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Guest Speaker

Chairman Brian Kretschmer introduced guest speaker Michael Neale. Brian then outlined Michael's profile and a description of his business 'LITERALLY BRILLIANT'.

Changing from Mission-Led to Purpose-Led: The role of the mutual exchange and keeping of promises.

There has been a lot of talk lately about transforming from mission-led organisations (talking about what we do) to become purpose-led organisations (talking about the benefit we provide). But what does this really mean, how do you do it and is it really a new idea?

Michael Neale is Managing Director and Principal Consultant of strategy consulting firm Literally Brilliant. He helps organisations understand what makes them BRILLIANT in the eyes of their stakeholders, helps them to articulate that as a brand promise and then helps them re-organise to deliver that brand promise LITERALLY every day. He will explain how "the mutual exchange and keeping your promises" forms an essential part of becoming a purpose-led organisation. It is a concept that is as valid for a commercial business, as it is for a service organisation, community group, or even a local sporting club.

Michael has had over 35 years' experience in strategic marketing roles and strategy consulting roles in Australia and the UK. After completing his first University degree, he undertook a Masters research degree whilst working full time. He has maintained an academic research interest with recent tier-one publications and is currently visiting fellow at the Adelaide Business School, University of Adelaide. Michael is also a Trustee of the History Trust of the South Australia and Chair of the Bay to Birdwood.

Michael has never been a member of Rotary but has had a life-long exposure to the organisation through his father, Reg Neale, and his brother Jeff.



Michael spoke dynamically and enthusiastically about the way he encourages businesses to reassess their goals and the manner in which they operate.

He said when businesses are asked about their mode of operation, they claim to be customer orientated when, in reality, their main focus is on profitability.

Michael explained that the Company Directors, Managers and Staff all have to be constantly aware of the need to give the customers the best possible experience and then profitability will follow.

Mary-Anne Hannay thanked Michael for his presentation.

Brian Kretschmer - Rotary International World Convention in Melbourne

Rotary's founder, Paul Harris, convened the first Rotary Convention in 1910 for 16 clubs in America. This eventually became the World Rotary International Convention which is held yearly near the end of the Rotary year.

President Pam, Secretary Wendy and myself attended the 4 day event in Melbourne. Upwards to 20,000 Rotarians were expected to participate. The convention was held over 2 sites in Melbourne – the Rod Laver Arena and the Melbourne Convention & Exhibition Centre.

At Rod Laver Arena sessions were held from 10am to 12MD where speakers form different organisations as well as Rotarians gave insight to various projects and issues. There were three speakers that certainly got my attention over the 4 days.

• Past World Rotary International President, Ian Riseley, (whom we hosted in Adelaide in mid March) Ian talked mainly about his role as Foundation chair and End Polio Now campaign

- Co-Founders of Global Citizens that is closely aligned with Rotary
- o Ryan Gall
- o Hugh Evans
- One of them said

• The best thing Rotary has done is start the eradication of Polio in 1978 and the next best thing will be to end Polio Now

There are now only 3 to 5 cases of polio only in Afghanistan from an estimated 350,000 cases in 1978! After the Rod Laver sessions there were Breakout sessions in the Melbourne Convention & Exhibition Centre as well as food and exhibits in the House of Friendship. These exhibits were from clubs around the world as well as Australian.

I am a member of the Rotary Wine Appreciation Fellowship and joined also the Rotary Fellowship of Gin – ONLY because part of your membership goes to Aquabox which is a water purifier for safe drinking water to those in desperate need – The group only started about 2 years ago in Derbyshire in the UK – I like to help out Rotary Clubs!! When I said I make my own they even invited me to speak about it on their Zoom meetings!!

I went to breakout sessions around membership, youth and club growth through projects and fellowship.



The photo displayed of PIRP Ian Riseley was to raise funds for End Polio – I wanted to purchase one to take over to San Francisco on our trip in July but they were sold out!!
