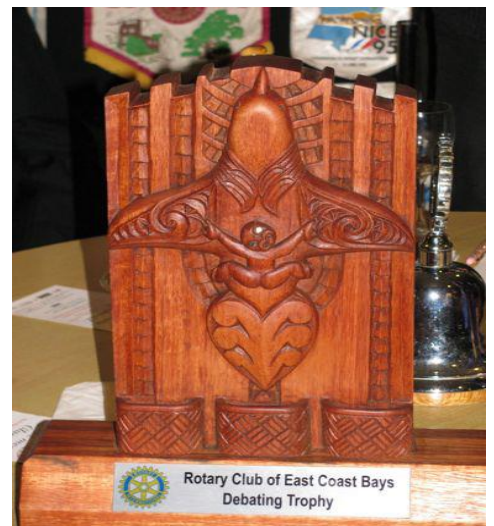

“Whakapapa O Te Taonga” (Symbolism of the Treasure)

The carving is called “Whirowhiro” which means “to swirl, to move around in a circle” i.e. the expectation is that the trophy will be competed for each year and will move around the schools.

The bird is the Tui which represents the speaker, it has an enlarged head representing knowledge. The Tui is in a pursuit stance i.e. pursuit of excellence and greatness. The Tui’s wings show the Rauru pattern, denoting movement and binding strength to keep the wings in flight.

The tail end of the Tui is shaped like a paddle (Hoe) which acts as a rudder, thus keeping it on course. The carving on the tail (Kowhaiwhai) or koru represent Tupuna (ancestors) which also support both Maui and the Tui.

The “trickster” Maui Tikitiki-a-Taranga is shown riding the Tui. His task is to support the speaker when difficult questions arise.

The spiral pattern (Takarangi) immediately behind the Tui’s head (shown in a more modern form) represents the volume needed to be heard or strength of voice.

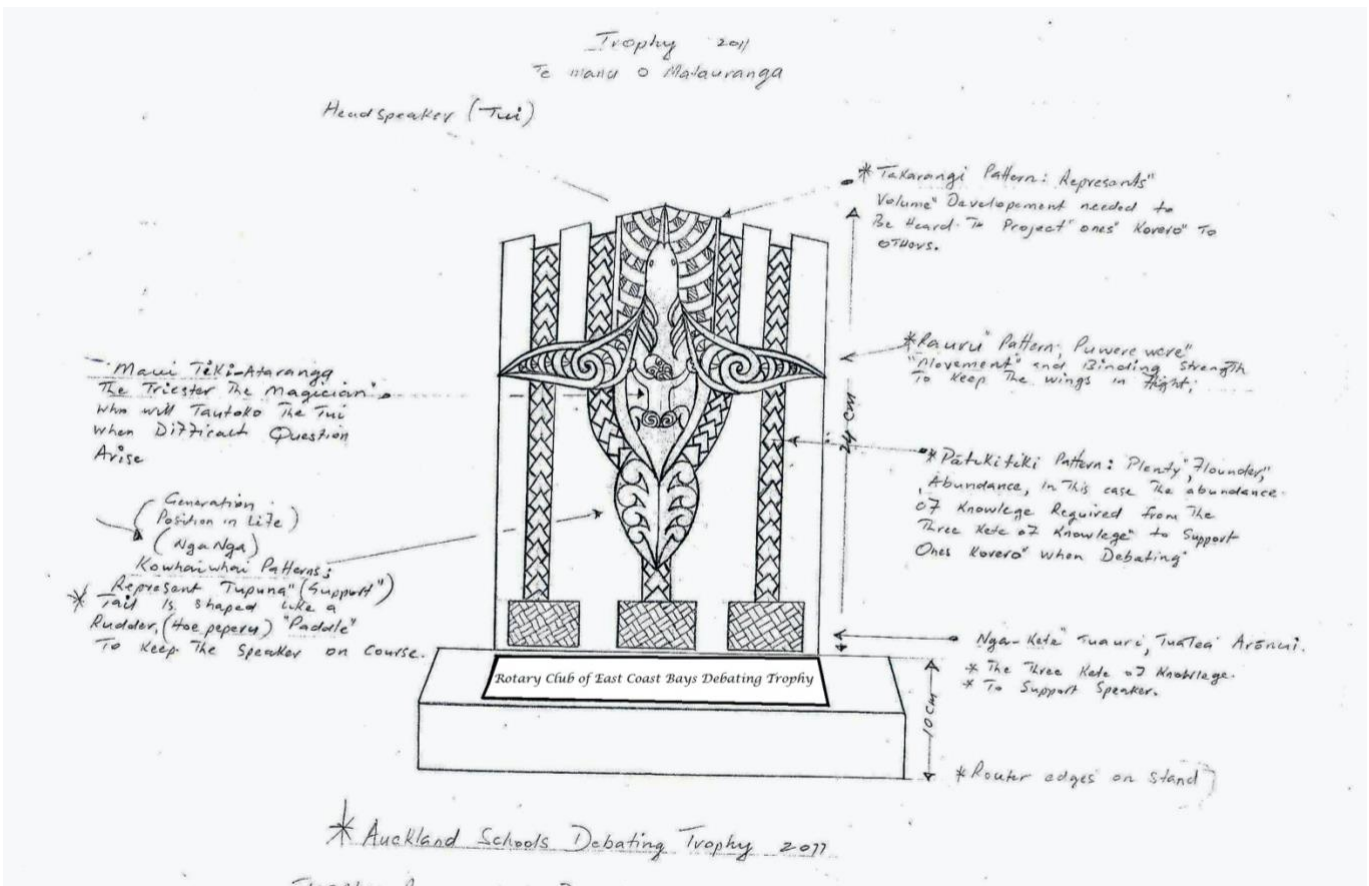
The carved vertical patterns behind the Tui (Patikitiki) literally represent an abundance of flounder i.e. in this case inferring an abundance of knowledge.

The three baskets of knowledge (Kete) are shown at the bottom decorated with Patikitiki patterns. This is to represent the abundance of knowledge needed to support the speaker.

The trophy itself is shaped like the roof of a “whare”.
