Wendy Gaborit welcomed guest speaker Jane Sloan.

Jane is Senior Director, Women's Empowerment and Gender Equality with The Asia Foundation based in San Francisco.

In this role, she provides intellectual and programmatic leadership for The Asia Foundation's programs to empower women and advance gender equality in Asia and the Pacific, working with a team in San Francisco and Washington and with the foundation's 18 country offices in the region.

Jane showed a series of slides with quotations from people who have influenced her philosophy. She is a strong advocate for women's health, reproductive rights and justice. Educating girls is one of the most effective ways for countries to achieve their economic potential, improve health, reduce conflict, and save lives. Education is also a basic human right.

Jane's career has taken her all around the world – from helping women in Bangladesh prevent child marriage, to spending time with Syrian women who have fled ISIS. At one time she had to look after Nelson Mandella.

Her work has involved dealing with death threats in Fiji, bombs near the refugee camps she was visiting in Lebanon, and violence in Nepal and Indonesia. Other challenges have been working with Aborigines and coping with Covid 19.

Jane has written several books about women.

Keith Payne - <u>Biodiversity in the billabong - Guided nature walk</u> - Last Saturday Chris Dawson, Keith Payne and Dianne Hill took part in the nature walk. Here is Dianne's account of the experience -

'On a sunny morning, Saturday 4th March, I joined an informative guided group walk through the St Peters Billabong. This is a unique part of the Torrens Linear Park near St Peters Park which is being rehabilitated from its historical role as an industrial rubbish dump into a complex bio-diverse natural feature.

At about 9am about 15 nature enthusiasts gathered in the small carpark at the entry to the park and were met by representatives from both Ferox Australis* and the Friends of the Billabong**.



A speaker from each organisation explained their interest in educating the community (1) about the benefits of 'citizen science' in recording the variety of plant, bird, animal and insect species in specific habitats, and (2) appreciating the value of biodiversity already to be observed, and being actively promoted, in the Billabong.



First, we walked a short way along a small track to a point overlooking the Billabong and were shown the extent of this relatively unknown wild oasis only 3 kilometres from Adelaide's CBD. We then meandered down the track to access the Billabong itself. This track is also the only entry to the St Peters Park oval, where a large crowd were watching and cheering a cricket game in progress.

Turning off this track we pushed through a reedy section of the walk and arrived at an open area alongside the billabong. Here several of the group stopped to take photos and to compare notes on their own previous observations of a variety of species from spiders and flies to orchids and other plants.





At this point my focus of interest turned to the waterbirds on and around the reeds and trees near the water. By this time, around 10.45am, the group had split into several smaller groups keenly discussing their own specific interest, and a few, like me, called it a day. I plan to go back to the billabong soon, on a less busy occasion, for a calm and quiet walk to observe and enjoy what this fascinating place has to offer.'

*Ferox australis (Latin for 'Wild of the South') is an Australian based not-for-profit organisation aimed at engaging citizens in science globally. The ethos of the organisation is to increase public environmental education using citizen science-related tools and initiatives, e.g. ecologically focused events such as guided walks through biodiverse environments like the St Peters Wetlands.



**Friends of the Billabong (FOB), working with the assistance of the City of Norwood Payneham and St Peters, is an active group of volunteers aspiring to restore the native habitat, increase biodiversity and improve the quality of water flowing into the River Torrens through nurturing the St Peters Billabong. They conduct regular working bees and education programs eradicating weeds and re-vegetating the billabong and its surrounding area.






End Polio Now

For polio eradication efforts, 2022 brought good news. Fewer genetic strains of the virus are circulating than ever before. Afghanistan and Pakistan are the only two countries where polio remains endemic. Support from political, medical, and community leaders in those areas has strengthened vaccination efforts during the past year. Global support for polio eradication also reached new heights, as was proven at the World Health Summit in October, when Rotary and international partners and donors pledged a combined US\$2.6 billion to eradicate the disease.

There were challenges in 2022 as well. The poliovirus appeared in places it hasn't been for a long time: Israel, the United Kingdom, and the United States, to name a few. Wild poliovirus cases were reported in Mozambique, related to the 2021 case in Malawi caused by wild poliovirus imported from Pakistan. News of these cases didn't slow our eradication efforts, however. If anything, it made us even more determined. Now is our best chance to finish the fight against polio.

Rotary's PolioPlus program integrates polio immunization work and efforts to provide basic services, such as access to clean water and sanitation facilities. Because poliovirus is transmitted through contaminated water, improving water quality, in addition to vaccinating people, is critical to stopping its spread. When we address a community's basic needs, we also build goodwill and trust that support our polio vaccination campaigns.
