The last week, while on holiday on Stewart Island, there has been an interesting philosophical discussion going on in my head. We went for the natural features that the island is known for, the hardy but friendly islanders, the beautiful scenery and the wildlife, with especial hopes to see a kiwi in the wild.

The philosophical question was "to kill or not to kill" the introduced predator animals that are prevalent throughout our wild areas. Just before we left, I read an NZ Herald opinion piece by Bob Kerridge, SPCA stalwart, encouraging a "live and let live" approach to all animals. He felt that the labelling of some innocent animals as "pests" and devising systematic means of exterminating them, detracted from our stance as a mature and civilised society.

I thought about this as I wondered at the richness of the forest and the animal and bird life on Ulva Island, never logged and free of predator pests for decades. Constant birdsong in the forest, kiwi seen foraging in the daylight, birds we never see on the mainland, and good numbers of them. In Oban, the only town on Stewart Island, there were kaka everywhere and native pigeons could be seen in flocks. Tramping in the forests though, where there is little trapping done except in a few high value places, there was little birdsong. Not as deathly quiet as some of the pristine forests of Fiordland, but nearly so.

In my mind, "live and let live" involves just too much death and destruction. An estimated twenty-five million birds are chomped every year in New Zealand, many just fledglings in the nest, while in the forest canopy and on the forest floor the plant and insect life is stripped and the forest slowly dies. I don't believe a mature and civilised society is one that stands by and watches its uniquely special habitats and wildlife destroyed by animals that we introduced in our ignorance not so very long ago. Fifty per cent of our endemic birds have become extinct since man arrived in this country, I believe we have a duty of care to protect the survivors.

Ross Buckley is involved with leadership New Zealand and has had 35 years at KPMG, is married with 17-year-old triplets and enjoys cycling. His firm has sent candidates to RYLA in Auckland and in the South Island.

Ross said the New Zealand Exchange had lost a number of companies and was not growing. He said there were a number of good companies but there was also some inappropriate behaviour in some of the delisted companies. Success stories such as Z Energy which has a clear purpose and contributes to New Zealand with the purchase of Caltex it is now a 3 billion company. Mainfreight does everything under the impression it is going to be around for 100 years. Part of their success is care for the customers. Push Pay based on an app which allows you to donate to your church is now a \$1 billion company. Not so successful were Fuji Xerox, the Banks and insurance companies in Australia like AMP and CBA. Dick Smith lost \$260 million with 400 jobs in New Zealand- not before \$440 million profit was made by the new owner before selling out to the public. There is a need to look at normalised results and in particular cash flows. Pumpkin Patch expanded rapidly but was not agile enough to change its ideas after the GFC. Having a large poor supply chain was hard to change. Wynyard, a software company, was taken over and then was losing money rapidly so they could not survive. Two small slides below.

He recommends guidance– IRD, stock exchange, integrated reporting, long-term growth and start at the top. It was a very entertaining, interesting and informative talk.
