Speaker Bronwyn Innes.

Bronwyn said she started a BA/ LLB which very quickly morphed into a degree in English after she did English linguistics 2. She later did a PhD. She gave us an interesting introduction to linguistics where you have to consider words, sentences and comprehension. She said there was a big difference between walk, walks, walked and was walking. She spent time in conversation analysis and forensic linguistics. When turning recorded speech into written word you had to be very careful with variations in language and sentence structure. You have to make sure that you don't transcribe what you want to hear. She gave us some examples from current court cases.
