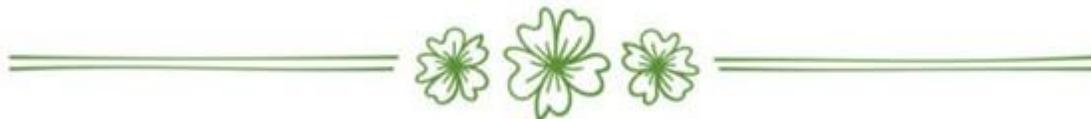

## TRAIN RIDE TO END POLIO

In 2018, the End Polio Now Train ride was conceived by a Rotary International employee, Mark Anderson, and his son; their aim was to ride the Sydney Rail Network and visit every one of the 187 stations within 24 hours. This tradition has occurred every year since. I am not sure now how many stations with the new Metro stations.

This year the date is **Friday, 24 October 2025** with the schedule, starting at 4:33 am from Cronulla and finishing at 22:32pm at Tallawong, has been worked out with the following being the Campbelltown area component:

<i>Glenfield to Leppington</i>	<i>18:44 pm</i>	<i>Return</i>	<i>19:03 pm</i>
<i>Glenfield to Macarthur</i>	<i>19:21 pm</i>	<i>Return</i>	<i>19:53 pm</i>

The idea is to join Mark Anderson, and his son, along with the group of Rotarians who are on-board for the entire day and those who join for part of the ride. Members can choose when they join and finish; however, I usually do the entire ride for our area; it takes about 1 hour 30 minutes.

Let us ride the train and talk to as many commuters as possible to generate funds and awareness of the polio scourge, and its imminent elimination from the world. It is also an opportunity to talk about Rotary and what it does Locally, Nationally, and Globally.

The origin of Rotary's End Polio campaign dates back to 1979 when Rotary International President, Sir Clem Renouf, led a project to immunise 6 million children in the Philippines against polio, sparking a global fight. This led to the launch of the Rotary PolioPlus Program in 1985, and the establishment of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) in 1988; a partnership between Rotary, the World Health Organisation (WHO), and other organisations, that has drastically reduced polio cases worldwide.

Sir Clem Renouf was a member of the Rotary Club of Nambour, Queensland, Australia, for 70 years. He served as RI Director, Foundation Trustee, District Governor, RI Committee Member and Chair, and the International Assembly Discussion Leader.

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 40 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever. Rotary members have contributed Billions of Dollars, and countless volunteer hours, to protect over 3 billion children around the world from this paralysing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts has played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than US\$10 billion to the effort.

As a founding partners of the Global Eradication Initiative, we have reduced polio cases by 99.9% since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979. When the PolioPlus Project commenced there were over 350,000 cases each year. As of September 2025, there have been 13 cases of the wild polio virus type 1 (WPV1) reported in 2025 - 9 in Pakistan, and 4 in Afghanistan. In addition to these human cases, 275 WPV1-positive environmental samples have also been reported in 2025, indicating ongoing transmission in Pakistan and Afghanistan.

It is crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free because if all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could potentially paralyse as many as 200,000 children each year.

To support this worthy cause, the District Governor and Club Presidents rally Rotarians to join the train ride for as many stations as possible and present a club cheque for the End Polio Campaign.

## International

### **ROMAC** (*Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children*)

The latest ROMAC child is Maradona. He is 7 years old and comes from the Solomon Islands, about a 3-hour pickup truck ride west of Honiara.

In June, he was speared just below the eye by a swordfish while fishing with his father. The wound healed and everyone thought he was OK, but then his eye started to turn, and he was taken to a local doctor in Honiara.

Scans showed the swordfish spike was lodged in his brain. Unable to perform the demanding operation required, the local surgeon called ROMAC.

Today, Maradona is up and playing after an extraordinarily complex 8-hour operation on Wednesday.

Here he is with his Mum, Ella. She has little English, so we communicate as best we can. Maradona loves apples, chips, and juice. The surgeons have saved his eye, and his life, as the spear of the swordfish was remarkably close to a vein which was likely to rupture as Maradona grew up.

- c) Encourage shares.

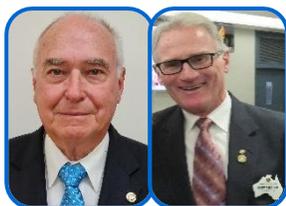
### 3. *Member Engagement and Recruitment:*

When the count was done, they had made..... 96 meals, 5 short of beating the August Team. They vow to return and once again challenge the reigning champions. The real winners are the Hidden Homeless who are given nutritious and hearty meals for dinner.

### BREAKFAST

With the generous Club Grant we are now able to provide 96 breakfast packs for people in who are homeless and in temporary accommodation. These packs provide a great start to the day. Our first packs were made by Debbie Goodfellow, Calvin Sokha, and Beth on a volunteer morning. The Team provided a template for future breakfast packs which can be used by other volunteer teams.



There has been great feedback for these packs, and our aim is to continue this project to meet the needs of the Hidden homeless.

Many thanks to Haven Church of Christ at Ambarvale for their assistance with ordering some of the breakfast supplies.

**ON THE MOVE**

We have now helped 13 families and individuals moving from temporary accommodation into rental housing. In repurposing furniture, linen, and homewares we have not only reduced landfill, but we have also helped those in need have a fresh start.

With expert trailer driving by Brian Taylor and 9 Missionaries (*Church of the Latter Day Saints*), the most recent delivery was a breeze. One muscle-bound young man walked up to the small fridge, wrapped his arms around it and put it in the back of the car without breaking stride. Oh to be 20 again!



**HIGH TEA**

The Ingle Minds Team planned, created, and hosted a High Tea for 40 residents of Minto Gardens on 9 September. The aim was to create an opportunity to enjoy quality conversations with peers, while enjoying a special High Tea. The Ingle Minds Team and friends spent two months planning the event, which included handmade and handwritten cards encouraging wellbeing. Thanks to Louise, Brenda, Carolyn, and Minto Mall for enabling this to happen. Chefs: Jan H, Brenda, Jules (with hands provided by Jenny W), Gail, Carolyn, Debbie (Beth’s Sister), and Tanya (Carolyn’s neighbour), provided food worthy of Royalty.



Special mention to *Parramatta Bakers Delight* for the generous donation of scones and bread. Raffles and lucky door prizes added excitement with gratitude to Moana and community donors.

On the day, the enthusiastic Team worked from early hours to mid-afternoon ensuring everyone had a great time. A special mention to the Team who spent the day prior for setting up for the event. An honourable mention to Barry W who pitched in with set up, and Diana M and for helping on the day.

As a bonus our Team was able to fundraise just over \$1,000 to allow 10 children to access *The Dolly Parton Imagination Library*.

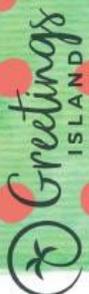
