Conference – PE Keith said the clubs response to conference was pathetic. Please reconsider! Whangarei April 21-23. Contact Keith if you are interested. President Gary showed us films about water and sanitation in Ghana and Guatemala. The club has been involved with three water projects in Vanuatu. Bernie reminded us that Romac provides free operations and accommodation for children with serious injuries. Please contact Bernie if you can help with future visiting or transport.

Inner Wheel President Gave Pratt said they were one of the largest women's organisations in the world. There are nearly 4000 clubs in 102 countries with over 100,000 members. Started in 1924 in Manchester, the first NZ Club was formed in 1986 in Napier. They have a paid secretary in Manchester and have a conference every five years.

Past member Jane Hunter told us about her work as a community patroller. They work with the New Zealand Police and have been in existence for 25 years and have 200 patrols. They are the eyes and ears of the police from eight till 12 at night. They are the soft front at big events and festivals and are also used to diffuse and divert crime.

They often do surveillance of people of interest or places. She said offenders see the North Shore as rich people and mostly steal to order. Other issues are the rise of drug use, a new gang in Browns Bay, preloading and keeping young girls in particular safe. They are a voluntary organisation and have to raise money for the petrol for their labelled car. Patrollers are expected to do one night per month.
