The Year Ahead.

I would first of all to say that I look forward to working with you all to ensure that the Rotary Club of St Peters has another successful year. In order to achieve that will take a bit of effort from each and every member of the club and the non- member volunteers who give up their time each week to help out

• I would now like to go through each of the committees and outline what I would like to see occurring this year. Firstly each director requires doing a bit of planning for the year, and hold regular committee meetings. Whilst these meetings do not need to be long they require to set out an agenda for the meeting distribute this agenda to all the committee members including myself and the club secretary. This agenda needs to be sent out in adequate time to give each committee member time to consider the items before the meeting occurs. Minutes of the meeting should also be published and distributed. In the committees that have a budget to disperse funds these meetings require to log expenditure to date and expenditure still to expend. This will ensure that each committee is allotting its budget in a timely and considered manner and we are not left with the situation of having to disperse funds at the last minute, which invariably are not wisely spent.

Now some of my recommendations for each committee.

International Committee. (Chair John Dubberely)

- All Kids Dental Clinic. I have a pamphlet to give John Dubberely about this wonderful initiative.
- All Kids School.
- Birthing Kits
- Assist the tennis coach in Zambia.

Community Committee. (Chair Bill Winslow assisted by Chris Dawson)

- Helping Women (or men) in crisis. Broken marriages deserted and or abused women etc. This should firstly be in our district then more widely in Adelaide and country areas.
- Assisting organisations that provide meals for kids before going to school.
- Operation Flinders.

Vocational & Youth Committee. (Chair Brian Kretchmer)

- Innovative excellence awards.
- Arranging young people to visit the shed.
- Operation Flinders could well come into this category and this may be an opportunity for a combined effort across both the Community & Youth committees.

Fund Raising Committee. (Chair Phil Smith)

- The shed is undoubtedly the engine room of the club. Without the revenue from the shed we would have to revert to sausage sizzles and raffles to raise a few dollars. Having said that the shed requires a lot of help from members and non-member volunteers. This does not only mean working on a Saturday morning roster every 6 weeks or so, it takes a lot of work to achieve the kinds of revenue we have achieved in the past. Every member of the club must give serious thought to the amount of help they have undertaken and if in your heart of heart you think it is not too much then rectify the situation and speak to the Fund Raising Director to see how you can help moving forward.
- The shelter at the front of the shed is going to be a big project over the next six months and when completed will add another dimension to our shed operations.
- With the recent very heavy winter rains the shed roof is urgently in need of repair and or renewal. This will require to be addressed before next winter.



Membership & Public Image Committee. (Keith Payne)

- As outlined at the change- over getting younger members to join the club is increasingly difficult although also as outlined there is a group of men between the ages of 30 to 55 who are lonely and have no or little friends. The Membership committee needs to explore this in detail and connect with organisations that help these men with a view to them joining the club. This could well be a life changing opportunity for these men. I look forward to receiving feedback on how this progresses.
- This committee requires to actively recruit corporate members into the club. Undoubtedly these people who are running a business are very busy and may not be able to attend many meetings however they be able to assist the club in other ways such as sponsorship etc.

Environmental Committee. (Chris Dawson)

- I would like to see this committee run the very successful environmental awards again this year.
- The wonderful work undertaken at Jacks Farm has been a great success and as a suggestion after the new shelter is constructed at the front of the shed this committee in conjunction with the NSPP council should look at enhancing the surrounding area with some new planting.




Calling All Barbie Fans

FELLOWSHIP THEATRE NIGHT – 1st JULY – "AN IDEAL HUSBAND"

Last Saturday night 21 Rotarians, partners & friends attended the Arts Theatre in Angus Street to see the play "An Ideal Husband".

Before the play we headed to the Saracens Head Hotel for an enjoyable pub meal. It was a great way to start the evening with everyone sharing great fellowship at a leisurely pace. As the hotel was not that crowded conversation was easy even for those hard of hearing.

Theatre Review: An Ideal Husband

Oscar Wilde's witty drawing room comedy is as relevant today as when it was first performed in 1895. True, manners may have changed and few of society's norms, but people and their relationships still create fascinating problems. Wilde examines the rrity of a politician who is ethical and honest and the effect of blackmail on a man who tries to be a paragon of virtue. Like the premise, the wit and humour are timeless.



Under the direction of Matthew Chapman this cast handles Wilde's witty dialogue well and creates characters that fit well in this high society background. Stuart Pearce is Sir Robert Chiltern, the man with the dark secret, an act which he would love to forget. Pearce is entirely believable and makes Sir Robert a sympathetic man. His highly principled wife, Lady Gertrude, is played with sincerity by Anita Pipprell with great conviction. Angela Short does very well as the femme fatale Mabel Cheveley, brash and conniving whilst being persuasive.

As Lord Arthur Goring, Sir Robert's friend and confidant, Maxwell Whigham attempts to assist in the problem and succeeds in making things worse while battling with his overbearing Father the Earl of Caversham (Lindsay Dunn) and courting Mabel Chiltern, Robert's sister (Rhoda Sylvester). Megan Dansie plays the verbose and irritating Lady Markby delightfully with all the wit intact.

The lovely ladies who begin the play out front, Mrs Marchmont and Lady Basildon are played beautifully by Rose Harvey and Genevieve Venning and the servants are brought to life by Berny Abberdan (as Phipps) and Lindy Le Cornu (as both the butler and valet). The versatile Brad Martin played two roles Vicomte de Nanjac and Mr Trafford (one with an interesting French accent). All blended well into the society they created.

The set for this production deserves a mention as it was representative of the era and gave the illusion of grand houses, with different wall panels and furniture for every scene. Whilst I applaud the attention to detail, the long wait between scenes is excessive. Despite this it was a fine production true to Wilde's wit and sarcasm, well done. Reviewed by Fran Edwards
