07/10 DG's visit I remember a conversation I had years ago in England, with a past chairman of the British Medical Association. This doctor prided himself in instructing the then Minister of Health that it didn't matter how much money the government poured into health, it would never be "enough" to pay for everything that was available. "Health spending" he said "is a bottomless pit. And that was before some of the super-expensive medicines and treatments available now.

Alexis Poppelbaum described to us on Monday evening how, uniquely in the world, the NZ Pharmac organisation attempts to address the spending issue on medications. By using a combination of critical analysis of the available drugs, and then a competitive business approach to secure the best prices for those drugs, it enables a fixed budget to stretch a lot further and provide a variety of drugs that we could otherwise not afford.

And there's the rub, "what we can afford". And it isn't just the drugs. We are a small population scattered over a long thin country. We have a relatively small tax base. Equitable provision of health care is a real challenge. It's also a conversation that doesn't happen often enough. We hear a lot about expensive therapies that the government should fund (that means that taxpayers should fund - though the link is often overlooked) but we hear less about some basic, cheaper, and way less sexy health needs not being met. Adequate healthcare for children in Northland, any kind of dental care for many adults who just can't afford a visit to the dentist (only option currently is lining up at Greenlane at 6am in the hope of being early enough in the queue to get your tooth extracted), the list goes on.

It isn't just money though, systems also count. In the OECD the USA spends more per capita than anyone else, and by a substantial amount. But its health statistics are closer to the bottom of the table. The UK spends less than half the USA, with stats near the top. Public health measures in any country make a huge difference. Cuba, by no means a wealthy country, used to top the world in child health outcomes because of an excellent public health system. I checked the Unicef website to see where they are now.

evidence of the effect of alcohol on young brains, the effect of high dietary sugar loads on all of us, but we still have a bottle shop on every corner with cheap RTDs aimed especially at those young brains and whole aisles of the supermarket given to fizzy drinks at rock bottom prices.

So plenty to think about - we do well here with the limited pot of money that we have, but there is plenty of room for a more equitable system with a strong public health focus behind it.



Alexis Popplebaum who was previously a policy analyst with Pharmac in Wellington gave us a very interesting address telling us how Pharmac worked.



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She showed us a very expensive pill with a 95% cure rate. It cost \$1000 per pill! It was so expensive it was delivered personally to your house. There is no bulk buying and they are completely separate from Med Safe, the DHBs and the Government. They keep prices down by having a tender process each year. The budget is \$1 billion from

a \$20 billion health budget. They provide hospital and community medicines, blood,

vaccines and medical devices. Since 2009 they have saved 6 billion by the tender process. 10% of patients used 80% of the budget. The process for new medicines involves clinical advice, economic advice which provides a ranking and public consultation with the community and DHBs. Factors for consideration are need—considering health benefits to the person and family, consequences—dealt with by GP rather than hospital, costs and savings to Health and the person, suitability. Challenges—Rising cost—80% paid by taxpayers, quality of clinical research which seems to be getting poorer, early access and ring fencing (which she did not like), special treatment and equitable access.
