## Morgan's message

My toast on Monday was all about new beginnings and the fact that in Rotary, we too have a new beginning with the start of the new Rotary Year which comes with a new Rotary theme. "Rotary Serving Humanity" is of course our new Rotary International Theme as assigned by our new R.I.

President John F Germ from Chattanooga in Tennessee. In the '60's John was a navigator with the USAF flying a 50-ton Douglas C-124, ferrying troops and tanks to Vietnam. John now sees himself as Rotary's navigator, plotting a course toward a bright future. His focus is first and foremost on eradicating polio, followed by addressing Rotary's static membership.

Whilst at age 77 John is no spring chicken, he recognises the need for Rotary to appeal to younger members. As such he has been a supporter of a recent move (approved at the Council on Legislation in April) that allows membership in Rotaract and Rotary at the same time. He also approves of moves to make Clubs more flexible with less emphasis on attendance. He is quoted as saying "How do we accommodate the 30-year-old businessperson raising a family? Well, for one thing, we could pay less attention to attendance............ My question isn't 'How many meetings did you make?' it's 'How are you making a difference in your community?' "

Clearly he has recognised the need for change if Rotary is to survive and more importantly to thrive. As a Club we too must recognise that change is necessary if Rotary is to evolve and continue to be meaningful and relevant in this modern age.

**John Drake** told us about being a volunteer with Coastguard North Shore. They started in 1992 with a 16-foot inflatable and graduated in 2007 to 9.5 m inflatable that would do 42 knots. They have a large area to cover and it is the busiest boat in the country. In 2017 they will have a new boat costing over \$650,000 paid for by donations and the Browns Bay Market Day Trust. They have 55 volunteers and eight skippers. The boat needs one skipper and 2 to 4 volunteers and is on the water every weekend and public holiday. Last year they attended at 1600 events and 700 callouts.

**PP Caroline** congratulated the club on receiving a Gold Citation one of only two in the District and eight in New Zealand.

Sean reported that our exchange student Emily had returned from France.

**Pres Gary** showed us a video of a Rotary sponsored vehicle in Haiti which was a well used neo-natal bus.
