Pres Gary showed us two short Rotary videos and PG Peter told us District has donated significant sums to Polio plus, Vanuatu and Rotary foundation. Rotary is really making a difference.

Chris Farrelly - City Mission.

Chris spent 12 years in South Korea and 20 years in the North where he joined Rotary. He thanked Rotary partners for helping the Rotarians with their work. He was in a Korean slum in the 70s and now Korea is giving back. Jasper Calder founded the City Mission in 1920, when times were very grim. to help care for people. In the 30s people were in dire straits as NZ came out of the depression. Just before the war the Labour government introduced Social Security with the idea that nobody would be in need. In the early 50s it was desperate old people with thousands living alone. Robert Kerridge made a film about their plight. The Selwyn foundation was formed and spun off as a separate entity. Later came the need for children's camps and dealing with AIDS.

He is impressed by the **generosity of the community**. We are disturbed by poverty but donations of food and 1.5 million cash allow the Mission to support three large food banks and 37 smaller ones. He mentioned a judge who comes in every Thursday to help and the Buddhist temple who prepare food which their young people serve once a week. Poverty in New Zealand is real. A count of homeless people in a 3km radius of central Auckland was originally about 70, three years ago it became 100 and now it is over 200. Over the Christmas period he thought he was dealing with a refugee camp when they provided emergency kits for queuing families. In answer to questions he said that the 'p' problem was huge. Rather than 'cure' people first then house them it was better to house first and then work on budgeting and health. A large percentage of prisoners have head injuries. It was a very sobering but interesting talk.
