Trustees approved a funding model. Investments are critical to the sustainability of Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation.

The Office of Investment is responsible for managing Rotary's investments according to policies set by The Rotary Foundation's Trustees and Rotary International's Board of Directors. Through a commitment to stewardship and excellence, they seek to establish a legacy that distinguishes Rotary as a prudent investor, supports Rotary's objectives, and promotes sustainability.

Annual Fund:

The Annual Fund is the primary source of funds that support The Rotary Foundation's programs and areas of focus.

Contributions to the Annual Fund from Rotary members and other donors are directed into two sub-funds: the World Fund, and District Designated Fund. Through the SHARE system, contributions are transformed into grants. The World Fund provides funding for Rotary's highest priority activities around the globe.

Contributions to the Annual Fund are invested for three-years to generate earnings to meet the Foundation's operating expenses. After the three-year period, the District Designated component is returned to each District to be used for District Grants for club approved projects.

To achieve the objective of the Annual Fund, the portfolio is invested conservatively with an emphasis on liquidity, and income over capital appreciation; the Fund portfolio is 100 percent invested in fixed income assets.

Endowment Fund:

The objective of the Endowment Fund is to provide a permanent and sustainable source of funding.

Contributions to the Endowment Fund are invested in perpetuity, and investment earnings are used to provide a permanent source of income to support Foundation programs.

The long-term nature of the Endowment dictates a bias toward equity investments because of the higher return potential in comparison to fixed income investments. Hence, 85 percent of the Endowment portfolio is targeted for investments in assets expected to produce equity-like returns.

The Endowment should generate a higher rate of return over time compared to the Annual Fund, but with more variability in the returns from year to year.

PolioPlus Fund:

The PolioPlus Fund has always been invested only in fixed-income securities (i.e., bonds) because of the need to protect and preserve the funds contributed toward the effort to end Polio.

In the past, when the time horizon for both investment and grant-making was longer, the investment portfolio held longer-term bonds that generated higher yields. The PolioPlus Fund portfolio benefited from the long cycle of declining interest rates.

Today, the investments are limited to short-term, fixed-income securities because the Foundation is raising and disbursing funds within a short time frame as we get closer to reaching our goal.

The returns over the past few years reflect the low-interest rate environment, and the lower-risk, short-term nature of the investments.

Rotary International:

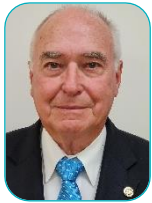
Rotary International holds a portfolio to ensure that Rotary is financially stable and can cover its obligations in unforeseen circumstances.

These funds are invested in a conservative strategy that emphasises liquidity and income over capital appreciation. The Rotary International portfolio is 100 percent invested in fixed-income assets.

The above Investment Strategy reflects why, for the fifteenth (15th) consecutive year, The Rotary Foundation has received the highest rating – four stars – from Charity Navigator, an independent evaluator of charities in the USA.

The Rotary Foundation should be Rotarians' Charity of choice.

BUNNINGS BBQ FOR MHERV

There was excitement in the air as our club was going to run our first Bunnings BBQ in quite a while. This was to be special event raising funds for a Men's Health Education Rural Van (or MHERV). Across the state, Bunnings stores invited Rotary clubs to run barbeques over the weekend to raise essential funds to support this worthy cause. Our turn was on Sunday, 11 August at Bunnings' Crossroads store.

It was a beautiful sunny morning as we rolled into the carpark to begin setting up for the day. The morning crew consisting of Jan, Gail, Beth, Jim, Rosslyn, and myself went about busily unloading the truck, preparing table coverings, loading up the drinks with ice, and preparing the barbeque ready to cook.



We were so busy that we didn't notice one small detail – something was missing – our bread rolls! That's ok, no need to panic crew, they are often delivered inside the store but, upon checking, there were none to be found.

On the phone quick smart to the bakery. Problem was the other Rotary club from the day before had used the same bakery! The baker had thought that it was just a doubled-up order, and so didn't deliver. Even worse, he had no bread rolls spare (we only wanted 450!) and no driver available. He did, however, offer us loaves of bread. Problem was that this Bunnings store asked us to use bread rolls only. So, it was off inside the store to negotiate a deal with the Manager. Thankfully commonsense prevailed, and we were allowed to use sliced bread. Thank you, Bunnings.

Then, being creative and practical, Jan came to the rescue as he and Jim jumped into Jan's car and headed for the bakery to collect 27 loaves of freshly baked bread.

Meanwhile, we had to keep explaining to potential customers that our rolls weren't delivered early, and that we were still waiting. They were most understanding and promised to come back after shopping. We did begin to cook our sausages in readiness.

Then across the carpark came the purveyors of fine bread – yes that's right, Jan and Jim had returned with a carload of aromatic fresh bread. There was much excitement between the morning crew and a few customers who had chosen to take a seat in the sun and wait with us.

Then it was full steam ahead for the day, filling the hotplate with sausages and onions, ready for lots of hungry people.



The morning trade was a bit sporadic at times, varying from no customers to quickly having six people waiting to be served. Towards lunchtime, trade increased and, as the afternoon crew arrived, it was quite busy. They jumped straight in and took over the serving as we bid some of the morning crew farewell.

Stef, Brenda, and Bill, joined me for the afternoon shift and were kept very busy for most of the afternoon. So busy in fact, that we had to go and purchase additional supplies to keep us going until 4:00 pm.

So finally, the time came to down tools and relax. We had served just over 500 sausage sandwiches to customers, often accompanied by a cold drink.

Our fundraising for MHERV was a great success. We had raised well over \$1,000 for a really worthy cause. So, thank you to Bunnings for the opportunity and thank you to all those customers who came and supported us.

A special thank you to all those Rotarians who gave of their time for MHERV.

CAR SHOW BBQ

Our regular car show BBQ was very different this month. Instead of an early morning start with bacon and eggs at Campbelltown, we headed off for a special day at Cataract Dam, supplying a mid-morning brunch to all the car enthusiasts.



Our usual crew of Beth, Steve, and Peter were there, alongside Gail and Brian, Jim and Julie-Ann, and Cheryl. We arrived shortly after the gates opened and snagged a beaut spot to set up (*that was a little BBQ joke ... 'snagged'*). We scurried about to set up the marquee and tables, the drink tubs, and our food preparation area. The barbeques at the dam were electric, so we pushed the ignition buttons on during the setting up, thinking that they would be good and hot by the time we were ready to use them.



“Here come the first cars” was the cry we heard. Sure enough, the long line of fabulous cars was snaking its way slowly down the driveway and into our “show and talk” area.

How are we going team? Not real good – our food was on cooking, but very slowly. The electric barbeques weren’t that good for people in a hurry. Why such a hurry? Because we had a hoard of hungry visitors heading our way to get some brunch. The coffee van was parked beside us, so they kept the crowd distracted for a while.



It is just as well that we Rotarians are experienced and think ahead – we had brought one of our large portable gas barbeques on the back of the truck. With great haste, it was assembled, connected to gas and fired up to support the cooking. Now we were getting somewhere.

Poor Beth, our front of house cashier. She was inundated with a long line of customers. She talked sweetly to them and took their money, all the time assuring them that the wait wouldn't be too long. Meanwhile, back of house, the team worked furiously to cook and assemble the food as quickly as possible. Everyone was eventually served with their choice of food, some even went for a bun with the lot – bacon, egg, sausage, onion, and sauce. This was accompanied by a can of coke! (they drank their coffee while standing around chatting, waiting for their food).

Well done team, we've reached the end of the line. Relax and take a short break, you've earned it. A gentle trickle of customers continued to arrive, and they were served in our usual prompt and efficient manner.

The roar of a few engines, and shouts of goodbye, flagged the start of the departure routines that the car enthusiasts go through each meeting. This also meant that it was time for us to clean the barbeques off and start packing up for our return home. Everyone pitched in to help, and it wasn't long before we finally dismantled the marquee and packed it on top of everything else on the truck.

Thank you to all those Rotarians and their partners who helped make this day a great success. We all had a good time, even if it was a bit tiring.
