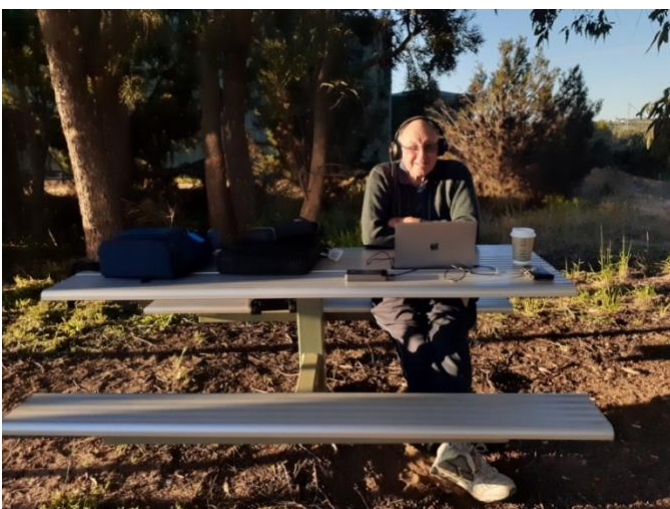

Joined Rotary in 1992 as the Charter president of , - Rotary Club of Hollywood ,Western Australia ( for the year 1992/93), District 9450

Became the first woman President of a Rotary Club in Australia, NZ , Philippines

Member of Rotary Foundation Committee, Member of the Bale Eye Clinic Committee while in this district. Travelled to Bali to be involved in the project \* story \*

Moved to Derby WA and became the Charter president of the Rotary Club of Derby WA 1996/7

Assistant Governor District 9450 in 1997/8

District Governor Rotary International 1999 - 2000

First woman District Governor in the Southern hemisphere, the then District 9540 Western Australia ( one of of 23 women of over 500 male District Governors World wide.)

District Trainer 1999/2000.

Moved to Tasmania in early 2001

Became a member of the Rotary Club of West Launceston. Held club positions of Vocational Service Chair and then International Service Chair. Very involved in Polio Eradication Participated in an Immusation project in Mumbai, India

Transferred to Rotary Club of Hobart in 2002. Member Rotary Club of Hobart, Tasmania, District 9830. Held position on International service, Group Study exchange committee Involved in all committee activities.

District Rotary Foundation Chair 2006-2008

Member of many other District and Club committees Member of Conference Committees and Chair District Conference 2021-22

### **Rotary Action Group - Food Plant Solutions**

Established in 2007, this group aims to help prevent malnutrition. Statistics suggest worldwide five children die every minute from starvation.

This group produces and distributes science based information about food plants...

**How to grow the right plant in the right place.**

**This enables families to grow their own fresh food.**



*The Food Plant Solutions project was designed to address malnutrition through the use of readily available and local food sources. We create educational publications that help people understand the connection between plant selection and nutrition, and empower them to grow a range of highly nutritious plants with differing seasonal requirements and maturities. We identify food plants that are potentially important for a country or region because they are suited to the environment, they are high in nutrients and they grow with minimal inputs. This is a sustainable solution that empowers people in need, not just for now, but into the future.*

*Food Plant Solutions does not send people in-country, but forms partnerships with existing aid providers who use the FPS publications to educate communities, and particularly women and children, on the nutrient value of their local foods. Not only does this sustainably address malnutrition and food security, it also empowers women. In many cases this will increase incomes, particularly for women, which benefits the family unit as a whole, and it safeguards and strengthens the capacity of women to provide food security, health and nutrition for their family. Most projects (whether they be housing, water, schools, maternal health, etc.), would be further enhanced by adding a Food Plant Solutions component to them. Most people who are in dire situations require a sustainable way to grow and access nutritious food.*

*With program partners, FPS encourages the establishment of demonstration food gardens in schools and communities, as these provide ongoing education and improve the health and nutrition of participants, who are provided with nutritious food prepared from these gardens.*

*With some of our programs achieving a **reduction in malnutrition by as much as 95%**, this approach is proven, cost-effective and sustainable.*
