When I joined St Peters there were a number of members who had 100% attendance and at times when overseas they travelled long distances to make up.

Some of our members would be disappointed if I did not mention the change in not singing the Australian National Anthem. I am an Australian and proud of it so I believe we should sing our National Anthem.

Once again, I was very lucky to be D.G. thirty years ago. It was an important night when the DG made his club visit. Joan and I had a very good year in that regard and made many life-long friends because of the social events arranged for us.

At that stage we had thirty or more students each year and it was an enjoyable experience on the whole. I could go on but in closing I want to say this. HAS ROTARY REALLY CHANGED? When I first joined the most common phrase heard was 'SERVICE ABOVE SELF'. And that is still used today. We still refer to the Four Way Test, I am not sure if we apply the Four Way Test as much as we used to, but the world needs to apply Service Above Self and the Four Way Test as there is so much greed and selfishness in the world.



Finally, I am thankful for my Rotary experience and every time I put 20c on an article for selling in the shed I am helping somebody in this world, Without Rotary I would be like a lot of people in this world, self- CENTRED. Let us never lose the compassion we can show in giving time and donations we make. Thanks, Rotary.

This year, we are educating 1,800 students and employ over 290 Tanzanian staff across our three campuses. Your contribution means we can continue 'fighting poverty through education'.

Phil Smith, Chair, International Committee - Donation to Bikes for Refugees SA

Earlier this week our Club made a donation of 7 bikes, 2 helmets & 3 spare tyres to Bikes for Refugees SA. We were met by their coordinator, Mike Brisco, who explained that Bikes for Refugees SA is a bike recycling scheme supplying bikes, free of charge, to people in need. The scheme meets the refugee/asylum seeker communities need for help with transport. It is not-for-profit registered charity and is run by volunteers.

Most of the bikes are donated by the public, bike shops and schools. They also accept donations of helmets, accessories and bike parts in good condition. The bikes are given out on the basis of a referral from someone familiar with the client and their circumstances. This is often a case worker from a recognised welfare organisation, e g Migrant Resource Centre, Red Cross, Anglicare.



They also accept referrals from volunteers working with refugees and other members of the refugee community. The client then gets an appointment to visit the workshop and picks out a bike that they like.

Mike thanked the Rotary Club of St Peters for our donation.

Almoner Keith Shaw reported that although a few members were in 'preventative' Covid isolation, all members are fit and healthy.
