## International

### SHELTERBOX

ShelterBox responds to disasters around the world. They provide vital emergency shelter aid, including kits (tarpaulins and tools), rope, thermal blankets, water carriers, mosquito nets, and solar lights.

At the present time they are responding in the Caribbean after Hurricane Melissa swept across the region leaving a trail of destruction – widespread flooding, landslides, and damage to homes; with 1.6 million people affected, 120,000 homes needing urgent repair. Shelter remains one of the most urgent needs.

Our donation box at Bunnings Leppington on Sunday, 23 November raised \$100.55. This will buy 3 solar lights, or 2 kitchen sets, or a shelter tool kit. We hope to be able to add to this at our next Bunnings BBQ at Leppington on Sunday, 13 December.

## Mental Health Committee (*Ingle Minds*)



### *Ingle Minds changes lives*

This year we have been supported by groups, individuals, and Club Grants to help those who are homeless to transition into temporary accommodation, and then to more permanent housing.

We have received donations of: knitted blankets and care packs from The Ingleburn Library Knitters Group; money, household items, and clothing from The Craft Group at Macarthur IRT Village; clothing, household items, and assembling of breakfast packs from Willowdale Retirement Village; Club Grant funding from The Sherwood; meals prepared by Hurlstone Agricultural High School, sponsorship from 'Save Macarthur from DV Group', Ingleburn Rotarians, and Ingle Minds creation of meals, breakfast packs, and managing all donations.

Here is just one example of how, together, we have changed lives.

*An Australian woman in her mid-70s, returning from an abusive family situation in Romania, lands in Sydney and finds herself homeless. She has low vision and physical limitations. She has a suitcase of winter clothing.*

*No friends or family to support her – the situation seemed dire.*

*She was dropped off and left by a service at a Motel and given one night's accommodation.*

*Our project was able to give her a care pack, a mess kit, a dinner and breakfast.*

*Her motel accommodation was extended for one week, and she was continually supported with meals.*

*Our intervention provided her with an appointment at the Macarthur Women's Shelter at Glenfield. Upon completing the assessment, she was offered a place to stay at the shelter for three months. She became the first woman to enter this facility and be supported in her journey to finding long-term accommodation. She received a clean and safe room, new towels, household products to be able to wash clothing, and clean her room and clothing, new clothes and shoes, breakfasts, additional linen, a knitted blanket, and a care pack to name some items our community has been able to provide. More recently, she has ongoing access to prepared meals and the ingredients to be able to cook for herself.*

*This woman now sees a future that will ensure she is safe and can begin to build her life again. She expressed her*

gratitude to everyone and, while she has been through a very tough time, she can see that there are people who care.

This is a wonderful example of how Ingle Minds, supported by the community, can make a difference and change lives.

More November achievements include:

**MINTO GARDENS RETIREMENT VILLAGE** residents prepared 76 book and toy packs for children entering temporary accommodation. These have been distributed to Vinnies' Refuges and a local Motel.



Donations to the **+55 WOMEN'S SHELTER** this month have included: a large order of household items - clothes airers, cleaning equipment, linen, etc. Community donations of linen have also been provided.



Our engagement with **Minto Gardens Retirement Village** has continued with craft workshops and health talks. This has enhanced connection, confidence and healthy lifestyles.


