Rotary District 9510 Conference – Saturday Report – Chris Dawson

Following a short, creative video, the first speaker was from Calperum Station, a 2,400 sq km protected area near Renmark focussing on Ecology, Education, Engagement. This will be the topic for Don Will at next week's meeting.

Second was Kay Danes. In 2000, she and her husband were arrested in Laos, imprisoned, and tortured with beatings and mock executions, for crimes they hadn't committed. Following release over a year later, she has forged a worldwide pathway focusing on human rights and social justice: recently her team assisted 3500 people exit Afghanistan. Currently, Kay is a member of an eRotary club, Global Trekkers, with members from 6 countries.

Then Lisa Dallow who, in 2019, took a zodiac trip to White Island with her husband and 15yr old daughter while cruising New Zealand - and the volcano blew. While Lisa survived, both her husband and daughter were killed. Lisa had burns to 60% of her body, her fingers and some toes were amputated, and she spent months in hospital and still receives regular medical attention. But she has moved forward working part time as an engineer and as the Rotary Club of Adelaide's secretary. She thanked Rotarians for helping her find some meaning in her life. Her talk generated many a tear in the audience.

Then we heard from Elaine Bensted, CEO of Zoos SA. who outlined changes to the Monarto Safari Park and the Adelaide Zoo. She mentioned the effect of a last-minute lockdown on their operation transporting a giraffe to Adelaide. They planned a new route through Broken Hill - but they also had to check bridges and powerlines along the route. Wouldn't do to electrocute or concuss the giraffe.

David Paterson talked of his passage through life where he is now CEO of the YMCA. I hadn't known that this was started by a 14yr old, George Williams, in England or that Adelaide had the first Y out of Europe.

Then Michael Keelan spoke of the benefits of gardening - both physical and psychological. And by gardening he meant from a single potted plant to acreage. He emphasised that even seasoned gardeners can fail – but he just called these 'experiments'.

He emphasised how gardens can engage all the senses. And this is what Adelaide East Education Centre aims to do with the planters we recently provided. Both a sensory and herb garden for students in wheelchairs - raised so they have full access, which hasn't been the case with their ground level gardens.

Finally, in a series of 5-minute soapbox session, Rotarians spoke of initiatives in which they are involved. Of particular interest was the Mount Barker Club which identifies children's playgrounds being replaced, packages them up, and sends them overseas to provide for children who have never before seen, or used, such equipment.

After lunch a relaxing afternoon until we met for drinks and nibbles at 4pm.

Then the Masquerade Ball. My word, we scrub up well, though most of us were unrecognisable in our masks. Food and wine, music and dancing. We all had a ball!

It is on Again,

Rotary District 9510 Youth Exchange Program for year 2022-2023

Our club is invited to participate in the Youth Exchange Program for the next Rotary year of **2022-2023 or offer a commitment to an Inbound 2023-2024.**

The program requires careful advanced planning to ensure that an inbound student's arrival is positive and that your Club is prepared. We have just been advised that due to the relaxing of COVID restrictions, the SA Education Department will now accept AASES Forms (Acceptance Advice for Secondary Exchange Student) enabling exchanges to occur.

It is important to note that for each **INBOUND** student hosted by our Club, the District YEP Committee will be able to arrange a placement overseas for an **OUTBOUND** student.

While it is desirable that clubs who host an Inbound Student sponsor an Outbound Student it can occur singularly without the other. If your club is unprepared to host an Inbound student but can sponsor and support an Outbound Student please indicate this. There is a form our club needs to complete and return as soon as possible and the return of the survey form will give the YEP Committee an indication of the interest in the program and allow further planning to take place in this district and the overseas corresponding districts.

Due to regulations from the Department of Education, **outbound student applicants** must be in **year 9, 10 or year 11** in the year they make application to be eligible for the program. The preferred age of applicants is between 15 to 17 years. We could approach our local schools involved in our youth projects.

We will seek support from our Youth Committee to be our clubs Youth Exchange Officer (YEO) to administer the club's Exchange program, including recruiting outbound candidates and Host families. Once our Inbound Student is known, another member of the Rotary club will be designated as the Inbound Exchange student's Club Counsellor (usually of the same sex) for the duration of the exchange.

National Flood Relief Appeal Distribution

Australian charity, Rotary Australia World Community Service, today announced that funds raised via their national Flood Relief Appeal for people impacted by the current floods in Queensland and NSW are now open for applications.

Local Rotary Clubs will be active in impacted areas starting this week seeking applications from families displaced due to the Floods.

"When we launched the appeal one month ago we said the money raised will go directly and quickly to support those impacted, and we are pleased to be in a position to act on that commitment today," said Rotary Australia World Community Service Ltd CEO Andrew Woodward.

"The fact that some of the impacted areas are having to deal with a second flood in a month is devastating, and we hope that providing some quick financial support will provide some short term relief and reduce the mental health trauma being experienced," Mr Woodward said.

Rotary Australia World Community Service has previously raised money for Bushfire and Drought affected areas and sees this disaster as just another where the network of Rotarians can step in to assist.

Families that have been displaced should make contact with their local Rotary Club to obtain the application form for a \$500 debit card (voucher).

Mr Woodward said that the voucher system being used will provide support for not only the recipient, but also the local community as the funds are used within the community, thus creating a multiplier effect for the families and local businesses impacted by the floods.

Rotary Australia World Community Service is a not-for-profit charity that aims to be a leading Australian charitable organization for people's wellbeing, supporting Rotarians and Rotary Clubs undertaking humanitarian projects in Australia and overseas.
