Opening

Sergeant Phil Smith called on Chris Dawson to give the Invocation and Loyal toast. He then asked all present to give a warm welcome to President Bill Winslow who welcomed all, especially – guest speaker, Philip Evans, visiting Rotarian David Simpson from the Rotary Club of Kidman Park, past member Harry Powell and MaryLou and regular visitor, Paul Holton.

Guest Speaker - Philip Evans - MFS



Brian Kretschmer introduced Metropolitan Fire Service officer Philip Evans who addressed the meeting and emphasised the importance of making sure homes are safe from fire. He said household furnishings are very flammable and release many toxic chemicals if set alight.

If a fire starts, the 000 phone number should be called immediately.

Most household fires occur whilst the stove is being used, so a fire blanket and a powder type extinguisher are essential items, but operating instructions must be well known before a fire occurs.

He emphasised that <u>water should never be used</u>. It is also important to regularly check and replace if necessary, fire prevention and control equipment and smoke alarms. National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) by Chris Dawson

Normally all the selected beginning Year 12 students take part in this forum in either Canberra or Brisbane. However, this year brand new programs had to be arranged in the home areas. In the case of SA students, the program was mainly online with three days of visits interspersed. Options for students were visits to Adelaide University (North Tce, Waite Institute and Roseworthy): Flinders University and DST at Edinburgh.



With four other Rotarians and helpers, I was involved in the program at Adelaide Uni, North Tce.

After registering 56 students <u>at 8.30am</u> (three of whom we sponsored) we proceeded to be welcomed by Adelaide Uni representatives, Caroline McMillen (Chief Scientist for SA) and David Pisoni, Minister for Infrastructure and Skills.

We then split into four groups to visit labs of the University Institute for Photonics and Advanced Sensing. The focus throughout was on light and optical fibres - glass fibre 50 microns in diameter, covered in a plastic sheath, carrying massive amounts of data on light waves with little energy loss.

Did you know that drugs can be made which can only be made active by a burst of light, delivered by an optical fibre?

Following these visits, we moved across Frome Rd to the IVF labs where scientists are trying to improve success rates. A major problem is an euploidy where fertilised cells have the wrong number of chromosomes.

Following lunch at the University Hub, we walked to the new medical building on North Tce (just past the Morphett Bridge). After a short talk, we had visits to a laboratory examining human movement, and then to the simulation area. Here medical students and nurses are trained on simulated patients. For instance, one old chap could be programmed to have increased blood pressure, oxygen deficiency etc. Another model gives birth where different complications can be arranged.

All of the training and research focus here is on medical issues and, with the RAH so close, we heard interesting stories of medics coming across partway through an operation to check on something.



An enjoyable and enlightening day, with my only problem being the number of flights of stairs we climbed. Surprisingly, I can't keep up with 17 year olds. So a tram ride back to the east end where my car was parked was very welcome.
