January is Vocational Service Month



The Concept of Vocation service is a philosophical statement of Rotary's purpose and the responsibilities of Rotarians. The concept of vocational service is rooted in the Second Object, which calls on Rotarians to "encourage and foster".

- To encourage and foster high ethical standards in business and professions, to recognise the worthiness of all useful occupations, to dignify the Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society.
- * The recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations To apply the ideal of service in personal, business and community life.
- The dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society. To advance international understanding and goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of businessmen and professional men and women united in the ideal

of service.

Paul Harris wrote: "Each Rotarian is a connecting link between the idealism of Rotary and their trade or profession".

Vocational Service is the way Rotary fosters and supports the application of the Ideal of Service to the pursuit of all vocations.

As a Rotarian, how can you put these ideals into action: Consider:

- * Talk about your vocation in your club, and take time to learn about fellow members' vocations;
- Use your professional skills to serve a community;
- * Practice your profession with integrity, and inspire other to behalf ethically through your own words and actions;
- * Help a young person achieve their career aspirations;
- * Guide and encourage others in their professional development.

If you do any of these things, **you are** performing vocational service. And if vocational services motivates and energises you, then you're in the right place, because vocational service is the verry essence of Rotary. It is what sets Rotary apart from other services organisations.

Remember:

Vocational Service is the shared responsibility of both the Rotary Club and its members.

The role of the Club is to implement and encourage the objectives by its own actions in dealing with the community, and by the development of projects that enable members to use their vocational talents in the service of the community.

The role of members is to conduct themselves, and their businesses, in accordance with Rotary principles, and support the Vocational Service projects that the club has developed.

A current report on the global eradication of Polio:

PAKISTAN AND AFGHANISTAN

The only countries where polio is still endemic –

- Currently, only Wild Poliovirus Type 1 continues to circulate, and only in these two remaining endemic countries.
- 2024 proved to be a challenging year for the program with a resurgence of cases in both countries, with 62 cases, and 536 environmental detections, reported this year.
- There is a real risk of re-established transmission in these countries. (Source: Doherty Institute)

GAZA

- A humanitarian pause allowed a two-round polio vaccination campaign to begin in Gaza. The first round was successfully implemented from 1-12 September 2024 and vaccinated 559,161 children, or an estimated 95% of eligible children at the governorate level.
- The second round began on 14 October 2024. The campaign started in Central Gaza, vaccinating children under 10 years old. Children between 2-9 years old were offered Vitamin A.
- As of 23 October, the Polio Technical Committee for Gaza, including the Palestinian Ministry of Health, WHO, UNICEF, the United Nations Relief Works Agency for Palestine Refugees (UNRWA), and partners have been compelled to postpone the third phase of the polio vaccination campaign. The final phase aimed to vaccinate 119,279 children across northern Gaza. (Source: Rotary International)

The world must be vigilant and continue with the vaccinating campaign because this dreadful disease is only a plane ride away.

Let's not give up the fight!

You will recall that on World Polio Day this year, 24 October, that Mark and Dave Andersen organised a train ride to visit every station to promote the 'End Polio Now' campaign, across Rotary Districts 9675 and 9685 (Greater Sydney).

Both Mark, and Dave, put in a huge effort each year to organise this event in riding the train from 4:30 am to 10:30 pm.

The campaign raised \$76,775, with another \$21,000 promised from clubs.

MINTO GARDENS RETIREMENT VILLAGE

Minto Gardens Retirement Village undertook an engagement program titled "12 Days of Christmas". The Rotary Club of Ingleburn contributed in a number of ways.

Each resident received a handmade, and handwritten, Christmas card. Members of our community, as well as Rotarians, and Friends of Rotary, created 220 cards throughout the year and our resident writers ensured an individual message was delivered.

The residents donated toys to the Gifts of Hope appeal.

We participated in the Village Christmas Markets selling crafts, gift hampers, and plants.

The Team ran a craft activity for residents. The residents have a wealth of knowledge and experience; they mentor each other and those who are beginners, take a leap of faith to have a go at something new.

The "Aussie Christmas" theme day saw many Rotarians man the BBQ, serving snags and salads. The man in the Red Suit also made an appearance!

The residents made family hampers from pantry items donated by Macquarie Fields Public School.

Sixty (60) hampers in 60 minutes from sorting to packing to delivering. Thanks to Gail, Brenda, Carolyn, and Beth.

Christmas Karaoke saw Hands on Heart and Rotary combine for a BBQ and sing-along. It was great to see a large number of Rotarians support this event.

Each day had a new activity to build connection, purpose, a sense of giving and joy to the residents.

HIDDEN HOMELESS

For many people living in temporary accommodation they do so without resources. In December we were offered excellent quality furniture and homewares to be passed on to those who have been able to move into their long-term rental homes. From potential landfill, to creating a comfortable living environment for someone, these donations have made a difference to six families.

MACARTHUR COMMUNITY HUB

The Macarthur Homeless Steering Committee invited IngleMinds to attend their annual community event for people needing housing help in Macarthur. This event attracted a large number of community services, and 300 people seeking assistance. Ken, Gail, Brenda, and Beth, assisted by volunteers, did the traditional Rotary task of sausage sizzle.
