#### **From President Bill Winslow**

Firstly I would ask everyone here tonight to pause and spare a thought for our dear departed member, Shirley Manser, who passed away a few months ago.



#### **From President Bill Winslow**

It has been quite a year and in my view, our club has demonstrated its resilience in dealing with the fall-out of a pandemic. After having closed the shed for 3 months, holding Zoom meetings and socially distancing I reckon it has left our spirit unbroken. Each of the committees' budgets were originally cut by 25% due to the reduced earnings last Rotary year but as the shed re-opened in July 2020, our customers must've had a pent-up desire to purchase our wares and our takings increased and have remained robust even to this day! Two or three months ago, the Board voted to re-instate the previously budgeted amounts to each committee because of the increased sales.

So, what are we about? A short and obvious answer to this question is the Five Avenues of Rotary Service.

#### Let me summarise:

- 1. Club Service Our most frequent activity is helping and running the Shed. Without the income the shed operation generates our club would be far less effective in the community. The shed does a lot more than raising money, it also provides fellowship to our members, it provides a meeting point for members of our community to meet over a coffee and a bacon & egg roll and it serves as a recruiting tool for non-members who experience our welcomeness, commitment and purpose. David Heilbronn looked after Fundraising this year and with the volunteers and club members that contributed to the operation our club would be unable to support the numerous causes it supports. The club has also held a few meetings like the Croquet night that serves to bring us closer together in entertaining ways. Our Public Image and Membership committee led by Brian Kretschmer was active in raising our profile and we increased our membership by four this year, a warm welcome to Tony Campeorale, Jim Owler, Sonia Schepetiuk and Wendy Gaborit. I give the club a tick for its commitment to Club Service.
- 2. Vocational service & New Generations service Our club has merged Vocational service with New Generations Service that are two of the Avenues of Service. One of the highlights of our clubs' meetings for many years is the Vocational awards night where we honour students from a number of schools for their projects they have displayed to us. This year this meeting was held here at San Giorgio. Another highlight is the music awards which also honours up and coming musicians from a number of schools in our area. Again, the Music Awards evening has been another highlight of our Rotary year for as long as I can remember. Thank you to Romaine Dawson and her team for organising and continuing to make these events a standout! Other recipients of our aid include:
  - a. School of St Jude, in Africa
  - b. Adelaide East Education Centre, a school that educates disadvantaged students
  - c. National Youth Science Forum, two students selected and sponsored
  - d. Rotary Youth Leadership Awards 1 student
  - e. Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment 1 student
  - f. One and All sailing ship sponsorship for a disadvantaged student
  - g. And there were other programs that our club supported

I also give Vocational Service and New Generations Service that our club has provided a tick.

- 3. Community Service under the leadership of David Birkedale this committee was active in assisting the local community on a number of fronts:
- a. People Living with Dementia Project is a highlight. The tickle that music can give to parts of the brain we don't understand is remarkable and the behavioural changes in those presented with headphones and music has to be near miracle standard.
- b. The Hutt Street centre received aid from us
- c. St Peters Community Garden
- d. Sight for All
- e. Clipper Ship
- f. Foodbank
- g. Parkinsons SA
- h. And more

Another tick of approval for our contributions to our Community

- 4. International Service Under the guidance of Phil Smith, our club was very active
- a. We donated to Shelter Box which assists families to survive by sending them basic supplies to continue to live as a family in areas affected by disaster such as earthquakes, floods, fire etcetera
- b. Interplast was supported, a Rotary initiative which trains surgeons in restorative procedures
- c. Rotarians Against Malaria
- d. Books for Lesotho, in an impoverished nation where a teacher there has teamed up with Rotary Clubs to provide them with books for children. Our club has made monetary donations as well as providing them appropriate books that were donated to our shed operation
- e. A number of us in the club helped to put together Birthing Kits to be sent to under developed countries in order to make childbirth a cleaner and safer experience for mother and child. That was a really fun evening we shared at the Shed and Phil and Lucy Smith did a great job organising it.
- f. There were more activities
- g. Again, a tick to our efforts to International Service
- 5. This was my second term serving as the President of this wonderful club. I am the second re-cycled president after John George from last year. We are truly a "green" club now. The advent of the Admin Group last year was probably the best change to the weekly operation of the club. We met every week prior to the Club meetings to iron-out any issues that would interfere or be a hindrance to a smooth operation. However, the Admin Group was always mindful that we could not cross the line in decision making in which the membership and Board need to approve.
- 6. And, a great big thank you to our Secretary, Pamela Vaughton who will finally relinquish this role after tonight to Wendy Gaborit and to John Reynolds who has been handling our finances for many years on the trot.
- 7. A final note: with the Rotary experience of the Board and Club members, the job of the President is not really that complicated and I would encourage each of you to stand-up and accept the privilege of leading the club when your time is due.
