Joanne Hand from "Hagar" is committed to protecting women and children throughout the world. Human trafficking is the movement of people often as the result of war that results in exploitation. Slavery means you have no control over what you do and may be treated like a possession. There are about 40 million in the world with two thirds in Southeast Asia. Some people are making a lot of money. New Zealanders may be contributing to the

problem through clothing, tech (children mining minerals), pornography and sexual exploitation. Getting communities free and headed away from the trauma of slavery trafficking and abuse takes a long time. Sopia is a Cambodian who was taken from her village at four years of age to be a slave and aged 12 managed to escape and was

taken to Hagar. 10 years on she is now a human being and able to 'dream new dreams'. She attended school and university and is now a social worker. Last year she spoke to parliamentarians in Australia that was broadcast widely. RAGAS – Rotary action against slavery – with Hagar is promoting the International day for Girls on October 18 and is hoping schools will have mufti days. 27 seconds wine is available from the website. 75% of the money gets to those that need it. 95% their clients return home to the local communities. There is considerable collaboration with other NGOs.
