DID YOU KNOW?.

The world's progress in fighting polio must be one of the best-kept secrets in global health.



The Rotary Club of Blackwood is a long-term supporter of Rotary International's drive to eliminate Polio from the world. Younger generations may be unaware, but older Australians will have seen the devastating paralysis and even death that polio could cause before its elimination from Australia in the 1960's

With a concerted effort wild poliovirus cases have been reduced by more than 99% since 1988, from an estimated 350,000 cases in more than 125 endemic countries to 33 reported cases in only 3 countries; Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan in 2018.

In 1995 health workers and volunteers immunize 165 million children in China and India in 1 week. This level of commitment is ongoing.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyse as many as 200,000 children each year.

HELPING THE HOMELESS at CHRISTMAS TIME

This Christmas the Blackwood Rotary Club partnered with the O"Halloran Hill Kindy to assist the Outer Southern Homelessness service. This service provides housing to families in their shelter and outreach properties throughout the southern suburbs. These are families that have experienced homelessness through illness, unemployment, relationship breakdown or a number of other reasons.

Traditionally the Christmas hampers the Service gives do not provide much in the line of Christmas treats: Christmas puddings, nice biscuits, tinned hams or sweets for the kids.

Our club felt it could address this need. So in conjunction with the giving tree at the O"Halloran Hill Kindergarten we collected the needed items and dropped the donated food, toys and treats into the shelter on the next day.

Many of these mums being supported would not normally receive anything over Christmas and so really appreciate hand lotions etc, which are not affordable on their incomes.



We expect this to be the start of a nice club tradition.

HELPING BUILD A SCHOOL LIBRARY IN PAPUA NEW GUINEA

In November we hosted an inspirational speaker involved in delivering a humanitarian aid program in the remote areas of Papua New Guinea (PNG). **Shila Yukuli Phopo**, is a PhD student at Flinders University, and the Project Manager "Soil Child" project in Dauri village in the southern highlands of PNG.

In her words: "In my village there was no school, no health facility and no infrastructure. Even today nothing has changed and people are still living in poverty. Now we are working to ensure the next generation have opportunities for education, health care and economic development. "



The "Soil Child" project invests in social capital - to provide education, primary health care, nutrition, agriculture and vocational opportunities. An emphasis on leadership and management by women ensures better outcomes for future generations, and an extensive process of community dialogue ensures that the initiative and responsibility for social change is shared by village members

On the basis of Shila's powerful presentation the Rotary Club of Blackwood donated \$2000 to support the building of a library in the village.

We were very pleased to receive our first, very positive, report on the progress of the programme

"This project has been a huge success. On our trip we were able to meet with all our stakeholders and discuss the future planning and set up of the library. The official opening of both the library and the classroom buildings took place on the 23rd January 2019. The entire Dauli community is motivated and grateful for this project.

ROTARY TO THE RESCUE OF BLACKWOOD'S MEMORIAL HALL

Blackwood Rotary have been a long-time supporter of the Blackwood Memorial Hall as the Hall has slowly updated and refurbished its 60 year-old self to be one of the two major indoor recreation facilities available to the Blackwood and surrounding Hills communities serving over 700 clients each week.

With over 200 community groups in the area, the Hall is used for everything from yoga for the elderly, ballet and dance classes; to Taekwondo, Thai kickboxing, amateur theatrical groups and concerts; to photographic and wine-bottling clubs; to 3 year olds learning to catch and kick a football.

The Club has helped the Hall in numerous ways, not the least being the two Rotary representatives on the Hall's Management Committee.

Rotary's financial help has been for essential practical items from a new locking system for the Hall, new fire escape doors, extensions to the Hall's limited car parking, replacement of one of the fallen down boundary fences, and critical repairs to the Main Hall stage floor.

Not that it is all a one-way street. In acknowledgement of the Club's assistance, use of the Hall by the Club for functions like book sales, quiz nights and the like comes gratis.
