

## DECEMBER: DISEASE PREVENTION AND TREATMENT MONTH



Rotary's top priority is the eradication of polio, but some Rotarians set up health camps and training facilities in undeveloped countries and in communities struggling with HIV/AIDS and malaria. They also design and build the infrastructure for doctors, nurses, governments, and partners to reach the one in six people in the world who can't afford to pay for healthcare.

**Disease Prevention and Treatment** is one of the Foundations Areas of Focus and one in which many of us would be aware of the numerous projects around the world supported by clubs and the Foundation. In promoting improved health at home and abroad and supporting these vital programs that contribute not only to healthy communities, but peaceful communities, Rotarians support the Foundation.

Disease prevention and treatment takes on many forms; from supporting studies to helping to immunise people, to improving drinking water, and the sanitation infrastructure. The world relies on Rotary to tackle these global challenges, and to set an example for others to follow.

*Rotarians believe good health care is everyone's right; still 400 million people in the world can't afford, or don't have access to, basic health care.*

Disease results in misery, pain, and poverty for millions of people worldwide. That's why treating and preventing disease is so important. Rotary lead efforts both large and small; setting up temporary clinics, blood donation centres, and training facilities in underserved communities struggling with outbreaks and health care access. Rotarians design and build infrastructure that allows doctors, patients, and governments to work together.

Rotarians combat diseases like malaria, HIV/AIDS, Alzheimer's, multiple sclerosis, diabetes, and polio. Prevention is important, which is why we also focus on health education, and bringing people routine hearing, vision, and dental care.

### HOW ROTARY MAKES HELP HAPPEN

Rotary educate and equip communities to stop the spread of life-threatening diseases with Rotary members having hundreds of health projects underway around the world at any given time.

**ROTARY’S IMPACT ON DISEASE**

The Rotary Foundation is changing the world by providing grants for projects and activities around the globe and in our own backyard.

*Rotary makes amazing things happen, like:*

- ♥ **Providing clean water:** Rotary has worked with partners to provide more than 80% of Ghana’s people with clean water to fight Guinea worm disease.
- ♥ **Reducing HIV infection:** In Liberia, Rotary members are helping women get tested for HIV early in their pregnancies. They used prenatal care to reduce new HIV infections in children by 95% over two years.
- ♥ **Ending polio:** Rotarians have played a key role in bringing the world to the brink of polio eradication. Their efforts have not only ended polio in 122 countries but also created a system for tackling myriad other health priorities, such as Ebola.

**GLENFIELD WOMEN’S SHELTER**



This month a team visited the Glenfield Women’s Shelter to gain insights into its capacity and needs. This tour, and information session, helped to create other links and opportunities for food security, mental health support, and provision of needed resources.

**HIDDEN HOMELESS**

The Hidden Homeless have been supported through food provision this month. With thanks to Jules, and Jim for assembling 99 breakfast packs, Brian for cooking his famous pasta and bolognaise, Jan, and John Hartmann for meals, and Beth for creating meals this month.



**FAMILY HAMPERS**

We know that at this time of year access to cheaper and free food options is limited. This creates significant stress on families. Generous donations from Macquarie Fields Public School, Hurlstone Agricultural High School,

Minto Gardens residents, and Rotarians have helped ease this burden. The residents of Minto Gardens sorted, and packaged, the donations to create, and then deliver, 52 food hampers to local schools. The schools will then identify families in most need and discretely pass the hampers onto them. These wonderful partnerships make a difference in the lives of our vulnerable community members. Many thanks to all,

especially Beth, and sister, Debbie, Gail, Jules, Carolyn, and Ken as well as Minto Gardens, and the schools who donated food.



This month saw us help family number 17 move from homeless temporary accommodation to their rental property. The single mother of seven children with the help of her brothers were able to load furniture and household items that will see this family have a positive start to their new living circumstances.

As we try to keep accepting and moving donations of furniture and household items onto people in need, we are often at capacity. We are joined by the Seventh Day Adventist Missionaries providing muscle to load, and unload, the donations helping to ease the muscle strain of Rotarians.

The Ingle Minds Team undertook an evaluation for 2025 and this is represented diagrammatically. We are proud that we can connect and help our community in such a significant way.

Even before there was a second club, realising the importance of community service, I persuaded the Chicago Rotary Club to initiate the establishment of public comfort stations in the city of Chicago, inviting the city administration and every civic organisation in the city to join our club in the undertaking. It is possible that some more attractive objective might have been chosen for our first venture, but it would be difficult to have found one which would have stirred up more agitation. Two formidable forces rose up against us; one was the Chicago Association of Brewers which contended that every one of Chicago’s six thousand saloons offered public comfort conveniences for men. The other opponent was the Association of Department Stores on State Street which contended that free accommodations in the stores were available to women. The proponents of the measure nevertheless persisted that men ought not to have to buy a glass of beer nor women have to buy merchandise to make use of toilet facilities. The stations were established.
